## United States Navy Issues Call to Humboldt Men

Washington, D. C.  
April 11, 1942.

To Humboldt State College  
Arcata, California.

America is counting upon the Nation's College Freshman and Sophomore Classes to provide future officers for the United States Navy. To this end the Navy offers your college a special plan by which Freshmen and Sophomores between the ages of 17 and 20 may enlist immediately as apprentice seamen, but at the same time can stay in college and continue their regular course at least until the end of their second college year.

We need to enlist 80,000 such men in the coming weeks, and in March of next year they will have the opportunity through classification examinations to qualify for special training for commissions as aviation, deck or engineering officers.

This special college program,

which is known as the V1 plan, is Democracy's intelligent and practicable way of meeting America's urgent need for thousands of young college trained officers without breaking down our educational system to forgetting future need for trained men for civilian life after the war is won. A committee of prominent educators has assisted in the formulation of the V1 program.

Beginning April 9 members of this committee and officers of the Navy will hold a series of regional meetings to explain the V1 plan to representatives of the colleges within each region. You are urged to send an authorized representative to your regional meeting and you may be sure that your well hearted cooperation with the entire plan will be greatly appreciated.

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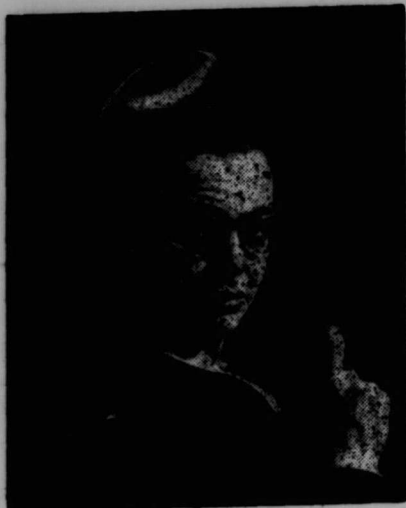

Jenkins, industrial education; Eleanor McKay Kelenberger, education; Dr. Doris Gillespie Niles, science; Nance O. Neall, education; Dr. Vernon O. Tolle, education.

Dr. Potter will teach social science. A specialized interest in the Orient culminating in a fellowship for travel and study in China and Japan has given Dr. Potter a background of knowledge and understanding for his analysis of current problems and their ultimate solution.

### GARFF WILSON BACK

Dr. Wilson will conduct his ever-popular courses in English and speech. Dr. Wilson is now a member of the faculty at the University of California, having left Humboldt last year.

George Monroe, a graduate of Humboldt State College, studied for one year in the graduate school of the University of Southern California. Besides his work as supervisor of rural schools in the county he is director of the audio-visual education department of the Humboldt County Schools.

## COUNCIL AUTHORIZES STUDENT BODY ELECTION

"Trimester" schooling will be put before Humboldt State students for approval or disapproval Friday in the Social Unit, where an election on the plan is scheduled.

Because of overwhelming student disapproval over the first ballot, the Executive Council has authorized this election.

The plan is proposed to give students a chance to finish college in three years, thus giving them a college education before entering the service.

### THREE PROPOSALS

In this election three questions will be asked of the students to assure complete coverage. Question one will be, "If you are not returning to college in the fall for any of these reasons—graduation, completion of two-year curriculum, transfer to another institution, quitting school—check here." Second, "If the three term system were adopted, would you attend all three annually until completion of your curriculum?" Lastly, "If you could not attend all three each year, please indicate below which one or two of the three you would attend, and give reasons for being unable to attend all three.—Fall—Spring—Summer."

Both were middleweights.

Fred Iten, football and basketball ace who was making his debut in the amateur ring, scored an easy victory over Ed McClung of Scotia. McClung was no match for Iten in the infighting—he simply couldn't tie up the Humboldt boy. Iten banged away at McClung's head and body throughout the fight, taking a few punches in return.
