## NEW ADMINISTRATIVE PROGRAM FOR HSC

### County High School Students To Perform For Annual Festival

Students and their families and friends are urged to attend the annual county Music Festival at Humboldt State this Friday, May 3. The morning session will include a performance of instrumental and vocal soloists from every school in the county. In the afternoon an interesting feature of the program will be the finale when all vocal participants sing three songs as a group, in four-part harmony.

The selections chosen to be presented are "The Bells of Saint Mary's," "All in An April Evening," and "Allelujah," Amen. The massed choral groups will be

directed, in turn, by the following: Lloyd Anderson of Fortuna; William Crane of Ferndale, and Miss Pearl Jacobsen of Eureka. Friday evening a performance is scheduled at the Eureka Junior high school at eight o'clock.

In the Festival, sponsored by the Humboldt State music department, approximately 850 students and teachers will perform in their respective school's bands, orchestras, boys and girls glee clubs, mixed choruses, and a capella choirs. The following county high schools will be represented, Arcata, Ferndale, Fortuna, Hoopa, and South Fork, and Eureka Junior and Senior High Schools.

### Faculty Approves Program For Reorganization

On the assumption that the student enrollment will greatly increase during the next five years, that many students will be working for degrees in liberal arts and for teacher-training credentials, that many students will seek transference to other universities, and that the size of the Humboldt faculty will increase, a plan for the reorganization of the Humboldt State College administrative program has been submitted by Dr. Homer Balabanis to the faculty and approved by the faculty.

The plan is concerned with matters directly affecting the relations between the administration and/or the faculty on the one hand, and students on the other.

Under the plan, the administration will include at the head, the college president, and under him, the college vice-president. Three deans—Dean of Education, Dean of Arts and Science, and Dean of Students will be appointed, and working under them will be divisional chairman, directors and sponsors of student activities.

#### BALABANIS APPOINTED

President Gist has appointed Dr. Balabanis as the Dean of Arts, supervisor of the entire liberal arts program, under which present departments will be segregated into divisions with the following divisional chairmen appointed by the President:

Division of Natural Science—Dr. MacGinitie, head.  
Fine and applied arts—Mr. Karshner, head.  
Social science—Dr. Bailey, head.  
P. E. and health—Dr. Pape, a new appointee, head.  
Language and speech — Mr.

#### Hicklin, head. DEAN OF EDUCATION

The dean of education has not been appointed, as yet. Under him will be organized curricula leading to the Elementary and Junior High credentials, general secondary, special credentials, college elementary school, and work. The departments of education will be included under the division.

#### GUIDANCE PROGRAM

The Dean of Students will supervise all student activities and the guidance program. Under him, are the placement secretary, registrar, Men's and Women's advisers, physician, dentist, head residents, publicity, and alumni director, and miscellaneous directors.

Appointments for the Deans and committee heads for education and for student activities have not been made, but will be announced in the near future.

### HSC Secondary Credential Deferred One Year By Board

President Gist has announced that the decision for the granting of accreditation of a secondary credential at Humboldt State College has been postponed for one year, according to a report from the State Board of Education at their meeting held in Los Angeles, April 5.

Early in February, a sub-committee for the Accreditation committee visited the Humboldt campus with the purpose of sending facts and figures to the committee as to whether Humboldt deserved the secondary credential. This report was forwarded to the State Board of Education.

Although the credential has not been decided upon until a larger enrollment exists at Humboldt State college, the committee was favorably impressed with Humboldt's personnel program, with Nelson Hall, stating that is constituted a valuable elements in human relationships, with the guidance program, with the enthusiastic and well-trained staff, and with the relationship between the faculty, the students, and ad-

ministration. Humboldt State will maintain its original status in credentials.

### Students to Vote on New Amendment

Humboldt students will vote next week on an amendment to increase the powers of executive council in authorizing the amount of student body expenditures. At present the executive council is permitted to pass expenses of no more than 20 dollars. If the student body votes in favor of the amendment it will give the council a maximum of 50 dollars.

The constitution at present reads in Article 3, Section 1, paragraph 2: "It (executive council) shall have the power to authorize expenditures not exceeding 20 dollars for any one item not specifically included in the annual budget; or to authorize increased expenditures, not exceeding 20 dollars for any one item which is included in the budget."

If amended the constitution shall read: "It shall have the power to authorize expenditures not exceeding 50 dollars for any one item not specifically included in the annual budget; or to authorize increased expenditures, not exceeding 50 dollars for any one item which is included in the budget."

### Arnolds Returns After Sickness

Dr. Homer Arnold, professor of mathematics and philosophy at Humboldt State College, resumed his classes last Monday after a severe case of pneumonia.

Arnold previously was sick in bed for a week with the flu, and, returning to college too soon, was again ill with congestion of the lungs. He was ill for three weeks and was so sick at first that his immediate family was sent for.

### Humboldt's Oldest Student

The only living member of the original trustees of Humboldt State College, founded in 1914, is today a member of the Humboldt State College student body. Rease Wiley, 71-year-old Arcata seen about the campus with Igor, his Labrador Retriever, is now retired and is spending his time on the Humboldt campus.

"My main ambition, in life," said Wiley, "was to live on a college campus. Well, here I am ... and a student at that."

