WAVES, WAACS DISCUSSED AT AWS FORUM

Mrs. Monica Hadley, dean of women, presided at the forum sponsored last Thursday morning by the Associated Women Students of Humboldt State College on the subject of "College Women and the War." Since our college men are asked to give up so much, Mrs. Hadley pointed out, college women should be glad to do what they can to aid the war effort.

Appearing on the platform were Mrs. James Hunter, who discussed nursing and related fields, Miss Sarah Davies, who talked on enlistment in the WAACS, Mrs. Helen Everett, whose subject was the industrial field, and Mrs. Hadley, who discussed enlistment in the WAVES.

THE NURSING FIELD

Mrs. Hunter stressed the fact that everyone should learn to take care of himself nowadays because of the shortage of doctors and nurses, and in doing this the subjects of first aid and home nursing would be valuable. In preparing themselves for nursing, girls should take those courses which will give them a good background for their three year training period in a hospital (hospitals have not shortened the required time of training because of the war). Although nursing is not as highly paid a field as defense work, Mrs. Hunter recommended it because nurses will be doing a real service for their country, and because they will have the training for a good job by the time the war is over.

Mrs. Hunter also told of the other fields connected with nursing, such as vocational therapy, there will be need for refitting men disabled by the war with suitable jobs.

THE WAACS

Miss Davies stated that by the end of next year girls will be called upon to do some special job for the war effort, and that now while the opportunity is here, girls should take the courses that will fit them for the greatest service. Those desiring to join the WAACS may take courses such as shorthand, typing, business machines, radio work and telephone work.

Mrs. Everett in her talk on the industrial field said that because of the shortage of man power college women may be called upon to work in industrial plants. Because of the teacher shortage, married women who have teaching credentials may be called back to teach, while the college women go into industrial work. Again the point was stressed that girls should be prepared when they are called

Student President Reports On Recent NSFA Conference

Student Body President Clarke Nellist, recently returned from the National Students Federated Association regional conference, brings back the following information concerning colleges and the war effort.

The students of America are getting behind the war effort to the fullest extent possible. They are cutting expenses--costly entertainment, name bands, off-campus activities. Officers training is carried out in reserve programs. Physical fitness courses are being offered. War bonds and stamps are plugged, blood donated.

As an example, one college, the University of San Francisco with an enrollment of 700 has bought \$232,000 in war bonds since January.

Considering size, wealth, and location, Humboldt State is doing as much to further the war effort as any college on the Pacific Coast. Cited at Humboldt are the reserve programs, commando class, rifle club, observation post, and the large percentage of students who have part time employment.

President Nellist will give a report on the conference at the Student Body meeting, Thursday. This presentation will be of special interest to the men.

The main idea brought out in this forum was the girls should make the best use of their college opportunities, and should prepare themselves to help in the war and for rebuilding after the war.

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The Humboldt Lumberjack strives at all times to serve the best interests of Humboldt State College, without favoritism or partiality to any group or individuals within or outside of the college. Editorials express only the views of the writer, and not necessarily those of the editor, the Associated Students or the College Administration.

In several of its issues this semester the Lumberjack has been guilty of fostering a misunderstanding in Humboldt's student government; in brief, we have referred to the president and secretary of the Associated Students as members of the Board of Control. This is incorrect.

Article II, section I of the constitution of the Associated Students of Humboldt State College reads as follows: "The elective officers of the Association shall be: President, Vice-president, Secretary, Treasurer, and members of the Board of Control."

Article III, section I goes on to state: "The executive Council shall consist of the President of the Associated Students, who shall act as presiding officer of the Executive Council; the Vice-president; the Secretary, who shall act as Secretary of the

Executive Council; the Treasurer; the Members of the Board of Control; and the Faculty Adviser appointed by the President of the College."

Section 2 of the same article reads: "The Board of Control shall consist of seven members: three men, three women, and the Vice-president of the Associated Students. In addition, the President of the Freshman class shall be an ex-officio member of the Board of Control."

The Board of Control and Executive Council also have their separate functions: the Council has power to make appointments, has charge of the Association's elections, makes out the financial budget for the year and presents it to the Associated Students; exercises general supervision and control over the finances of the student body, subject to the approval of the college administration; and exercises general authority over all Association affairs not specifically covered in the constitution.

The Board of Control, on the other hand has as its duties the enforcement of college traditions and the student pledge; jurisdiction over matters involving student conduct; passing on bids to dance, and passing on names recom-

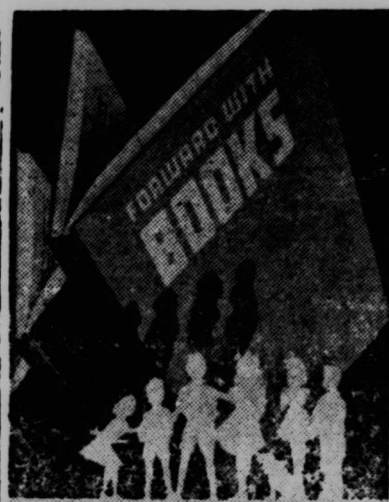

Commando Drills In Full Swing At State College

Continuing to serve the needs of the community, as well as the requirements set up by the Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, the physical education department of Humboldt State College has incorporated the Commando physical fitness program in the curriculum at the College. A class actually designed as a Commando Class is held every afternoon and every physical education class also emphasizes the commando program.

This Commando Program stresses the development of agility, strength, coordination, endurance, and power as required by the men in the Armed Forces thru the participation in a large number of activities such as combative games, gymnastics, boxing, wrestling, calisthenics. The military track which is now under construction around the athletic stadium under the direction of Fred Ogilwy, Superintendent of Grounds, is styled after the military track which is used at the St. Mary's Pre-Flight School.

TESTS

At various intervals tests are given to see whether or not the men are able to pass the requirements set up by the Army, Navy, and the Marines and also to show the progress made by each individual.

Humboldt State College has ideal facilities for the developing of the obstacle course or track which includes woods, streams, and embankments. In the obstacle track itself are found high walls to scale, bank to hurdle, fox holes, tunnels, overhead ladders, balance rail, tank trap, pyramid ladder, a maxe, and pits, and many other obstacles.

REQUIREMENT

Next semester all men students will be required to take one period of physical education per day in the Commando work and may take additional elective courses in tennis, badminton, and other P. E. courses if they so desire. All women students will be required to take two hours of physical education per week, also beginning next semester.

The entire Commando program is under the supervision of Marty Mathiesen of the department of physical education for men at Humboldt State College.

There will be a student body meeting tomorrow (Thursday) at 11 A. M. in the auditorium. All students should come and exercise their right to democratic student government.
