Prize To Be Given To Heaviest Couple At The Barn Dance

Farmers and Farmerettes from all parts of Humboldt State College will assemble at the Old Barn Dance to be given Friday, April 26, by the Men's Association at Humboldt's athletic "barn."

Prizes will be awarded for the most appropriate costume, the screwiest costume, and for the best looking couple. Anyone is eligible to compete and everyone is urged to dress for the prizes. There will also be a door prize for the heaviest couple. All weights will be checked on a delicately balanced freighter's scale.

General Chairman Milton Villa predicts that many alumni and old students will attend this annual affair as well as all able-bodied Humboldt State students and faculty. "This year's dance will be a bigger and better affair than ever before, and for an evening of fun and frolic I urge you to attend," Villa further states.

The featured attraction of the evening will be the Whiskerino finals when the winning chin, cheek or jaw will be rewarded by the committee of judges. A short surprise program is being planned for the dance intermission.

Only those dressed in farmer's costume or any reasonable resemblance to such a costume will be admitted. Villa asks all members of the faculty and student body to enter into the spirit of the affair. Admission of 75 cents per couple or 40 cents single, will be charged.

The doors will open promptly at 8:30, and the dance will commence at 9:00 and last until 12:00. Pedro Elmore's Corn-Huskers will furnish the rhythm and music for the various dances, among which will be the broom dance, Paul Jones, and square dance.

Villa, general chairman, is being assisted by Henry Trione. The committee in charge of decorations is headed by George Hartman and consists of Curt Wilson, Manuel Oliviera, Tom Hansen, Bill Madsen, and Glenn Goble. "Any volunteers who would care to help would be welcome," Villa said. In charge of publicity is Bill Inskip, while Ernest Caro and Red Belcher comprise the clean-up committee.

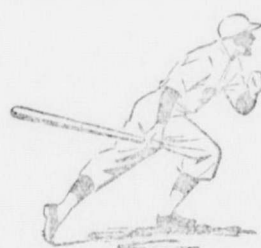
Monica Hadley At Deans' Conference

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Home Economics Taught on Through The Rural Schools and Universities

For young women interested in a career in the home economics field, teaching is one of the fields most frequently chosen. The basic training is similar to that required for other related fields, and experience as a teacher often serves as a stepping stone to employment as a home economist in industry, journalism, or health work.

In the elementary field the possibilities vary from rural schools without laboratory facilities to city systems that employ specialists to teach elementary sewing and cooking. The rural school teacher, however, who has studied home economics may find an opportunity to include food studies and sewing projects in her program, or to assist in home economics projects of 4H clubs, the Grange, or other community groups.

In the junior high and secondary school, most of the home economics work is handled by specialists who may also be called upon to handle the school cafeteria.

Subjects taught frequently include food studies, household management, hygiene, and home nursing or lunch room.

These positions afford valuable experience and those interested in this type of work find it highly enjoyable.

At the college level, there is often opportunity for research and the subjects taught are usually more specialized. High school and college teachers may aspire to become supervisors in city or state school system to fill teacher training positions, and to serve as federal agents of home economics education.

Beginning salaries in this field are good, contacts are pleasant, and the work is pleasant.

Training requirements vary, but for less specialized positions, training is essential in both foods and clothing lines. As the field narrows, specialization in intensified. Personality plays an important part in the success of the home economics teacher, good grooming is essential, and courtesy and poise are expected. The home economics teacher has a greater opportunity to "sell" the school to the community than do teachers in more academic fields. By the tangible results which she is able to produce and by her contacts with the community she may go far forward justifying in the minds of tax-conscious citizens the so-called "frills" in the curriculum.

Closely related to the teaching of home economics is the work of home demonstration agents, leaders of junior extension work, leaders of girls' club work and specialists in nutrition, infant and child care, health work, clothing, textiles and home management. These agents usually are hired from funds provided jointly by the Federal, State, and County governments.

Home demonstration work has to do with building up higher standards of home managements, dispensing information regarding nutrition, preparation and pres-

ervation of foods and similar lines of work. It is work that introduces the social service element with emphasis upon living problems of the community. It requires a sympathetic understanding, tact and friendliness, an interest in people and their problems, and at the same time, a personal philosophy of optimism if one is not to be depressed by the social problems that appear.

Training for work of this character is much the same as for other lines of home economics work with additional courses in the social field, psychology and education.

The newly equipped home economics laboratory at Humboldt State College is making possible extension of work in this field to provide elementary and junior high school teachers with training in this field. The liberal arts major in home economics which is now to be included in our offerings will provide the basic training in home economics necessary for work in related fields.

Nick Barbieri and Lee Flink went good in the weight events. Nick placed second in the shot put and Lee took second in the javelin.

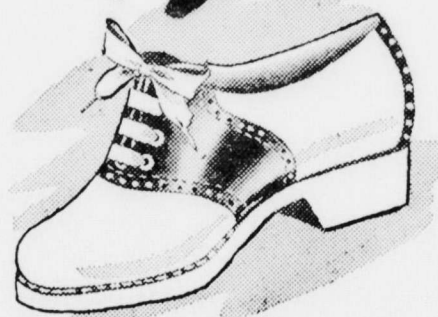
Mel Eskelson took a third place in the 440-yard dash and ran a nice race. Mel should do all right in the meet at Chico.

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Emenegger Now Selling Advertising For Humor Magazine At Missouri

Keith Emenegger, who is now attending the School of Journalism at the University of Missouri, writes that he likes the school, the faculty, the students and the climate, although he said that he missed the ocean and the clear streams of Humboldt County.

Emenegger entered the University of Missouri the second semester of the present school year, with advanced standing from Humboldt State. He will graduate from the School of Journalism a year from June, after spending a year and a half there.

The School of Journalism, Emenegger wrote, had just held a short-course in press photography, with the courses being taught by experts from Missouri and surrounding states. He is also looking forward to the annual journalism week in May when distinguished newspaper men from all over the United States and even from foreign countries come to the School of Journalism for a week of intensive lectures and discussions.

He has been selling advertising for the "Showme," the monthly humor magazine published by certain journalism students. The magazine runs to thirty-two pages, carries national advertising, has a circulation of over a thousand copies and has a staff of some twenty-five.

"The instructors here in the School of Journalism certainly know their business. Mr. Johnson of the department of advertising tells me that he receives four or five letters monthly asking for people who want to work in the field of advertising. According to him, these are pretty good jobs. That at least shows that the newspaper business isn't too bad," Emenegger said in one part of his letter.

Emenegger writes that he has found the people friendly and that he has made some very pleasant acquaintances. At the boarding house where he lives, there are some fifteen young men, all of whom are either upper-classmen or graduate students. They are from Colorado, Oklahoma, Kansas, Michigan, Massachusetts, New York and all sec-

tions of Missouri.

While at Humboldt, in addition to participating in other activities, Emenegger was business manager of the Lumberjack. He later took a position on the advertising staff of the Standard in Eureka. Deciding to attend the Missouri journalism school and specialize in advertising, Emenegger returned to Humboldt for last semester to take courses in literature and science required for entrance to the School of Journalism.
