Business Managers Chosen For 1946-47 Publications

Frances Brizard and Des Shanahan have been appointed by the student executive council as business managers for the Humboldt Lumberjack and Humboldt Sempervirens respectively for the 1946-47 school year.

Miss Brizard is the present business manager of the Lumberjack and was chosen to continue in that capacity next year. She is an economics major, a member of Rho Sigma, the sophomore honor society, and the Women's Athletic Association. She had a major role in "Icebound", last fall's drama department production, and is a member of the A-Cappella choir and the orchestra.

Shanahan was business manager of the Lumberjack in 1942. He is also a sophomore and is a commercial student. He is a veteran of three years in the U. S. Army. His principal extra-curricular interests lie in dramatics and the Rally Committee, on which he is chairman of the college sign committee. The selection of representatives to work under him will be announced soon.

A Cappella Choir To Tour County

The Humboldt State College A Cappella choir of 29 voices directed by Charles Fulkerson will leave Friday morning, May 24, by chartered bus on a two-day tour of Humboldt county during which they will present three concerts at various cities in the county.

The choir will make their first appearance of the tour at Ferndale High School Friday morning and will then continue on to Fortuna High for another performance. They will be luncheon guests of the Fortuna High student body there.

Friday evening they will present a concert at Garberville and will spend the night there as guests of Garberville resident. Saturday the singers will be transported to a picnic to be held near Benbow. They are scheduled to return to Humboldt Saturday evening.

Humboldt State College can expect as many as 200 veterans to enroll here next fall in addition to the 140 who are now attending, according to an announcement made last week by President Arthur S. Gist.

Humboldt is one of the few remaining colleges in the country with facilities to handle more veterans, Gist said. It is listed at separation centers throughout the nation as being able to accommodate more students. Many of the larger schools have full enrollments and have thousands on their waiting lists.
