APPROPRIATION BILL GOES TO LEGISLATURE

The appropriations, which President Arthur S. Gist requested for Humboldt State College, have been approved by the Department of Education and the Department of Finance, and the bill will go to the legislature in January to be voted upon, according to President Gist.

The appropriation request includes land for additional tennis courts, \$13,750; land for industrial arts building, \$12,500; land for play space, \$20,000; athletic field, \$55,000; completing and improving parking area \$5,200; construction of an industrial arts building \$90,000; and a library and science building \$180,000.

Tenor Soloist In Bach Oratorio A Concert Artist

J. Henry Welton, thirteen years professor of music at College of Pacific and Stockton Junior College, will be tenor soloist in the presentation of Bach's Christmas Oratorio at Humboldt State College on November 18.

Welton has appeared as soloist in the Messiah and other oratorios previously. Before coming to California, he was in Chicago as a concert artist. He spent ten years touring the United States and Canada singing light opera and concert. In Chicago, Welton was soloist at the Sixteenth Church of Christ Scientist, and the Hinsdale Union Church. He appeared in Orchestra Hall as soloist with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra under the direction of Frederic Stock. In that city, he was also soloist for the Messiah and other oratorio performances.

Welton received most of his training at Northwestern University, where he studied voice with Allen Stults. He also studied with Herman Devries and Theodore Harrison of Chicago, and Edmund J. Myer of Los Angeles.

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EVERYTHING TO WEAR

Humboldt to Offer Hatchery Biology

Zoology 53, Hatchery Biology, will be offered next semester, with three units credit, according to Dr. William Lanphere. This course includes classification of fish diseases, handling of fish eggs and small trout, and the cleaning of troughs. Fish eggs, to be received from the state, will be secured in time for hatching before the spring semester.

The 10,000 fish cared for last year were planted in Little River at the end of the spring semester. The fish were about three inches long.

This course would be very helpful for anyone interested in a job in a private or state owned hatchery, Dr. Lanphere stated. There are a great many private hatcheries springing up, and through Civil Service Examinations, conducted by the state, a student could secure a state position. For anyone interested in specializing in hatchery work, this course provides an excellent foundation upon which continuation at a specialized school could be based. Although this course may lead to a vocation, it is not an easy class, warned Dr. Lanphere.

Slides by Graves In Unique Catalogue

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Leaf "Etchings" Mute Evidence Overcoats Not Needed In Olden Days

Claus Sabertooth, while "hoofing" it from Trinity County through Humboldt County was nearly overcome by the oppressive, damp, heat and had a great deal of difficulty in forcing his way through swamps. His progress was also frequently retarded when he had to give up his task of "brush-cutting" to run to the nearest tree for protection from a vicious primitive horse.

No, he wasn't dreaming, and you, dear readers, are not seeing things. Although we have no record of Claus' trek across the country, forty or fifty million years ago, Humboldt County actually was sub-tropical and contained sub-tropical plants, swamp sypruses and trees such as are now found in the southwestern states, in Central and Southern Mexico, and along the Gulf Coast. What is now dry land along Humboldt coast was then partly under water which was as warm as seventy-five or eighty degrees and in which many corals were growing.

Dr. Harry MacGinitie, who has carried on extended research in this part of the country, spent the summer of 1939 in Mexico, where he found living counterparts of these forms and where he studied living species of previously discovered fossils from the same deposit.

This study was made in connection with the work that he has been commissioned to do by the Carnegie Institute. Dr. MacGinitie, professor of science at Humboldt State College, and a distinguished paleo-botanist, has been selected, financed, and sponsored by the

"DOCTORS" IN COLLEGE NOT DOCTORS TO HIM

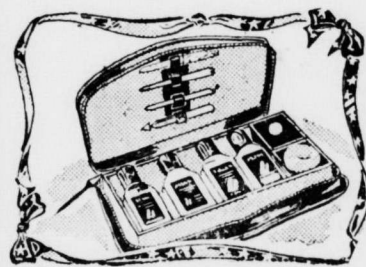
A student working for Dr. William Lanphere was taking the side-racks off Lanphere's truck when Robert, the little neighbor boy, came along.
