Jeffers To Return To Humboldt State As Music Director

According to a telegram received Monday by President Arthur S. Gist, Edmund V. Jeffers will return to Humboldt State next fall to resume his position as associate professor of music. During his two year leave of absence from Humboldt Jeffers has been attending Columbia University in New York. He will soon receive his doctor's degree from that university.

Jeffers attained the distinction of being an honor student at Columbia. According to word received here, he has shown a lot of ability in organizing musical activities in which he is continually being called upon to present numbers. President Arthur Gist attended an educational dinner at Columbia last summer in which there were some vocal numbers presented by a group of men students under Jeffers' direction.

THREE H.S.C. MEN WIN HONOR SWEATERS

Clubs To Consider Probation Problem

At a recent meeting the Executive Council of Humboldt State College passed a resolution to recommend to all campus organizations that, effective September 1, 1940 they adopt a policy of declaring ineligible any candidate running for office or as a delegate to a conference who is on probation at the time of election. The resolution in whole follows:

"Whereas students who are on probation should limit their activity program and should devote their time chiefly to raising their scholarship average:

"Whereas the successful performance of duty as an officer of any student organization on the campus entails a great deal of work; and

"Whereas holding an office in any campus organization implies an honor which should be reserved only for those whose scholarship index is satisfactory

"Resolved that Executive Council of Humboldt State College go on record as recommending to all campus organizations that, effective September 1, 1940 they adopt the policy—either by amendment to their constitutions or otherwise—of declaring ineligible any candidate running for office or as a delegate to a conference who is on probation at the time of election."

SAUNDERSON PLAYS IN TWO SPORTS

Frank Saunderson who is a junior at Humboldt State won his honor sweater by competing in basketball and football. Frank won three letters in each of these sports and has one more year of competition left in football.

He is majoring in Physical Education.

B. BOEHNE LEADER OF SEVERAL GROUPS

Members of the cast include Bill Inskip as "Rufe"; Sadie Crnich, "Emmy"; Warren Elmore, "Ma Cagle"; Richard Jarboe, "Pap Todd"; Pedro Elmore, "Bud"; Rod Belcher, The Sheriff; Shelton Reaume, The Preacher. The part of the Stranger is still undecided.

"Sun-Up" was written by Lula Vollmer and was inspired by a remark of a hillbilly, who, when drafted for the first World War, and brought to the city of Asheville for registering, naively asked if that was France. The whole plot was taken from the actual life of the mountains and its people.

In the part of "Rufe" a connection can be seen with Sergeant Alvin York, hero of the A. E. F.

The popularity of this play, according to Mr. Hoppe, is shown in Kenneth MacGowan's "Footlights Across America," where he gives a summary of the plays produced by the Little Theatre groups of the country. He says:

"I have tried to analyze the plays by listing the best and most popular playwrights, necessarily ignoring much good material. The outstanding fact is that 'Sun-Up' leads the list and that two playwrights with only one play each to their credit are close to the top. Making several trips to New York, he has seen nearly all the recent Broadway hits.

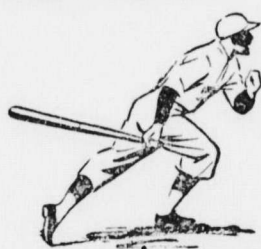

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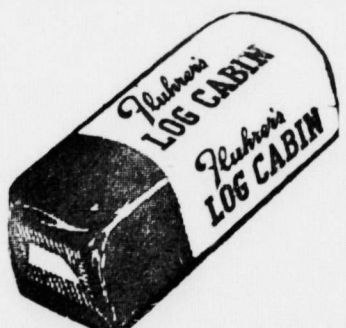
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After suffering a set-back due to the depression, organized recreation is again coming to the foreground with expansion that means jobs for recreation leaders. The wise use of leisure time and as a constructive weapon against crime are two objectives of the recreation program that motivate community action which has been spurred by assistance offered by the Federal government. The construction of new playgrounds, swimming pools, parks and community centers has necessitated employment of trained supervisors, so that whereas in 1930 there were approximately 25,000 persons engaged in recreational work, that number has increased to 50,000 persons.

Although the impetus for expansion has come largely through the WPA, supervisors employed by that agency are not necessarily chosen from the ranks of the unemployed, and it is the policy of the WPA to withdraw from a project as soon as community agencies are ready to assume full control and responsibility. WPA officials in California are meeting with success in their efforts to combine the school and community physical education and recreation programs with the results that new and good positions are opening up for this type of work.

The recreation leader is more than a physical education instructor. Recreation has expanded to include not only playground activities, organized games and sports, but also handicrafts, playground, pageants, dramatics, and musical activities as well. Students looking forward to employment in this field should take not only the physical education program, and health studies, but also some work in these other recreation fields.

The playground director must be strong physically, fond of games and athletics, and have a liking for children. New York and Chicago children recently reported in questionnaires that kindness was the quality most admired in their leaders, with ab-

ility to play games as second. His work differs somewhat from that of the physical education teacher because he must organize other types of recreational activity. His work is seasonal in most sections of the country, and for that reason the combination of physical education director in the schools and playground director in the community during the summer works out advantageously for both the individual and the community.

Salaries for the playground leader may start at from \$15.00 to \$25.00 per week, or as high as \$40.00 per week in larger cities. Although the financial rewards are not great, this is one field that has a definite future, and makes a constructive contribution to the community and the nation that brings much satisfaction to those engaged in recreation work.

At Humboldt State College, an excellent opportunity exists for securing broad and thorough training in physical education with supplementary training in crafts, music, and dramatics. Students interested in possible employment in the field should confer with the physical education department, as to desirable courses, or information concerning local activities wherein experience might be gained.

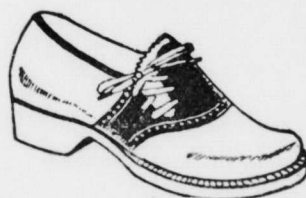

The discussion groups are open to anyone desiring to attend.

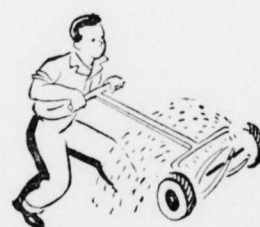
