Jayvees To Meet Alumni 11 Sunday

Humboldt State College football fans will have their final opportunity of the year to see a green and gold eleven in action next Sunday afternoon when the once beaten HSC junior varsity meets the Eureka High alumni gridders in Eureka's Albee Stadium. Kick-off time for Sunday's game is set for 2 p. m.

The jayvees dropped their first game in three starts last Saturday when the Santa Rosa J. C. junior varsity copped a return game 6-0. The Humboldt eleven took a 7-0 victory from the Santa Rosans earlier in the season. They also hold a 14-0 win over Fort Bragg High School.

The jayvees will be looking for more of the strong line play which was featured in the first three games by the hard charging Junior Lumberjack forward wall. Doing plenty of work in the backfield will undoubtedly be Marion Marshall, the jayvee's big, hard hitting fullback.

The alumni team will be playing its first game since it took a victory from the Eureka High eleven at the beginning of the season. The alumni will have a powerful backfield led by Frank Massaro, probably the finest passer ever developed at EHS, and Dave Del Grande, one of the great Logger fullbacks of all time.

The homecoming program will begin Friday afternoon at 4 with a free dance in the gym which is open to all students. Following the dance, a bean feed under the direction of the College Y will be served. Miss Barbara Lyddane is in charge of the preparation of the feed.

More entertainment is scheduled for Friday evening, with a huge bonfire rally and a pajamarino 9 p. m.

dance highlighting the program. The building of the bonfire is under the direction of the freshman class and the Knights and all indications point to one of the biggest bonfires which has ever been witnessed in this vicinity.

For the benefit of students who live in Eureka, busses will be held over until the end of Friday night's dance.

Saturday morning all HSC alumni present at the homecoming will convene for a reunion at the college. Open house will be held in all housing units in honor of the visiting Humboldt State graduates. The open house will be held Saturday morning.

The activities for Saturday afternoon are headlined by the Humboldt-Pepperdine game. Visiting alumni will be guests at dinner in Nelson Hall Saturday evening.

A dance in the gym Saturday night for all Humboldt students, alumni, and their friends will bring to a close the homecoming program. Music for the dance will be provided by Al Pollard's orchestra and dancing will open at 9 p. m.

Humboldt, Pepperdine Meet Here Saturday

As the feature attraction of the first annual Humboldt State College homecoming celebration, Coach Joe Forbes' Humboldt State gridders will collide with the once beaten Pepperdine College eleven the Saturday afternoon in the Lumberjacks final game of the 1946 season.

Forbes expects to find the strongest opposition which his team has met this year when Humboldt battles the Waves Saturday. Pepperdine, in its initial season of intercollegiate football has turned up with one of the strongest aggregations in southern California small college gridiron circles. Counting out last Saturday's game with Cal Poly, the results of which are not available as this paper goes to press, the Waves boast a record of four wins and one loss for the present campaign.

Coach Warren Gaer's eleven holds victories over Whittier, 13-0; Redlands, 20-6; Loyola, 21-6, and Pomona, 19-6. Their only loss was at the hands of Arizona State, 13-12.

The Waves' attack features the running of Darwin Horn, 210 pound freshman fullback who accounted for 44 of Pepperdine's 84 points in their first five games, and 155 pound seatback Terry Bell. Rounding out the backfield are the Dragger twins, Jack and Dale.

Against the Los Angeles footballers, Forbes will pit a Humboldt squad which began to hit its stride in mid season, but since then they have been tough to beat. Not including Monday's game with Lewis and Clark, the Lumberjacks had

a season mark of three wins, two losses and one tie.

Humboldt will probably depend upon their powerful running game to carry them to victory Saturday. The breakaway ability of left half Bob Hayes paid off in the touchdowns which beat San Francisco State and gained a tie with Cal Aggies. Hayes is the top scorer for the Lumberjacks with 24 points in six games, more than half of the total points chalked up by HSC this season.

Along with Hayes in the Humboldt backfield are Fred Iten, hard running right half; Turkey Thompson, the speedy field general; and Phil Young, 200 pound plunging fullback. In reserve Forbes has Ad Holden and Jack Smith at the halfback spots, Brick Bralich at full, and Stan Wiesner at quarter.

Humboldt fans will also be counting on the powerful Lumberjack forward wall which has not been scored upon since the Stanford "B" game, second of the season.

It certainly cannot be said that this year's Sadie Hawkins dance was not a success, but if this dance is tossed around from one organization to another, the time will come when no group will take it upon its hands to sponsor the dance and a fine tradition will be lost. Even if you are not a sentimentalist, you will probably agree to that.

 Within the next week, the Humboldt State physical education department will embark on its first really all inclusive intramural program.

This program, which includes at least one or more sports which will appeal to every student, may help to cure one of the worst troubles of a large part of the sports-minded American public, that of being merely spectators rather than active participants.

Hayes, Thompson Pace Lumberjacks To 9-0 Victory

The Humboldt State College Lumberjacks, paced by the running of left half Bob Hayes and the passing combination of Turkey Thompson to Jack Newman, romped to their fourth win of the 1946 season Monday afternoon when they copped a 9-0 victory from the air-minded Lewis and Clark College Pioneers.

A 60 yard drive in the second quarter netted Coach Joe Forbes' charges their only touchdown of the game. A 19 yard aerial from Thompson to Newman accounted for the score. Phil Young added the extra point on a placekick.

The Lumberjacks picked up two more points in the third period when quarterback Lee Todd of the visitors was trapped behind his own goal line as he attempted to run from punt formation.

game. Joe came to HSC from Compton J. C. where last year he coached a national championship eleven. Also mentored at Roosevelt High, Los Angeles. Graduate of Occidental College where he was known as one of the great punters of all time—still kicks 60-70 yards.

HSC record of 12 feet.

Neal Rydlek — hard charging Lumberjack center and a bear on defense where he backs up the line. Neal overslept and missed the bus to Davis a couple of weeks ago.

Wiley Cousins—first string left guard and one of the big reasons for the fine play of the Humboldt line this season. A Eureka High alumnus but didn't don cleats and pads until he came to HSC. Transferred to College of the Pacific under one of Uncle Sam's officer training programs. Played two seasons there under football's grand old man, A. A. Stagg.

Jack Newman — stellar wingman who is finishing his first campaign as a member of the Lumberjack eleven. A Long Beach boy who played football, basketball, and was on the track team at Long Beach City College. Will probably be seen in action on the hardwood during basketball season. Distance man on the track team.
