Actors are having individual conferences with director Don Karshner on their lines, and after Sunday's rehearsal the cast went over the first two acts with the idea of smoothing up the rough edges in their interpretations.

### Five Programs Scheduled At Humboldt This Year

The Humboldt College Players, under the direction of Mr. Don Karshner, together with the college music department, headed by Dr. Edmund Jeffers and Charles Fulkerson, have announced a series of five programs to be presented during the 1942-1943 term. The events in order of presentation are: a play, "Heart of a City;" Christmas music; an evening of short plays; the student show; and the spring music concert.

"Heart of a City," set for November 19 and 20, is a story set in London during the present war. It can be compared to "Mrs. Miniver" in timeliness humor, pathos

and courage. Its performance will be the first on the Pacific Coast. The Christmas Music, December 13, will feature the Elizabethan Singers, A Cappella Choir, Chorus, Orchestra, and Brass Choir.

An evening of short plays, early in February, promises to be an event of unusual interest for lovers of contemporary works.

The Students Show is written and produced entirely by students, and its date is April 13, 14, 15. Work on it has already been started.

The Spring Music Concert on May 16, will be along patriotic lines, featuring "I Hear America Singing."

## Bell's Biography Of A Humboldt State Athlete

In order to acquaint the members of the Student Body with this years basketball team, we are going to give a brief review of one of the players life in each edition. This week we are starting with Darrel Brown.

Darrel was born on March 14, 1923 at Saint Joseph's Hospital in Eureka. He was christened Darrel Keith Brown.

While at Eureka High School, Darrel was active in both basketball and track. In basketball he played guard and in track he won his letter for his high jumping and pole-vaulting ability. He graduated from Eureka in June 1940 and remained out of school until January 1941 when he registered at Humboldt.

Darrel is one of the four returning lettermen that will play for the Lumberjacks this year. He is also a member of the Navy's V-1 program.

For those students who do not know him, he is over six feet tall, has light brown hair, and is not bad to look at-not bad at all. Whats more kids he's still available.

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## BULLETIN FROM NAVY RECEIVED ON V PROGRAM

The following communication has been received from the office of Naval Procurement concerning the V-Programs:

A student will be considered as "not in good standing" if he fails at the end of an academic term, quarter, or semester to maintain normal progress, (i. e. to maintain the scholastic average required by his institution for the conferment of the baccalaureate degree) even if the institution is willing to allow the student to continue "on probation." (C average here.)

Waivers of physical, educational or other requirements will not be considered. The minimum weight and height requirements must be adhered to rigidly.

Attention is invited to the fact that a student having a police record of any kind, including traffic violations, must furnish a complete statement concerning this record before he can be enlisted.

If trigonometry has not been taken in secondary school, it may be included in part of the requirement for one year of college mathematics. (Trig and 3 more units, minimum.)

College juniors and seniors who are pre-medical or pre-dental students are eligible for enlistment in class V-1 (Accredited College Program). Juniors and seniors who are taking pre-medical or pre-dental courses may as an alternative, if qualified, and if they so desire, enlist in Class V-7 (C) or V-7 (S) as candidates for deck, engineering or special service commissions. If such students are later accepted by a Class A medical school, and make application for appointment as Ensign, H-V (P), and their applications are approved by the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery, their enlistment in Class V-1 or Class V-7 will be terminated.

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## Mirrorphone Group For Orientation Class Students

Mr. Don Karshner, head of the Humboldt State College speech department, has recently organized a Mirrorphone group of ten students from Mr. Francis Drag's Orientation II class. Mr. Karshner spoke to the class about the importance of speech in teaching and asked all those who were interested in joining a group to correct vocal defects to give him their names.

Approximately ten students from the class are now in the group, and Peter Schmitt is Mr. Karshner's student assistant. The group is divided into two's and three's and they meet with Mr. Karshner on specified dates. The students read poetry or newspaper items before the microphone and also carry on a normal conversation. The Mirrorphone then plays back the conversation, thus exposing any defects in the speech of the speaker.

Next semester Mr. Karshner plans to have his speech clinic, and wishes to enroll all the Mirrorphone students with slight difficulties in speech. This clinic is to help correct any minor physical deformity which causes difficulty in speaking.

We are anticipating accepting a February class in our School of Nursing. If you have students who are prepared and who are interested in making application we would be very glad to receive their applications.

We have accepted but one class a year during the last ten years. However, due to the tremendous need for nurses to carry on through the present emergency and because of the need to release more and more graduate nurses for military service, we are urged to accept at least two classes a year.

We have not made any change in our entrance requirements, which is one year minimum college preparation in special pre-nursing courses.

We are enclosing our bulletin outlining such a course.