Wiley was editor and publisher of the "Arcata Union" for thirty years. Founded in 1885, the local newspaper was begun by Wiley's father and left to him and his two brothers. When his brothers died Rease remained editor until his retirement in 1934. Now that he is free from all work and worry, Rease Wiley has settled down to a "college career." He is auditing such courses as psychology, geology, sociology, human geography, survey of English literature, Shakespeare, and flower arrangement. Wiley stated that these courses are intensely interesting and that he enjoys the reading assignment the most.

Before the outbreak of the war, Rease opened his house to ten Humboldt students. The house, known as "House of Wiley," on the campus, was always filled with laughter, singing, and happy college men, according to Rease's memory. During the war, when the fellows were drafted into the service, Rease maintained continual correspondence with his "boys" and still receives letters from them today.

At present, Rease's main interests are his college life, "Ig," his dog, and singing in the Presbyterian choir, of which he has been a member for four years.

With "Ig" as his constant companion, and his cherished college life, Rease Wiley chuckled and stated that nobody in the world gets as much out of life as he does!

present for the annual event. Under the student-direction of Shirley Sweet, field activities were sponsored and a meal was served at Council crest.

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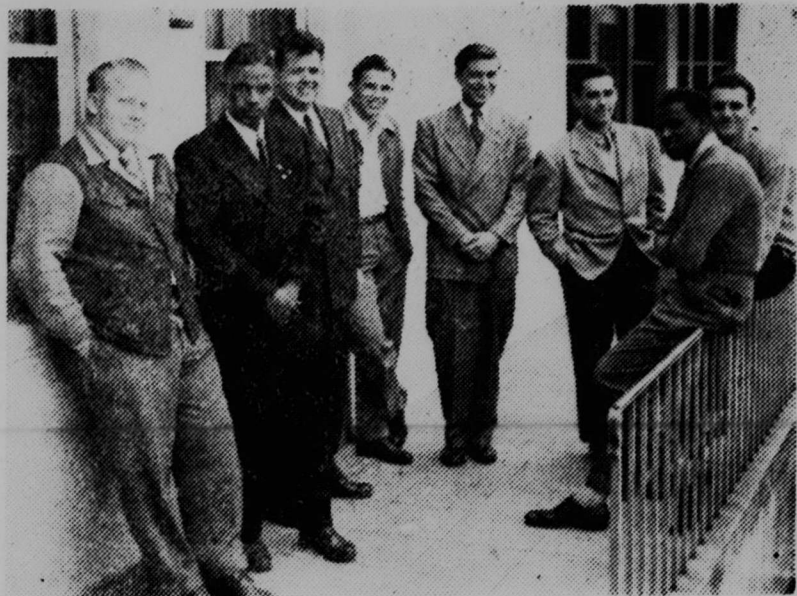

## Bailey Former College Boxer

Dr. Kenneth Bailey, associate professor of history at Humboldt State, is known to sports fans as an avid follower of athletics. What they may not know of is the record Dr. Bailey made in sports at the University of California at Los Angeles, where he lettered in five sports: football, baseball, rugby, boxing, and wrestling.

According to Dr. Bailey, one of his most profound sports' memories dates from April 4, 1934, on which date prohibition was repealed. On that night Bailey was fighting Nile Mallory, a 265 pound behemoth from the University of California in the Pacific Coast intercollegiate finals. Mallory had won the title for two years in a row and in that tournament he already had won two bouts by first round knock-outs.

Bailey was determined to last more than one round with the Cal slugger and for the first part of the opening round he gave the champion a real going-over. But at the crucial moment, he forgot to duck and Mallory's left hand sent him down and out for a full ten seconds.

On the academic side, Bailey obtained the first Ph. D. ever granted at U. C. L. A. It was also at U. C. L. A. that he met his wife. He helped her through physics and she reciprocated by helping him through Spanish so they decided to get married.

## Jenkins Article In Magazine

R. H. "Pop" Jenkins, professor of ceramics and industrial education at Humboldt State for the past 25 years, is the author of an article, "Art Pottery as a Hobby and a Profession," which appears in the current issue of the "Ceramic Age," the technical and business authority of the ceramic industries.

In this article, Jenkins relates the history of pottery, which has never ceased to be a popular vocation, and avocation from the most primitive times. He also tells of pottery production, both of the hand-molding variety and that done by mass production.

This article is not Pop's first literary achievement. He is the author of "Practical Pottery for Craftsmen and Students," which had a large sale and went into a second printing in 1944.

## Faculty Shorts

October 3, 1862, a photograph of Abraham Lincoln was taken at Antientam during the civil war. It was one of the first films to be taken on a wet emulsion, the forerunner of modern photographic plates. Doctor William M. Lanphere, instructor of photography, has reproduced this picture and plans to print and enlarge it. The original is in all probability a Mathew B. Brady photograph. There were not many photographers at the time it was taken, and very few as far advanced in use of an emulsion plate.

Lanphere got the original negative from his father-in-law, who had borrowed it from a friend of his for reproduction. Several such photographs have been brought to Lanphere that are concerned with early history of the United States. He didn't think it was a very good negative, but he reproduced it on a roll of film. Some of the subjects moved during the thirty second exposure. The finished enlargement will be posted on the board.
