

Council Slashes Budget To Eliminate \$600 Deficit; Submits New Allotments

With the books of the Associated Students showing the amount of six hundred dollars on the wrong side of the ledger, the Executive Council completed last week their re-vision of the student body budget. On January 7th, the council submitted the new budget the departments concerned, with the following statement: (quote)

"To date our budget faces an actual deficit of \$600. Since it would be unwise to expect to make up this deficit out of the receipts of the spring semester, the Executive Council has passed a resolution pro-rating this deficit ing to their original appropriations in the budget.



Seven Humboldt Cootballers were honored with positions on the mythical All-Far-Western Conference teams recently.


Bill Lee, quarterback, and Harvey Del Fatti, tackle, were selected on the first team for their outstanding work at those positions.
