When Joe Forbes' Humboldt State College Lumberjacks trek to Chico this Saturday to meet the Chico State College Wildcats, they will be followed by a large contingent of Humboldt rooters bent on seeing the Lumberjacks cop their coming game with their traditional rivals from the valley school.

The HSC Rally committee is planning a caravan to go to Chico and all students planning to take cars on the trip are urged to take as many passengers as possible with them.

All Humboldt students are invited to attend the big dance to be held in Chico following Saturday night's game. Humboldt State associated student cards will be honored at the gate Saturday.

The Humboldt State yell and song leaders will be present at the game and the Rally Committee is hoping for a large rooting section at Chico.

With the first three home football games now written into sports history and nearly one month until the Lumberjacks return to the Redwood Bowl November 11 to meet Lewis and Clark College, the Humboldt State College Rally committee has already set to work laying plans for the entertainment to be given at the final two games of the year.

Plans for the homecoming game November 16 against Pepperdine College include a big pajamero rally and bean feed. Cooperating in arranging the program for the Armistice Day battle with Lewis and Clark is the Arcata American Legion post which is sponsoring the game.

Knights Group Organized Here

The Knights, an organization of freshmen, sophomore, and junior men, has recently been organized at Humboldt State and Earl Biehn has been elected president of the group.

The Knights are a national college organization which has branches in many schools across the nation. They are a school service club, taking charge of such jobs as guarding the fence at football games, aiding in ticket sales, and participating in other student body activities.

Future plans of the Knights at Humboldt include an assembly program and a masquerade dance.

Officers of the organization are Earl Biehn, president; Lyle Alkire, vice president; Charles Sutton, secretary; and Francis Damgaard, treasurer.

Other members of the group include Robert Beers, Gene Moses, David Roberts, Wayne Heuer, Frank Rohner, Bill McAllister, Bill Willkins, Dick Sierka, John Klingenspar, and Fred Wright. Membership of the Knights has been restricted to 25 men.

1946-47 Budget Now Completed

The Humboldt State College financial budget for the year 1946-47 has been completed by the executive council and will be presented to the associated students at a student body meeting in the near future.

The estimated income for the coming year comes to \$25,071.39, the largest income in the history of Humboldt State. Student body dues of nearly \$13,000.00 account for the largest proportion of the estimated income. Income from athletics constitute the next largest share of the income with \$8,555.00.

Appropriations for men's athletics come to around \$13,000.00, the largest appropriation on the budget. Most of this amount will come back to the student body coffers from game receipts and the remainder should be made up next year.

Lembach Prepares Football Display

The football display which was seen in the window of Brizard's store recently was made possible through the effort of the commercial art class and Dr. John Lembach, one of the new art instructors at Humboldt State. Each student in the class aided in the preparation of the display, which was arranged by Dr. Lembach.

Hilarities Work Already Started

The Humboldt State College Hilarities, the student written, student directed, and student produced stage show which took Humboldt county by storm when it was presented in 1942 and 1943, will be produced again this year with hopes of a bigger and better show than ever before.

When the "Hilarities" were first presented in the spring of 1942, 130 students out of a student body of 375 took part in the show. The next year, 1943, the enrollment had dropped to 300 but that spring 160 aided in staging the production. This year, with an enrollment in excess of 600, it is hoped that as many as 300 will participate in the "Hilarities".

While the show will not go on the stage until March, work has already begun on the writing of the production. Anyone interested in either writing, directing, or acting in the show should see Jerry Falor, temporary senior manager of the Hilarities, either before or after 11:00 a. m. class on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays in room 104.

It is urged that all students who plan to participate in dancing, music composition, writing, set designing, and any novelty or feature acts for the "Hilarities" contact Falor at once.

Conry Appoints Gruhn Treasurer

Frank Gruhn, Humboldt State commercial student, has been appointed to the office of treasurer of the associated students by President Len Conry.

Gruhn will fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Wally McMillan who was elected last spring for the 1946-47. He is a veteran of World War II, having served with the United States Army.

Rehearsals Begin On Fall Play

Rehearsals are well under way on the drama department's fall production, "Guest in the House" and from early observances it should easily be one of the finest plays given by the Humboldt State College Players in recent years.

The play will be staged November 22, 23, 25, and 26, the Friday, Saturday, Monday, and Tuesday before Thanksgiving. Stars of the psychological drama are Paula Foley as Evelyn Heath and Dan McClure and Barbara Dolf as Douglas Proctor and Ann Proctor, respectively.

Most of the parts in the play have been double cast to offer more students an opportunity to appear. In double cast parts, the players will alternate, each performing two nights.

Program To Be Presented Tomorrow In Auditorium

Tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock Rho Sigma, the sophomore honor society, and Chi Sigma Epsilon, the upper division honor group will present their annual fall assembly in the college auditorium.

The program will include short talks by President Gist and Dr. Balabanis. The honor roll for last semester will be read and announcement of scholarships and special awards will be made. The scholarship trophy which is annually awarded to the organized house having the highest index for last semester will be awarded at tomorrow's assembly. The trophy was last won by the women of Nelson Hall.

At the close of the present season, the Legion post is planning a dinner for the members of the Lumberjack squad. The affair will be held December 9. The local Legion post is also sponsoring the Humboldt State-Lewis and Clark College football game on Armistice Day, Nov. 11.

