### Homecoming Celebration To Feature Game, Dances

The November 16 football game between Humboldt State College and the Waves from Pepperdine College in Los Angeles will feature the first annual HSC homecoming which will take place the 15th and 16th of November.

The program for the homecoming celebration is under the direction of Dr. Hyman Palais, faculty advisor, and general chairman Joe Barkdull who is heading a committee composed of Bill McAllister, Lyle Alkire, Melba Jo Turner, Anita Thompson, Marna Murphy, Ann Murphy, and Des Shanahan.

The festivities will begin on Friday afternoon, November 15, with a dance from 4 to 6 in the gymnasium. Following the dance, a bean feed under the direction of Miss Barbara Lyddane will take place.

More entertainment is planned for Friday evening when a big pajamero serpentine in downtown Arcata, a bonfire rally on the practice field in back of the gym, and a pajamero dance in the gym will be held. Admission will be free to both dances, but anyone attending the evening affair must come in pajamas. Prizes will be awarded for the best and funniest costumes at the dance. The Eureka bus will be held over until after the Friday night dance.

Saturday morning, the reunion for all Humboldt State graduates will be held at the college. Early in the afternoon, a caravan will form in Eureka to advertise the game that afternoon. Feature of the caravan will be a float made by the Wildlife club on which the sports queen, who will be elected by the student body, will ride.

Between halves at the game, the queen will be formally presented. The Rally committee has also planned a number of stunts for the halftime intermission.

The homecoming celebration will conclude Saturday night with a dance in the gym for all HSC students, graduates, and their friends. Marna Murphy is in charge of the dance and the music will be provided by Al Pollard's orchestra.

### HSC Registration Up 243 Percent

Registrations at Humboldt State show the largest percent of increase reported by any of the state colleges, according to a report released recently by the State Department of Education. According to the report, Humboldt's increase over the fall semester of 1945 is 243.6 percent.

Humboldt's enrollment a year ago was 188, and at the date of the report, October 5, it had increased to 646. Total enrollment for the semester to date is 659, but withdrawals have reduced the number to 633 at the present time.

### Tupper Elected Frosh President

Harold Tupper was elected president of the freshman class at a meeting held recently. Eddie O'Donnell was elected vice president and Barbara Dolf was named to the office of secretary-treasurer.

The freshman class is to be in charge of the bonfire which will feature the Friday night rally for the Pepperdine-Humboldt homecoming game November 16.

Those in charge of the bonfire are Chuck Anderson, chairman of the frame and post committee; Charles Piper, chairman of the assembling committee; "Geo." Williams, head of the Eureka salvage pickup committee; and Bob Beers, chairman of the Arcata salvage committee. Tupper has stated that this bonfire will be the biggest Humboldt has ever seen or will see for years to come.

Tupper says that he hopes to have volunteers for the fireworks committee, art committee, and guarding committee before the week is over. The freshman class is going out 100 percent for the homecoming celebration.

### Student Show Meeting Held

A meeting of faculty members and students interested in the writing and production of the student show was held Sunday evening in the social unit of the college. The playwriting class presented a discussion regarding acts to be used in the show.

The writing has already begun, but so far only a small amount of material has been turned in. The show can use just about anything—musical numbers, comedy, drama, and satires on a wide variety of subjects—everything from politics to the atomic bomb.

### HSC, Lewis and Clark To Play Armistice Day

The Humboldt State College Lumberjacks will return to the Redwood Bowl on Monday, November 11, for their Armistice Day gridiron battle with the Lewis and Clark College eleven from Portland, Oregon.

The Armistice Day game will be sponsored by the Arcata American Legion post, whose members will sell tickets for the game and will present a stunt during halftime. It is hoped that this Legion sponsored game will become an annual event at Humboldt State.

Dr. Homer Balabanis, who was last spring an officer in the local post, is the person who first got the idea for the American Legion post to sponsor one of the college games. He convinced both the Legion post and the HSC student council that this would be a good thing for the college, and he made most of the arrangements.

Besides the halftime stunt to be presented by the Legion, the Rally committee will also put on a stunt. It is hoped that the Fort Humboldt post of the American Legion will send its drum and bugle corps to add more color to the occasion.

The Humboldt-Lewis and Clark game is the only one which will be played in the county on Armistice Day.

### Students From 12 States Here

Students from 12 states outside of California and from 23 counties within the state are enrolled at Humboldt State this semester, according to information compiled in the office of the registrar.

Out of state students include some from New York and Massachusetts in the east, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Nebraska, and Wisconsin in the north central and plains states; and from the western states of Colorado, Utah, Oklahoma, Oregon, and Washington.

Humboldt county tops the enrollment list with 477 students from this county attending HSC. Los Angeles county is represented by 58 students, while Del Norte and Alameda counties have 18 and 16 respectively.

### Humboldt Band To Go To Davis

The Humboldt State College 25 piece band will leave Friday or Saturday for Davis where they will play at the Humboldt State-Cal Aggie football game Saturday afternoon.

This will be the first time in several years that the band has followed the team to any out of town game. It will also mark the first time this year that the band has played in complete uniforms. The HSC band will form the day.

### Cal Aggies Next For Lumberjacks

The Humboldt State College Lumberjacks, with two straight wins under their belts, will this weekend make its last and longest journey of the season when they trek to Davis to meet the Cal Aggie eleven Saturday afternoon.

