REQUIREMENTS FOR DEGREES LOWERED

President Arthur Gist recently outlined changes in degree requirements caused by the current emergency situation, reducing the number of units required for a degree from 124 to 120. This is to be a minimum requirement, and may be exceeded for particular curricula.

A military service plan was also adopted. This plan provides that students who complete 15 weeks of basic military training in the Army or the equivalent in the Navy will receive six semester units of college credit. Students commissioned as ensigns or second lieutenants will receive 15 semester hours of credit. This credit will be allowed when they return to school after the term of service is completed.

Rifle Club Elects Officers

The officers of the new College Rifle Club were elected yesterday at their first regular meeting. These officers are President, Herb Christy; Field Officer, Clark Nel-list; Vice-President, Allen Rimby; Secretary, Shirley Anderson and Treasurer, Dayton Murray. Banquet Tonight Ends Volleyball; Basketball Next

The volleyball season will be wound up by a banquet given tonight by the Women's Athletic Association. An alumni team and a team chosen from the best players in the college will be feted at the banquet and a game between these two teams will precede the banquets. ENROLLMENT DECREASES 8 PER CENT

The decrease in enrollment at Humboldt State is far below the average drop in enrollment in other California colleges. There has been as much as 50 per cent less enrollment elsewhere while Humboldt is only 8 per cent below last semester, compared to 405 last Spring and 357 last Fall. There are 330 registered here at present. Out of this number over 40 per cent are men.

Humboldt is not nearly so hard hit as Fresno State for example where four hundred men were lost from a regular enrollment of slightly over one thousand.

Bill Jackson Is New Vice-President

Bill Jackson, Junior honor student was appointed vice president of the student body Monday by President Fred Slack. Jackson replaces Slack, who rose to the presidency on the resignation of Tom Hansen. The appointment was confirmed by the executive council.

Jackson is a member of Rho Sigma, Sophomore honor society. He is also a pre-commerce major.

Jack Morton, former HSC student, is now completing the final phase of his training in the Naval Air Corps Reserve at Corpus Christi.

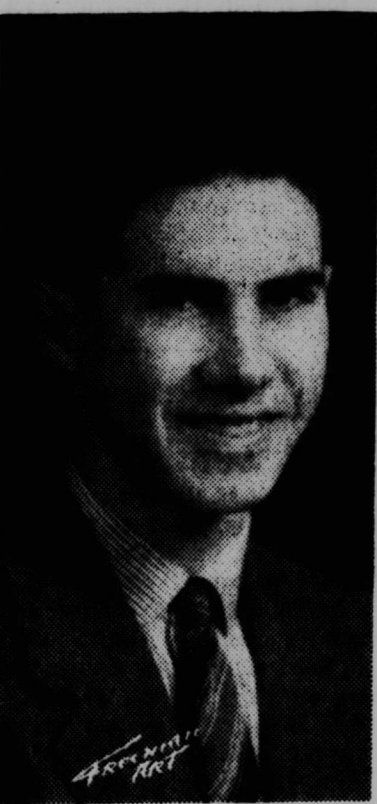
FLASH!

Community Concert Pianist Deemed Fine Interpreter

Erno Balogh, concert pianist featured in the second Community Concert of January 16th, was in my opinion the finest interpreter of piano music since Alexander Brailowsky, who appeared some years ago. Mr. Balogh actually put himself into the music. You dance with him, dream with him, and see his visions.

It was a pleasure to hear some of the old recital pieces that piano students have massacred for years rendered in artistic, polished manner; such as "Malaguena," and the Chopin "Scherzo in C Sharp Minor."

FUROR AND GUSTO

Mr. Balogh rose from the bench in the furor of his chords. He may be said to have put himself into the music, and almost into the piano; he played with such gusto.

As a composer, he goes in for the modern idiom in his harmonic structure. The American influence shows strongly in his "Dirge of the North."

SPECIAL INTEREST

Of special interest were two new arrangements of two old numbers, "Marche Militaire" of Schubert, and the Strauss "Die Fledermaus Waltz," arranged by Stephen Kovacs, a genius for re-habilitating the set mechanics of these well-known melodies.

My only criticism of the concert was the lack of variety on the program. There was an overabundance of Chopin, and a dearth of the best in piano literature. But I can only say I hope the rest of the series will be as invigorating and as appealingly artistic as this concert proved to be.

College Lib Will Aid Book Campaign

The College Library has been asked to act as representative for the college community of the Victory Book Campaign of the United Service Organizations. Although some government funds are available for the purchase of books for the camps of the military services, they are altogether insufficient for the emergency, and the U. S. O. are asking people to donate liberally from their private libraries such books as army or navy or merchant marine men might like to read.

Besides the more obvious, entertainment books, such as modern novels, mystery books and westerns, travel and popular biography, the U. S. O. can use technical books such as foreign language grammars, mathematics, including algebra and geometry, engineering, chemistry, aeronautics, photography, etc.

TURN BOOKS IN

If you will turn your books in to the College Library, they will be sent to the County Library in Eureka for cleaning and mending, and from there will be distributed to the various camps. Any books donated that are not considered suitable for use will be sold for old paper and the proceeds used to buy new books. Unbound numbers of magazines are not being solicited in this campaign. It is impossible for you to deliver the books to the library, we can arrange to call for them. Thanks in advance.