Buildings To Be Completed Soon

HSC, Wildcats Collide In Night Game At Chico

Next Saturday, October 19th, Humboldt's Lumberjack eleven will play its first game on an out-of-country grid, when it meets Clach Roy Bohler's Chico State squad at Chico. Chico is reported to have a very strong team, holding the Cal Ramblers to a mere seven points. They were defeated by the powerful Southern Oregon gridsters with a score of 20 to 0.

Bohler states that his team will be in good condition to meet the Humboldt invaders. Much better condition than they were in at the Oregon game, where several of his players were out on injuries.

Aside from the intense interest in the football team at Humboldt, there will be another point of great interest to this game. The Lumberjack's are out for revenge. Last year's Chico basketball team defeated Humboldt four games out of four, and Forbes' men are going to try to show the valley gridsters that they can't repeat this year in the pigskin meet.

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Stanford B Team Drubs Humboldt Eleven, 21 to 0

The Stanford University "B" football team, paced by fullback Ben Cardinalli and halfbacks Kendall Peck and Wilbur Altus, rode roughshod over the Humboldt State College Lumberjacks last State College Lumberjacks for a 21-0 victory in the dedication game of the Redwood Bowl.

The initial Stanford scoring thrust came midway in the second quarter when Peck returned a partially blocked punt from his own 37 to the Humboldt 22. The Indians advanced the ball to the 14 in three plays and on fourth down Jim O'Neill went into the end zone on an end run. Altus converted to bring the score to 7-0 where it stood at half time.

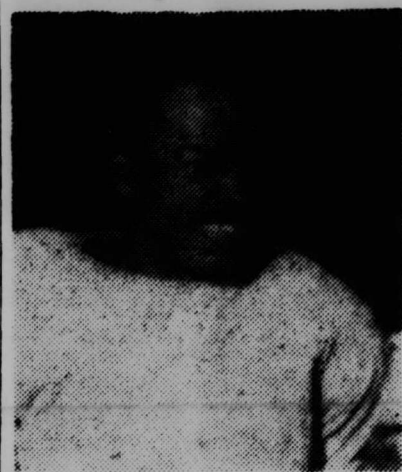
The other Stanford touchdowns came in the third period, the first following a 46 yard march climaxed by Cardinalli's four yard plunge over right guard. The third and final score came a few plays later when Frank Parr intercepted one of Earl Rydlek's passes and returned the pigskin to the Humboldt 28. Altus broke through left tackle after one play and out ran the entire Lumberjack secondary to score standing up. Altus converted after both scores.

Although the Humboldt forward wall was out played all afternoon by the hard charging Cardinal line, the two guards, Wiley Cousins and Gordon Schoeder, and tackle Al Fodor all played good ball. Turkey Thompson and Ad Holden were outstanding in the Humboldt backfield.

The Lumberjacks came close to a touchdown in the opening minutes of play when they drove to the Stanford one-foot line only to be held on downs. Again in the final period, Joe Forbes' eleven went to the Indian eight yard stripe on a pass from Bill Crissman to Thompson, but O'Neill intercepted Crissman's next aerial in the end zone for a touchback.

Everybody knows that a team plays better with a good rooting section back of it. Let's make sure the team has one Saturday night.

His name is James Calvin Thompson, he is 24 years old, stands five feet, eight inches tall, and weighs 170 pounds. His home is in Los Angeles, and he is a graduate of Jordan High school where he captained the football and track teams. He is now a junior and is majoring in physical education. He is known to the students of this college as "Turk."

Turk's athletic record reads like a coach's dream. In addition to winning both track and football letters at Compton J. C., he was captain of the Compton track team last spring. His track specialty is the pole vault, so watch this boy when track season rolls around.

The present Humboldt State record is 12 feet, and in 1944 when he was stationed at Lowry Field, Colorado, Turkey pushed himself 13 feet, 3 inches into the rarified atmosphere, which is really climbing in a hunk of bamboo. The year before, he took third place pole vaulting honors in the Junior A.A.U. meet in New York, and third in the Senior A.A.U. competition.

His football record includes such items as being chosen an All Eastern Conference halfback in 1941 while playing for Jordan High, playing quarterback on the 1942 eleven at Compton J.C., and playing first string quarter for the Godman Field Bombers, of Godman Field, Kentucky.

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Humboldt Loses To Oregon, 14-7

Charles DeAutremont, the speedy Southern Oregon College right halfback, stepped out of nowhere to intercept one of Bill Crissman's aeriels last Saturday and ran 35 yards to a touchdown to give the Sons a 14-7 victory over the Lumberjacks.

The score came midway in the fourth period and broke a 7-7 deadlock which had existed since early in the third quarter. In that period, the Sons converted a Lumberjack fumble into a touchdown as they marched 30 yards to their initial tally, Snuffy Smith scoring on a pass from quarterback Charlie Jandreau.

Humboldt started the scoring early in the opening quarter. Phil Young set the Sons back on their own 10 with a 60 yard quick kick and then a holding penalty moved the pigskin back to the 1 yard line. At this point, DeAutremont got off a short punt which went out of bounds on the Southern Oregon 15. It took the Lumberjacks only three plays to reach pay dirt, Bob Hayes going into the end zone from three yards out for the touchdown. Young converted to give Humboldt a 7-0 first half margin.
