### FACULTY SLATES CHANGE IN PROCEDURE

A radical departure from established procedures has been approved by the faculty to take effect this semester. The change has to do with adding and dropping courses, and provides that no program changes may be made after the fourth week of the semester. (In this case, after February 20th.)

This means that for students who remain in college, there will be no more grades of "W." All courses for which the student is registered on February 21st will appear on his final report card with either a passing or a failing grade.

### Choral Group To Sing For Principals In San Francisco

Humboldt State's A Cappella Choir will leave Saturday for San Francisco. The choir will sing in the Congregational Church of the city for the National Association of School Principals, under the direction of Mr. Edmund Jeffers.

This will mark the biggest occasion for which the choir has ever sung. The three day trip ending February 23 will be made in one of the Humboldt Motor Stages.

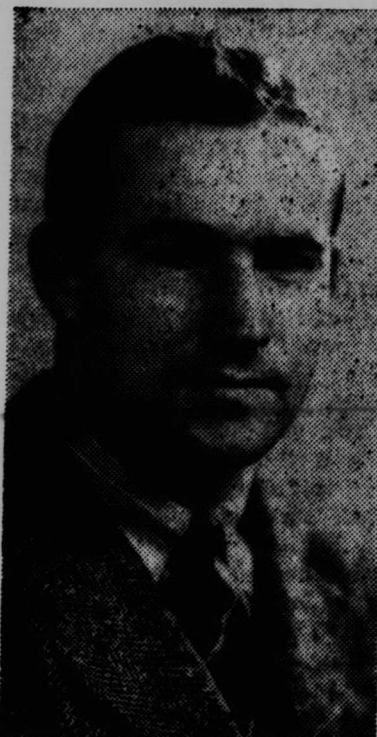

grams are correct. Registrations are listed in two places: on the pink office program card filed in the office of the Registrar, and on the green enrollment card in the hands of the instructor.

To drop a course, it is essential to get the course card from the instructor and return it to the Registrar after it has been signed by his adviser. It will then be erased from the office program card to complete the process. Similarly, to add a course it is necessary to register it on the pink office card, and to present to the instructor and green enrollment card.

### "F" HENCEFORTH

If a student is not now attending any class for which he has heretofore registered he must be sure that the green card has been obtained from the instructor, and filed in due form with the Registrar. Any undropped courses will of necessity be recorded with grades of "F."

To avoid injustice, the faculty has provided that in dire emergencies a student who is forced to drop part of his work may present his case to the scholarship committee for special consideration.

## Two Overtimes Needed As Locals Win Second

In as wild and rough a basketball game as Humboldt ever participated in, the Lumberjacks eked out a thrilling 52-50 victory in two overtime periods over Chico State's five Saturday night to break even in the series on the Wildcat court. Chico took the first game 49-34.

After looking rather sloppy in dropping the first contest, the Lumberjacks came out the second night full of fire and built up a seven-point lead at half. They increased this margin to 12 points in the early part of the final period, but then the Wildcats started hitting.

GAME ENDS IN TIE

Pete Timone threw a series of long one-hand shots; Dick Copland also contributed several buckets, and in no time at all the score was tied. Timone sank a free throw to put the 'Cats in the lead with about two minutes to go, but then Billy Lee made a short shot to reverse things. With less than a minute to go, Maury Ayala fouled Copland as he was shooting, and the Chico captain made one of them good to knot the count. The game ended without further scoring at 42-42.

TWO OVERTIME PERIODS

In the first overtime, each team got eight points in a wild display of what was very near football. Humboldt was one point behind with 11 seconds to go when Ayala and Timone got into a double foul. Ayala coolly sank his to tie the score, then Timone missed his and the game went into the second overtime, with the score 50-50.

Humboldt controlled the ball nearly three-fourths of the time in the second overtime period, playing safe and not shooting freely. Finally, with about a minute to go, Serge Stashuk, who replaced Ayala when the latter fouled out, broke clear, took a pass from Del

Goodyear, and tanked a one-hander that was to spell victory for the Lumberjacks. Chico could not score, and the long-drawn-out battle finally ended.

26 POINTS AGAIN

Billy Lee piled up 26 points during the contest, 23 of them in the regular game period. Remainder of the Humboldt points were scattered among the other six players, all of whom played excellent ball. Del Goodyear played a remarkably consistent game at guard. His ball-handling and passing were outstanding. Darrel Brown contributed some timely baskets, and Ayala, Len Longholm, Rod Belcher and Stashuk also played fine ball.

The first night, the Lumberjacks literally "could not hit their hats" and were soundly defeated by the Wildcats. The fact that the Humboldt squad had to hitch-hike part of the way to Chico that day and arrived just in time to play the game, may have affected their showing.

Now, Humboldt has three wins and one loss in the Far Western Conference race. Chico must defeat College of Pacific in at least one game in order to enable Humboldt to take the conference title.
