Coach Hart Says H. S. C. May Enter F. W. Conference

Chances are good that Humboldt State College would be voted into the Far Western Conference should Humboldt apply for admission was indicated by Coach Herbert L. Hart following his arrival home from attending the Conference meeting held in Sacramento last weekend. All Conference representatives indicated they are highly in favor of Humboldt joining the Conference. Present members of the Far Western Conference include College of Pacific, Chico State College, California Aggies, Fresno State, and the University of Nevada who may withdraw.

The Far Western Conference rules and regulations are patterned somewhat after the Pacific Coast and Big Ten Conferences. Conference championships are awarded in football, basketball, and track. No Conference member has to compete in the various sports, however, competition between the Conference schools is encouraged.

In order to be eligible for the Conference Championship an institution must satisfy the following regulations: for football each team must play in at least the number of games equal to two less than there are Conference members, for basketball each team

Student Activities To Be Affected By Probation System

Regulations passed by the Humboldt State faculty regarding eligibility for participation in extra-curricular activities will go into effect in the fall semester of 1940. The approved ruling reads as follows:

1. No student who is on probation may represent Humboldt State College in a public appearance of any organized student activity. The term "organized student activity" shall be interpreted to include:

- (a) Competitive Athletics
- (b) Dramatic Performances
- (c) Musical Performances

Probation, as defined by the recently adopted plan of probation and disqualification, is "any student who drops below a cumulative average of 'C' (i.e. an index of '1') shall be given a warning notice, a copy of which will be sent to his parents. If a student's scholarship index for a semester falls below .50 (midway between a 'C' and a 'D') he shall be placed upon probation for the

CAREER COLUMN**NO. 2 FORESTRY**

Forestry as a profession has its appeal to young men who like the prospect of an outdoor life, combined with the opportunity to accomplish work that needs to be done. The forester supervises reforestation projects, guards against the spread of plant diseases, fights fires, manages the sale of timber, surveys forest regions and otherwise serves as the guardian of natural resources in fire areas.

Of the seven thousand trained foresters in the United States, a few are employed by the United States Forest Service. The salaries paid range from \$1800 to \$3,000 per year with a few receiving as high as \$5,000.

The training required is specialized, with emphasis upon science as a background for the more technical courses offered in the forestry course at the 17 universities in the country which have schools of forestry. At Humboldt, pre-forestry students take two years of lower division work, including chemistry, physics, civil engineering and botany. This is followed by two or preferably three years of study at a school of forestry with opportunity for advanced degrees if the student desires further specialization.

Thus far the picture is an attractive one. There is an adverse factor, however, which must be mentioned. The field of forestry is at present greatly overcrowded with large numbers of recent graduates being forced to accept employment in other fields. In 1937, there were more than six thousand students of forestry in the United States, a number three times as large as the number enrolled in 1933. 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Dr. MacGinitie Does Research Work Classifying the Florissant Flora



Sponsored by the Carnegie Institute, Dr. H. D. MacGinitie, Humboldt State science professor, has been doing research work in the East for the last few weeks where he studied fossil plant collections in various museums. Dr. MacGinitie was collecting data for his work in classifying the Florissant flora, on which he has been doing research in central Colorado.

In Minneapolis, Dr. MacGinitie presented a paper prepared from his study of the fossil flora in Colorado, before a meeting of the Geological Society.

Among the museums which Dr. MacGinitie visited were the National Museum in Washington,

D. C., Harvard University, American Museum of Natural History and the Botanical Gardens in New York City, Field Museum in Chicago, and Milwaukee Museum in Milwaukee.

Dr. MacGinitie spent the Christmas holidays at the home of Dr. and Mrs. Ralph Swetman in Oswego, New York. Dr. Swetman, formerly president of Humboldt State College, is now head of Oswego Normal School.

During his trip, which was made by train, Dr. MacGinitie traveled about 7000 miles, spent fourteen nights including New Year's Eve in a Pullman sleeper, and arrived home on New Year's Day.

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Conference Rules For Entrance

In a message to the Executive Committee of the Associated Students of Humboldt State College, Director of Athletics Herbert L. Hart explained the proper procedure for entering the Far Western Conference. The procedure is as follows:

1. Faculty and student body approval to make formal application.

2. Presentation of application at the next regular meeting of the Far Western Conference in May.

Coach Hart also indicated that if the application is accepted it would probably be too late to schedule the necessary football games to permit competition for Conference championship. Therefore, it would probably be January 1, 1941 before Humboldt State College could become a member of the Far Western Conference in full standing.

Continued from page one must have played four Conference teams and a minimum of seven conference games. As more members are added to the Conference the regulations may be changed to fit the membership according to Conference representatives.

The Far Western Conference allows junior college transfers, having played one or two years of J. C. competition, to have three years of varsity competition at the college to which he transfers. Should Humboldt enter the Conference, freshmen would be allowed four years of Varsity competition, stated Conference members. The freshman rule privilege is granted Chico State and Cal Aggies because of their small enrollment. Other important rules of the Conference is the regulation of beginning organized football practice on Sept. 10 or after, and that athletes meet the scholarship standard of eleven units of passing work, and a student transferring from a four year college must be in residence a year before he is eligible to compete.

Among the many benefits gained by joining the Conference are greater development of friendly relationships between member institutions, facilitating the scheduling of various athletic contests, Conference championships, added prestige and press publicity for the member institution, interpretation of eligibility and various collegiate problems, and group legislation, stated both Coach Herbert L. Hart and Coach Harry E. Griffith. (The Far Western Conference members also encourage debating, dramatics, and scholarship ratings within member institutions.)

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Basketball Squad To Play Chico

The Humboldt State basketball squad, including Coach Harry Griffith and eight varsity players, will journey to Chico on Thursday, January 11. There they will play Chico State one of the toughest teams on Humboldt's schedule, on the nights of January 12 and 13.

Chico has an impressive record to date with nine games won and three defeats. In the recent tournament which Humboldt attended at San Jose, Chico won all of her games except one and carried off highest defensive honors. Their use of a tight zone defense makes Chico a hard team to score against.

Humboldt has been improving rapidly since the first of the season and will no doubt make an excellent showing against the Chico five. Humboldt's ability was demonstrated in its second game against Southern Oregon Normal here. The exhibition proved that the Humboldt boys have plenty of fight as well as aggressiveness.

2. By subsequent action of the faculty a regular student who attends summer school shall have his summer record averaged in with his record for the preceding semester to determine his status for the ensuing semester.

This addition to the original regulations makes it possible for a student say in the spring whose index is low to come to summer school and bring up his average so as to be eligible for participation in extra-curricular activities in the fall.