The Aggies have dropped three close battles this season, losing to San Francisco State 13-7, Cal Ramblers 21-14, and to Chico State last Saturday 13-0. All have been close battles, however, and the team from the valley school will be anything but a pushover for the Lumberjacks. In fact, one touchdown may spell difference between victory and defeat for either the green and gold invaders or their hosts.

Another large contingent of Humboldt rooters is expected to follow the Lumberjacks to Davis for their final game on an out of town gridiron. It is hoped that the HSC band will make the trip south.

The Lumberjacks will be relying on their ground game to carry them to their third straight victory Saturday. It has been the running of halfbacks Bob Hayes, Fred Iten, and Ad Holden which has accounted for most of Humboldt's yardage in the Chico and San Francisco State games.

The Aggies will also find plenty of trouble in the strong Lumberjack forward wall which has not yielded one touchdown in the last three games, all of the opponents scores coming via the aerial route or on intercepted passes.

### Wildfire Club Elects Officers

The Humboldt State Wildlife elected officers for the coming year at a meeting held recently. Those elected were Dave Wingo, president; Earl Biehn, vice-president; Paul Burns, corresponding secretary; Seth Buck, recording secretary; and Fred Easterday, treasurer.

The actual name of the club is to be announced at the November 16 homecoming game and suggestions for the new name will be welcomed by members of the organization.

The club is in charge of building the float for the sports queen who will reign at the homecoming game. This float will feature the caravan which will go through Eureka and Arcata on the day of the game.

Our team has had lots of support for two Saturdays and they won both times. Let's keep it up and make it three straight Saturdays.

The film will reveal nothing new to those that enjoy it. It's philosophy is important and will get to them. But, they aren't the ones who need it! It is the rest of the audience, the ones that haven't time to dissect the causes of war in their daily lives, that the message should reach.

If the Eureka Theatre is any example of the average cinema palace, the message does not reach them. One young man thought that it was the dullest thing he had seen in years and left a bad taste in his mouth. His date promptly apologized for making him come. She thought it was a love story.

You can't just sit back and say that some things are just to subtitle or that the average person will absorb a message. It worked with "Mr. Smith Goes to Wash-

ington." Perhaps Miss Hellman needs a few lessons from Frank Capra.

In closing, I would like to extend a few pats on the backs of Dudley Diggs and Albert Bassermann. Their excellent performances gave the film its few moments of greatness. By all means, see "The Searching Wind" if you can if only to explain it to the person next to you (or will he have to do the explaining). It will be your good deed for the day if nothing else.

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## LUMBERJACKS SPORTS

Hayes Runs 75 Yards;  
HSC Beats Gaters 13-7

Scatback Bob Hayes, Humboldt State Lumberjack speedster, ran 75 yards to a touchdown in the final quarter to give the Lumberjacks a 13-7 victory over the Golden Gaters of San Francisco State College last Saturday afternoon on the George Washington High school gridiron in the bay city.

Hayes' touchdown gallop came just after the Gaters had gone into a 7-6 lead as halfback Amos Atkins intercepted a pass thrown by Hayes and sped 75 yards to a score. John Comach tallied the extra point on a run around end.

After driving to within sight of pay dirt several times in the opening half only to be stopped by penalties and fumbles, the Humboldt Lumberjacks finally scored in the third period following a 46 yard march. Turkey Thompson lugged the leather across the goal line for the touchdown.

In taking their second win in a row on foreign territory, the Lumberjacks completely outplayed the San Franciscans. The Humboldt line was at its best Saturday as it threw up a rock ribbed defense which stopped the Gaters cold. Harvey Del Fatti, the 220 pound Lumberjack tackle and captain for the San Francisco State

Lumberjacks Win  
From Chico, 6-2

By staving off two last minute Chico State scoring thrusts, Humboldt's Lumberjacks went back onto gridiron's glory road with a 6-2 victory over the Wildcats at Chico October 19.

The Humboldtters scored their touchdown midway in the third period when Turkey Thompson smashed into pay dirt from one yard out following a 20 yard pass from Bob Hayes to Grady Lawrence.

Outstanding in the Lumberjack backfield were Hayes, Thompson, Fred Iten, and Ad Holden. Shining brilliantly in the forward wall were Harvey Del Fatti, Wiley Cousins, Lawrence, and Chuck Gordet, 210 pound center who played most of the game in place of Neal Rydlek who injured his nose early in the battle.

A 25 yard pass by Bill Crissman ruled complete because of interference, with but three minutes left to play in the final quarter set up the Humboldt Jayvee's lone touchdown which gave them a 7-0 win over the visiting eleven from Santa Rosa J. C. at Albee Stadium Sunday. The pass was complete to the ten, and Eshleman skirted left end on the next play for the tally.

Crissman's pass and Eshleman's run were the climax to a game which had see-sawed back and forth through three and a half scoreless quarters, with first one team and then the other knocking at the touchdown gates. Santa Rosa's most serious threat came in the first stanza when an attempted punt by the Junior Lumberjacks was blocked and Santa Rosa recovered on Humboldt's ten yard line. Ted Callaghan, Santa Rosa right half, carried the ball to the one on the next play, after which two successive plays carried it to the one-inch line. A five-yard off-side penalty against Santa Rosa and a fourth down fumble gave the ball to Humboldt on their own nineteen and got them out of a bad hole.
