Ralph Bryant is president of Chi Sigma Epsilon and Miss Adele Johnson is faculty advisor.

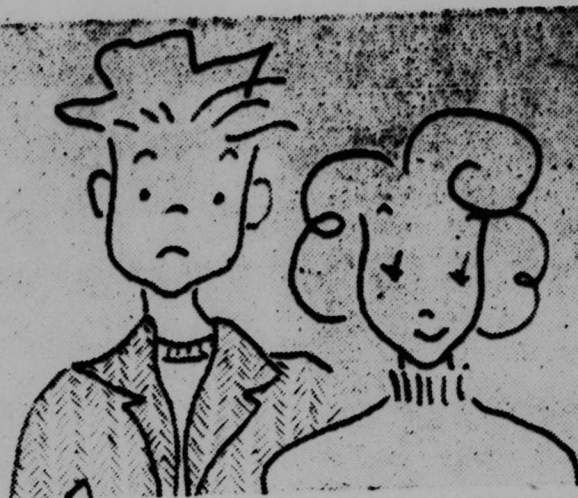

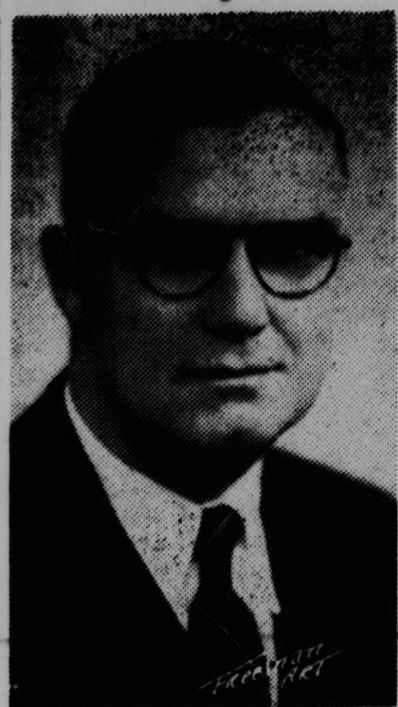

PRESIDENT GIST

This is the beginning in a series of biographical sketches to acquaint you with your faculty. We hope you like them.

Our first victim, President Gist, was somewhat startled when first approached by your curious reporter, but soon recovered and gave us the following picture of himself.

Born in Iowa, he attended school there till 1904 when he received the traditional sheepskin from Iowa State Teachers College. In 1918 he got his Master's degree from the University of Washington.

The next major step in his life was marriage in the year 1928 to Miss Ruth Palmer. Soon after Mr. Gist became president of HSC.

He has written and co-authored several books on public school education. Before coming to HSC, President Gist was principal of the training school and director of student teachers at San Francisco Junior College and he has taught public school administration at summer sessions in a number of the country's universities.

Outside of school his hobbies are fishing, gardening and golf. He is also an active member of Rotary and the Masons.

Asked about his ambitions for the school he told us, "I want HSC to be a friendly school of high standard." That is a challenge to you students!
