Music Talk Given By Charles Miller

"Music is farther behind in public schools than other subjects," said Charles H. Miller, director of music of the Rochester, New York city schools, in his talk on his established theory of teaching music to children without the use of syllables, at a recent Mu Epsilon Psi assembly at Humboldt State College.

Mr. Miller said that in French, for example, a student prepares for two or three years before reading it; but in music, one cannot do this. In the public schools the method is done by imitation, and the notes and grammar are learned later.

The musical program was provided by the A Cappella Choir under the direction of Edmund V. Jeffers, and a clarinet solo by Muriel Yaley.

Humboldt To Give Course Next Term In "Wild Life"

Offered for the first time in California, Humboldt State College has outlined a new course of study for next semester in Wild Life Management.

In co-operation with Bureau of Game Farms of the State Fish and Game Department, positions in private game refuges will be open to all qualified students completing the course.

Two new specialized classes, Zoology 60, "Game Bird Management," offered during the spring semester, and Zoology 62, "Diseases of Game Birds," offered the following fall semester, together with certain other classes will complete the course. The course will be a two year study and will combine the study of basic sciences and that of practical experiences in handling game birds.

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Music Department Will Present Oatorio By Bach

About 125 members of the Humboldt College music department under direction of E. V. Jeffers, will participate in the presentation of Bach's Christmas Oatorio in the auditorium of Humboldt State College on December 18, at 8 o'clock.

This number includes members of the A Cappella Choir, orchestra, and mixed chorus, as well as several soloists. These soloists are: Jean Schussman, soprano; Karen Loft, contralto; J. Henry Welton, member of the faculty of College of the Pacific, tenor; and Eugene Hammond and Allan Lowry, basses.

The Christmas Oatorio is a dramatic story of the birth of Christ, set to music, and accompanied by an orchestra. It was written by Johann Sebastian Bach over 200 years ago, when the famous composer was forty-nine years old. As originally written, it is a combination of six complete sections. During each day of the six-day Christmas Festival of early Germany, a respective section of the Oatorio was sung. The first three sections will be used in the presentation at Humboldt College.

Admission will be fifty cents for people from the community. Students will be admitted without charge.

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Value of Occupational Therapy Has Been Known Since Days of Galen

Helen Hurlbutt of Eureka, now taking a two-year pre-nursing course at Humboldt College, will later enter the St. Louis School of Occupational and Recreational Therapy, affiliated with Washington University at St. Louis.

The value of occupational therapy, a combination of nursing and teaching, has been recognized since the days of the great physician and philosopher Galen, in 172 A. D. It was not until after the first World War, however, that it became a method of treatment.

Occupational therapy furnishes an approach to the patient, especially to the mental cases who often reject all treatment and show an aversion for hospitals and nurses. An Arcata nurse tells of a woman patient in a hospital who cried most of the time, refused to eat, and fought against the ministrations of the nurses. It was learned from relatives that the patient formerly enjoyed knitting. So one morning an attractive woman, trained in occupational therapy, entered the patient's room and started knitting. At first the patient seemed to pay little attention; then she became interested. The needles were placed in her hands and, with help, she began knitting. Although at times she would lose control of herself, throw the needles across the room and unravel her work, the process of restoring nerve paths and muscle coordination

was being re-established. In other forms of illness occupational therapy relieves languor, trains muscles, and brings pleasure to patients, thereby shortening the convalescence.

Occupational therapy includes many of the handicrafts, such as weaving, basketry, sewing, metal work and jewelry. Basketry is one of the most satisfactory crafts, it is said, because it can be carried on with limited funds, in hospitals, in homes, and in occupational therapy departments.

Basketry has proved interesting to men, women and children; its technique varies from the simple patterns that can be mastered with little effort to the most intricate and complex designs.

Students interested in special phases of nursing can find information in the "Career" series in the Humboldt College library.

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H. S. C. Enrollment On Steady Increase

In 1935 the name "Humboldt State Teachers College" was changed to "Humboldt State College", and the institution was authorized to grant the Bachelor of Arts degree in the liberal arts; during the following school year the enrollment rose to 416, an increase of about 30 per cent over the previous year's record.

The next year, 1936-37, this was a total net enrollment of 397 individual students, but the following year's records show a drop to 379.

During the school year 1938-39, the figure rose to 393, but even this figure was topped by last year's record, which shows that 500 students were enrolled, an increase of 25 per cent.

The above stated enrollment figures are for the individual students enrolled during the entire school year, including new students and excluding students who quit college during the year.
