## National SF President To Speak Here Thursday

S. F. stands for "Student Federalists Inc." a movement spreading rapidly throughout the colleges and secondary schools of the nation. The president of S. F. is Colgate Prentice, an ex-GI from Swarthmore College, who will address the students and faculty of Humboldt State at 1:00 P. M., Thursday.

The Student Federalists advocate a World Government as the only solution to existing conditions. They compare the present U.N. set-up with the old Articles of Confederation which proved inadequate government for the U.S.A. Only a "United States of the World," say the Federalists, can hope to stop war, hatred, and inequality among the nations and peoples of the world.

Humboldt State is one of the first colleges in California to form a chapter of S. F. Under the leadership of President Jackie Anderson, and with the guidance of Dr. Hyman Palais, the Humboldt Student Federalists are already making themselves known on campus and in the community. On the November 26 broadcast of "Humboldt Reports," S. F. conducted a round-table discussion outlining the aims of the organization and presenting the case for World Government.

During the current semester, President Prentice has been touring the nation, conferring with regional and chapter leaders, and addressing students and the general public alike on the necessity of a one-nation world. Last Saturday was the featured speaker at a conference of delegates from the West Coast, held at Palo Alto. Jackie Anderson and Peggy Brookins, secretary-treasurer of the local chapter, represented HSC at the conference and reported on it to the local group at the regular meeting held last night at the Telonicher home.

To be attended by seven Northern California high schools, the festival will mark the culmination of plans laid in 1941 by Don W. Karshner, Humboldt State College Department of Drama head. The festival will take place on the college campus, and the schedule includes a play reading by the HSC chapter of Alpha Psi Omega, national honorary dramatic society, three one act plays to be presented by South Fork, Ferndale, and Eureka high schools, and a dance in the college gymnasium.

The seven high schools to be represented are Del Norte, Arcata, Weaverville, Eureka, Ferndale, South Fork, and Fortuna.

Karshner indicated that all college organizations and students are welcome to attend, and that the Rally Committee, Spurs, Knights, Mu Epsilon Psi, and the Men and Women of Nelson Hall have signified a desire to help with the program and with guidance and information for the prospective Humboldt students.

## Humboldt, Willamette U. To Meet In Series Here

Coach Joe Forbes' Humboldt State Lumberjack basketball team will open its 1946-47 season intercollegiate play Tuesday and Wednesday nights of this week when it collides with the powerful Willamette University five in a two game series. The opening game will be played in the college gym and the second night's battle will take place in the Eureka Municipal auditorium.

The Lumberjack junior varsity will play preliminaries both nights beginning at 7:15. Tuesday will find the jayvees meeting the Arcata High school heavyweight cagers while Wednesday they will go against the Eureka High unlimiteds.

The top point makers on the varsity who are expected to supply most of the offensive punch in the Willamette series are forwards Darrel Brown and Claude Eshleman, center Gene Moses, and guard Len Longholm.

Brown starred with green and gold fives before being transferred to the College of the Pacific under a war training program. He was one of the high scorers on the COP team while playing there. Longholm is another Lumberjack veteran and is playing his final season in a Humboldt uniform. He is a long shot specialist, but will only see action until his graduation in February.

Moses and Eshleman are both playing their initial season with the Lumberjacks. Moses is an uncanny hook shot artist and is also one of the best ball handlers and floor men on the squad. Eshleman is another speedster who picks up most of his points on layins and shots from the side.

Battling with Longholm for the starting assignments at the guard posts are three more cagers who are in their first season here, Prince Maloof, Wakefield Funk, and Gene Davis. All are top notch passers and ball handlers.

At present, Willamette is an unknown quality here, but the Salem, Oregon, cagers are said to possess a well balanced, experienced quintet. They met the Oregon State five at Corvallis last weekend.

## OPEN LETTER TO THE STUDENT COUNCIL:

We, the workers and staff of the Humboldt Lumberjack, have certain demands to make of the Student Body.

The Humboldt Lumberjack is the official newspaper of the Student Body, yet we must rely on advertisements for more than half of our revenue. The contracts have been signed for a total of seventeen issues at the rate of \$.30 per inch. The total space of the Lumberjack is 400 inches, 130 of which is used for advertisements. After deducting space for the Staff Box, Masthead, etc., it is easy to see that there is space for little else than a few news articles and organization notices which naturally come before personal columns.

Therefore, in order to fulfill the desires of the individual students for an interesting Lumberjack, we request that we be allowed to publish one issue of six pages every other week, beginning with the first week of the new semester, with one issue every week of four pages until then, in order to conform with the letter and spirit of the contracts we have with the advertisers. We may expect a deviation from the established budget, with a larger deficit for six pages than we have for each four page publication.

The advertisements will then take up less than 20 percent of the total space, as compared with the present 32 percent. The increase of news space will be in relation to the whole of the advertisement allotment, and will therefore permit a great deal more complete coverage than heretofore allowed. In turn, we promise to edit a better and more well rounded paper than has appeared so far this school year.

The Humboldt Lumberjack already has the distinction, though rather dubious, of being the only college newspaper that doesn't have a typewriter to its name. So we hereby request that three (though we'll settle for one) typewriters be issued to the Lumberjack office.

