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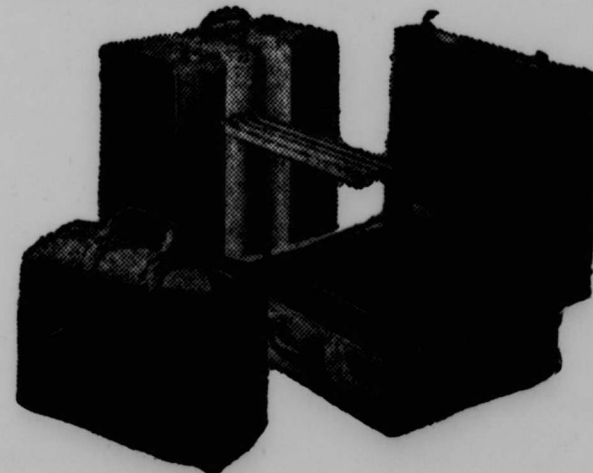
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# BIG DIP TAKEN FROM TREASURY

(more Laguna than beach) The action breaks (crash) and curtains open (if Wally MacMillan has the strength). We find Theron Carothers and Mr. Gist's dog chatting over their tattings. Suddenly a keg of dynamite goes off and Dr. Bailey comes on. The villain shoots our hero and Slimy Gus steals the package on Spearmint, leaps on his saddle shoes and gallops off.

We won't ruin everything by telling you the ending.

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
