### REGISTRATION WILL BEGIN JANUARY 26

Registration for the Spring semester of 1942 will begin Monday, January 26. The English tests will be given on Monday at 9 a. m., and the College Aptitude Test will be given Monday afternoon at 2 p. m.

### Council Slashes Budget To Eliminate \$600 Deficit; Submits New Allotments

With the books of the Associated Students showing the amount of six hundred dollars on the wrong side of the ledger, the Executive Council completed last week their re-vision of the student body budget. On January 7th, the council submitted the new budget to the departments concerned, with the following statement: (quote)

"To date our budget faces an actual deficit of \$600. Since it would be unwise to expect to make up this deficit out of the receipts of the spring semester, the Executive Council has passed a resolution pro-rating this deficit to the various departments according to their original appropriations in the budget.

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## Dean Of Men Asks College Men To Stay In School; Reports Army Asks It Too

(Ed note:

Mr. George Murphy, Dean of Men at Humboldt State, interviewed many army officers and men in the service during the recent Christmas holidays. His message is directed at the bewildered student—the student who debates between a war job and college. Mr. Murphy's statement speaks for itself.)

"Tell your students that the BEST WAY they can help their country right now is to STAY IN SCHOOL."

President Roosevelt says that; army men say it and we say it.

No, of course you don't have to pay any attention to what President Roosevelt or the army men or we say. That's one of the beauties of a Democracy. You can still say, "Nuts to President Roosevelt, the army and schoolpappies; I'm agoin', maw." And the FBI won't get you.

But think, Brother; think before you quit.

Think of the length of time the war may last; think, too, of the length of time you will be living AFTER the war. Think of the kind of work you will be trained for if you quit to get into production of war supplies, and think of the kind of training you will need for the job you will have after the war is over. Go ahead dream of the high wages you may get; but dream too, about effect of those wages on you.

#### WON'T IT?

Those high wages will undoubtedly be spent in paying high board bills, buying clothes (Maury Ayala can advise you) a radio, a car—And then suddenly the war will be over and you won't have any job or money. So your clothes will go unpressed; your radio will be sold for a couple of dollars (you'll buy overalls) and your car will revert to the finance company. And you will be DISSATISFIED with everything—maybe even LIFE. There have been people like that.

Sure we're painting it black—but don't say we didn't tell you.

We feel pretty bad when boys like Jake come around. Jake stopped in to tell us that he was quitting to go "down below" where he could work for big money. We tried to tell Jake what he was letting himself in for. "Ah, I'm flunkin' anyhow," he said. "Well," we said, "many people flunk the first semester, and still they get through college." "Besides," we said, "are you going to quit every time the going gets a bit rough?"

#### AN OLD STORY

Then Jake pulled the old one about coming back later. He said

that his mother wanted him to go through college but the REAL reason he wanted to go, he said, was to get away from home and have himself some excitement.

#### KIDDING HIMSELF

So here was Jake kidding himself and everyone who would listen to him. He seemed to be patriotic, but he wasn't. He was just plain selfish. He wanted some excitement for HIMSELF. It made no difference to him that President Roosevelt has told us that the BEST way to win this war is to keep cool, live as we have been living as long as we can, plan for the future (and where can you do that better than in school?) and cooperate with civil and military authorities.

#### ANYWAY

Maybe we're selfish too. Maybe we're just preaching so that we can have some company when, comes February, we get our crutches and hobble over to Eureka to tell Uncle Sam that if he needs a broken-down potato peeler or a has-been hobo, by cracky here's one.

How about it, Buddy, can you spare the time?

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## NEW COURSES PLANNED FOR SPRING SEMESTER

New courses to be offered next semester at Humboldt State include:

**Radio Production**, a new course offered by Mr. Donald Karshner, will be the "laboring" end of the new H.S.C. radio shows, to be released through KIEM next semester. This class is upper-division, and will provide training in script writing, dramatic presentation and the preparation of radio programs.

**Child Care and Training**, a three unit course taught by Mrs. Ellen Walters, is a course designed to study the development of the child from the prenatal period and birth through the pre-school age. The prerequisite is Ed. III (Growth and Development of Child) but this may be taken concurrently.

**Clothing Design and Textile** may be taken for either two or three units, and is a course recommended for all girls especially commercial students. This course covers what to wear, and when to wear it, with emphasis on the clothing budget.

### METAL ARTS AGAIN

Metal Arts will be offered again by "Pop" Jenkins, and due to the national shortage of certain metals, metal spinning will be covered during the course. Metal Arts is the application and use of various metals, including hammering of copper, grinding of stones, casting, silver plating, soldering, and enameling. Three units.

### FIRST AID IMPORTANT

A number of first aid classes will be offered by Coach Hoos, in line with the present war preparedness program. Every student is urged to take one class of first aid, for this information is not only valuable in this critical period, but, as there is an increase in automobile accidents, everyone should have some instruction as to the proper procedure in event of an accident.

### NEW ECON COURSE

A new course in World Resources and World Population (Economics 196) will be offered by Dr. Homer Balabanis during the spring semester. The course will carry three semester hours of credit.

## Faculty Committee Planning Special Defense Courses

Women students at Humboldt State will all be given an opportunity to participate in important defense work while continuing their studies in college, according to Mrs. Monica Hadley, dean of women.

Mrs. Hadley heads a faculty committee composed of Mrs. Stella Little, Mrs. Ellen Walter, Mrs. Alice Griffith, and Miss Helen Garvin. They have been working on the organization of various projects, so that every college woman will be able to take a part in at least one project by the beginning of the spring semester.

First of the various projects is Sewing, with Mrs. Walter as sponsor, assisted by Mrs. Vernon Tolle. Headquarters for materials and instructions will be in the Home Economics room at the College Elementary School. Articles to be made include: Boy's and men's hospital pajamas, girls' and women's nightgowns, besides, surgical gowns, operation gowns, pneumonia jackets, wool and cotton dresses, wool skirts, and part-wool shirts for boys.

After San Jose, Humboldt will tackle Chico State in the Humboldt gym on Jan. 30 and 31.

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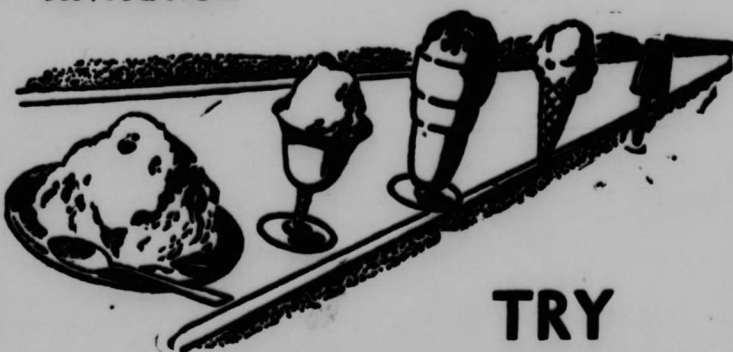
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