This is the first time that the Lumberjack has appeared for some length of time. Rightfully, there has been considerable indignation on the part of the student body due to absence of what should and can be one of the principal factors in the life of a college. In order to alleviate the undeniably sad journalistic situation at Humboldt, certain students have seen fit to improve this paper and turn it

into something of which each and every student here may be proud.

However, regardless of what these few may do this year and next, there is always a possibility that the Lumberjack may again lapse into the same depths which has characterized it for the past several years. One reason for this stands out above all others. That is the absolute absence of an adequate journalism department at Humboldt State College.

There is no possible reason why in a college with an enrollment of over 600 students training cannot be provided in newspaper work for those interested. While the college paper, as a student body activity in which all are eligible to participate, should not be turned out by the journalism students, it would nevertheless offer them an opportunity to apply their learning.

Until such a program is undertaken here, and only then, the students will not be getting something which they deserve, a truly good Lumberjack.

## Broad Intramural Slate Swings Into Play Here

In the sports world at Humboldt State, intramural basketball has taken a small portion of the spotlight in the past several weeks. Play in intramural basketball is in full swing now with games being run at least twice a week.

The intramural program was begun under the direction of the Physical Education Department in an effort to promote a broad sports program which would include anyone in school who wanted to participate. Teams are sponsored by various clubs and organizations on the campus. These teams will play in basketball, volleyball, softball as well as participating in individual sports such as tennis, golf, badminton, archery, basketball free-throws, horseshoes, archery, table tennis.

Teams competing will have an opportunity to win points for their organization which will be accumulative and point toward the yearly organizational plaque. Individuals will have an opportunity in individual and dual sports to win points for their organizations and also for themselves. In the latter case they will be accumulating points to disclose best performer in intramurals. In scoring the activities will be grouped as follows:

1. Team activities
  - a. 5 points for every contest

won.

- b. 1 point for standing at the end of the league play. For example—one point for last place, the leading team to receive the number of points equal to the number of teams in the league.

- c. 25 points for a championship.

- d. In case of a tie each team to receive one-half the normal points.

2. Individual or dual sports.
  - a. 1 point for winning a match in singles.
  - b. 2 points for winning a match in doubles.
  - c. 10 points for championship.

In case of a forfeit the individual or team forfeiting will lose their organization the number of points that would have been earned if the contest were won. The board will have to decide what deduction should be set for poor sportsmanship.

Individual points will be given on the following basis:

1. 5 points to each player for every team victory.
2. 1 point for competing in a game not won.
3. 5 points for each single or doubles victory.
4. 1 point for competing in

## ETHICS

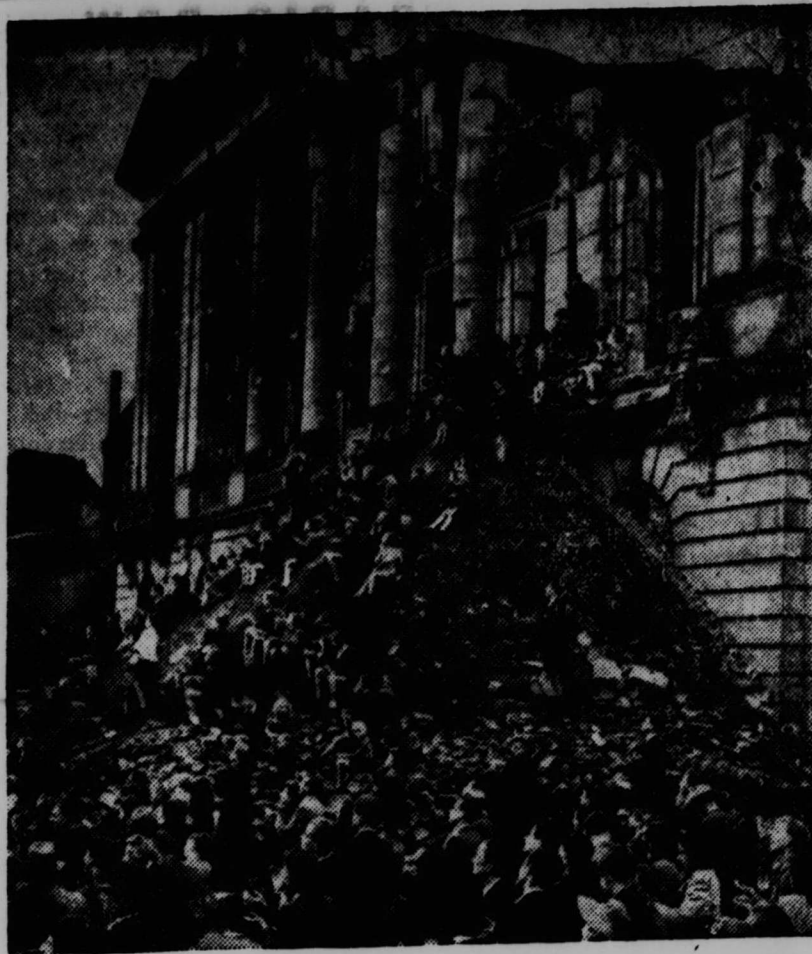
Ethics this week dictates information on the fine art of skiing. Dictates, because the only thing that he can still move is his tongue.
