## CE Graves Attends Library Institute

C. E. Graves, college librarian, accompanied by his wife, and Mrs. Helen Everett, assistant librarian, made a trip to the San Francisco Bay area over the last week end to attend a library institute at the University of California.

The institute was sponsored jointly by the Redwood District of California Library Association, of which Mr. Graves is president and Mrs. Everett, secretary; the Portola District, and the San Francisco Bay District. The general theme was the influence of the war on libraries, both at the present time and after the war.

In the morning session there were speakers representing the library trustees, the general public, the labor groups and the public librarians. One of the most interesting speakers was Miss Joan London, daughter of the author, Jack London, who is librarian of the California State Federation of Labor. She spoke enthusiastically of the influence that the librarians at the Oakland Public Library had in encouraging her father in his literary career. She urged librarians to encourage working men to use the libraries more, even if it meant destroying to some extent the hush-hush atmosphere of most libraries.

Following a noon luncheon at the College Women's Club there was an address by the President of the California Library Association, Mrs. Mary Duncan Carter, director of the Library School of the University of Southern California, on the subject of recruiting for the library profession. In the past there have been more applications for registration in library schools than the schools could handle. Now it is necessary to advertise the advantages of library work as a career, because so many students are going into the services.

In the afternoon there was a symposium on "Readjustment of War Personnel into Civilian Life." Speakers stressed the kind of reading that soldiers enjoy, both in the field and in the hospitals. One speaker told of the voluntary organization of library work by the Tenants Association at the Vallejo Housing Project with a professional librarian invited to take charge.

Dr. Olga Bridgman, professor of psychology at the University of California, told of the work being done with war neurotics and stated that in most cases these people would have broken down in civilian life.

Mr. and Mrs. Graves and Mrs. Everett joined with Miss Sarah Davies, formerly secretary to President Gist, in several social engagements. Miss Davies is now a secretary at the Pan American Airways on Treasure Island.

President Gist was in Santa Barbara last week to inspect the new Industrial Arts Building at the Santa Barbara State College. While he was there, he picked up a great many useful items which will be considered indrawing up plans for our own industrial Arts Building.

The County Board of Supervisors has approved a petition signed by property owners living near the college to close Laurel Drive from Vine to Cedar streets, with the idea that the state will extend Cedar Street from Laurel Drive to 19th Street. By this arrangement, the college will have more room for the new Industrial Arts Building, and the closing of this one block and the extension of Cedar Street will be a decided convenience for everyone concerned.

The County Supervisors have set June 1 as the time for the hearing of this petition.
