PUBLICATION EDITORS CHOSEN

Peterson is in his freshman year and is a journalism major. He will take over the reins as next year's Lumberjack editor. He is now sport's editor of the college paper. Also active in sports, he was a member of the freshman basketball team last semester. In dramatics, he appeared in the last Fall production, "Icebound."

Ray and Peterson have not announced the staff members, but will do so in the immediate future.

PE Head Named For Next Fall

President Gist announced the appointment of Laurence A. Pape, professor of physical education at the University of Buffalo, to be Director of Teacher training and Physical Education at Humboldt State college next year.

Pape earned his A.B. degree at Ohio State University, 1938, in science. In 1939, he earned his Master of Arts degree at Ohio State. He taught in Ohio high schools, coaching basketball, baseball, football and swimming.

Pape was professor of physical education at the University of Buffalo, New York, for one year. During the war he served at a lieutenant in the Navy. He is now teaching at University of Buffalo and will become a member of the Humboldt faculty next fall.

In the top singles match of the day, Captain Ellis Williamson of the Lumberjacks defeated Wildcat ace Ken Tinker by scores of 6-3, 1-6, and 6-1. Tinker is rated by Chico Coach Art Acker as one of the most outstanding players ever to perform on the Wildcat courts.

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
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