Teacher Shortage Aggravated By Enrollment Cuts

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 4—Decreased enrollment in teachers' colleges and normal schools is aggravating a serious shortage of qualified teachers, it is announced by the National Commission for the Defense of Democracy through education. The Commission points out that this teacher shortage threatens to undermine educational standards.

Enrollment in teachers' colleges and normal schools has declined on an average of 11 percent throughout the nation.

11 PER CENT INCREASE

Qualified teachers are forced to leave the classroom for defense industries to obtain income in keeping with the rising costs of living, Alonzo F. Myers, Commission chairman, states. Since the war began costs of living have gone up 11 per cent, with food up 19 per cent. During these two years, 12 million factory workers have received an increase of 30 per cent in average weekly earnings. Cash income from farm products have gone up 45 per cent. Teachers' salaries, for the most part, have remained static.

New Book Out On Paleobotany By H. D. MacGinitie

Strictly for the student of paleobotany is Harry D. MacGinitie's latest paper entitled "A Middle Eocene Flora From the Central Sierra Nevada." This is the third of a group of papers by this author and published under the sponsorship of the Carnegie Institution of Washington. Dr. MacGinitie started this paper in 1932 and has worked on it at odd moments ever since.

The publication itself is written in a very pertinent form, strictly adhering to statistics and paleobotanical data. An indication of its specialized form are the many abbreviated references and technical terms. However, Dr. MacGinitie offers a literary style much improved over previous papers; and his reference to scenery and mining districts brings a touch of lay interest to this paper.

TEN YEARS' WORK

Much of his work was done right here at Humboldt, and many of you have seen, laying around the Physics lab., many of the same plates which constitute about one fourth of the publication. This book is a very successful accumulation of knowledge from his ten years of research in this phase of his field.

A QUOTATION

For instance, Dr. MacGinitie tells us (and we quote), "Associated with these two dominants are many laurels (Nectandra, Ocotea, Persea), legumes (Cassia, Dalbergia, Erxthrina, Tonchocarpus, Pithecolofium, etc.), figs and other Moraceae, Buseraceae, Meliaceae, Sapinadaceae, Dilleniaceae, and also many shrubs belonging to the Piperaceae, Melastomaceae and Compositae."

HSC STARS

Humboldt stars were Billy Lee, who played his best basketball of the year in the series, and lanky sophomore Darrel Brown, who took over the center spot vacated by Howard Goodwin. Lee tanked 18 while Brown got 14 points. Boysen and Clark led San Jose with 13 each.

SECOND GAME

In the second game, Humboldt built up an early lead on Brown's shooting, held a 10 point advantage at half, lost the lead midway in the final period, but pulled out to win by eight points. The game was much duller than the first from a spectator standpoint, due to domination by the officials. San Jose committed 22 fouls and the Lumberjacks 15. It was Brown's scoring in the first half and Lee's in the second period, combined with several timely baskets by Ted Speier and Len Longholm, which spelled defeat for the Spartans.

Lumberjacks Take Two Thrilling Contests From Chico State Hoopsters

Coming from behind both nights in furious last-minute scoring drives, Humboldt's thrill-provoking basketball team nosed out Chico State 53-52 and 55-52 to take a commanding lead in early season Far Western Conference standing in games played Friday and Saturday nights in the college gym. The wins give Humboldt an important edge in the conference race.

ONE POINT MARGIN

Trailing five points at half in the first night's contest, Humboldt played on even terms with the Wildcats throughout most of the second half before pulling out four points ahead in the last two minutes. The invaders closed the gap to a mere point as the gun ended the battle.

LEAD SCORING

Little Billy Lee and hard-driving Len Longholm led the winning scoring thrusts with timely field goals and under-pressure free throws. Both ended up the evening with 16 points apiece. Rod Belcher played a near-perfect rebound game and contributed eight points, while Darrel Brown had nine. Timone with 15, Copland with 12 and Patton with 11 led the Wildcats.

BLACKOUT

The second contest was even more thrilling than the first, and was featured—among other things—by a non-intentional blackout early in the second half. The gym lights went out suddenly and the trouble was not remedied for twenty minutes.

Humboldt trailed seven points at half, and then—after the blackout—saw the Wildcats build up their lead to 11 points as the big electric clock showed only seven minutes left to play. Then came

the most amazing display of shooting ever seen in this section. Bill Lee and Darrel Brown took turns dumping long shots at will, helped out by an occasional basket by Rod Belcher, and Humboldt suddenly had come from a 11-point deficit to a five-point lead. Chico scored one basket in the last minute to pull up to within three points, but the Lumberjacks played keep-away for the remainder of the game.

HIGH SCORERS

Lee chalked up 22 points and Brown 17—most of them coming in the last seven minutes. Belcher's recovery work, if anything, was even better than his first night's performance, and he again got eight points.

TWO-MINUTE AYALA

The Humboldt starting lineup of Lee, Longholm, Brown, Belcher, and Ted Speier, played almost the whole of both games. One sub, Maury Ayala, was used for about two minutes in each contest.

For the Wildcats, speedy Pete Timone and Dick Copland were outstanding. It was these two that built up Chico's early leads in both games. Spanky Dison was also a main cog in the Chico attack. His passing was the best seen here this year.

Humboldt plays two more games with the Wildcats and Chico on Feb. 13 and 14.
