## Students Make Fall Play Sets

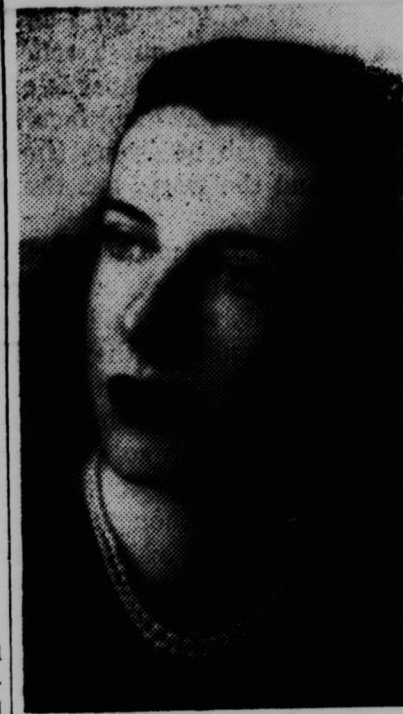

## Dean Reports on College Budget

Dr. Homer Balabanis returned recently from Sacramento where he went to explain and justify the college budget before the Department of Finance. The hearing was attended by representatives of the Department of Finance, the Department of Education, and the state colleges.

Humboldt State College is asking \$495,000 for expenses to operate for one year, and \$155,000 for capital outlay; a total of \$650,000. The college is also requesting additional instructors for the college and college elementary school in anticipation of increasing enrollment.

### A LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

For a semester and a half I have been editor of the LUMBERJACK. I believe that I have done the job as well as it could be done under the circumstances. Although I have enjoyed the job, for the most part, putting out a school paper when the printing plant which prints the paper is off the campus takes much more time than students and faculty are apt to realize. This results in the job becoming time-consuming, grueling work. I can stand the work, but there are only twenty-four hours in a day.

Until recently I felt that there would be no LUMBERJACK unless I remained on the paper's staff, because there were only two persons in the student body who could do the job properly, so far as could be determined, and they could not, by virtue of previous commitments, accept the editorship, and the production of the paper demanded that it be produced under the direction of one person, in so much as the LUMBERJACK organization was loosely knit. This situation no longer exists in its entirety. Although no one person willing to accept the responsibilities of editorship has been discovered, there is now within the student body a group of persons who can put out the paper until a new editor is found. That group is the Journalism 20 (News-writing) class, under the direction of Mr. Bert Alward, assistant professor of English and Journalism. This class has done most of the work on the last two issues of the LUMBERJACK, and there is no doubt in my mind that they can put out the remaining four issues of the paper due this semester, with or without an editor. This is especially true, I believe, in so much as Marilyn Brizard, assistant editor of the LUMBERJACK, is a member of the class.

Therefore, in view of the foregoing, I hereby inform the student body of Humboldt State College that I have resigned as editor of the LUMBERJACK, effective with the publication of this issue of the paper.

### The Lumberjack Back In '34

Again the LUMBERJACK re-prints a story from one of its back numbers.

APRIL 5, 1934

"Lumber Company Now On Old College Site."

Humboldt State Teachers College had had two sites and been housed in three different sets of buildings.

The college opened in 1914 in quarters in the old Arcata Grammar school building, which stood at that time near the railroad tracks, on what is now the property of the Hammond-Little River Redwood Company.

The college moved to its present location on January 1, 1916. However, the present buildings around the quadrangle had not yet been erected.

Instead, students and faculty found a one-story frame structure composed of four long sections, in the shape of the letter "E." The present college Commons formed the bottom of this "E", with the administrative offices in the present "South Room" of the Commons, and the rest of the present commons was occupied by the domestic science department and the college library.

The middle arm of the "E" was about as it is today except, of course that the present "little gym" was "the" gymnasium. The upper arm of the "E", now occupied by the industrial arts department, then was given over to the college training school. Incidentally, underneath this section where fortunate ones now park their cars there were machine shops.

What is now the girl's dormitory at that time formed the back of the "E", running east and now filled by the south end of the social unit and the present library. It then contained the industrial arts department and several class rooms. It was "taken for a ride" to its present location when construction started on the

present main building in 1919.

There was no college commons in those days. Students living too far away to go home for the noon meal brought their lunches with them, and ate them wherever convenient. Eureka students came over on the train and walked up from the station. Beginning in 1922, however, the train was run to the foot of the college hill: there is still near there a railroad sign reading "Normal Junction."

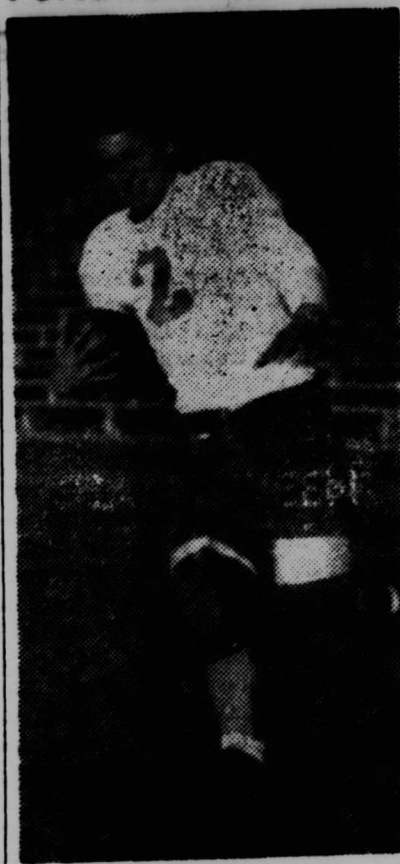
Opening contest of the '48 casaba season will find the varsity tangling with the potent Fort Humboldt American Legion five on the college floor, Friday night, December 3.

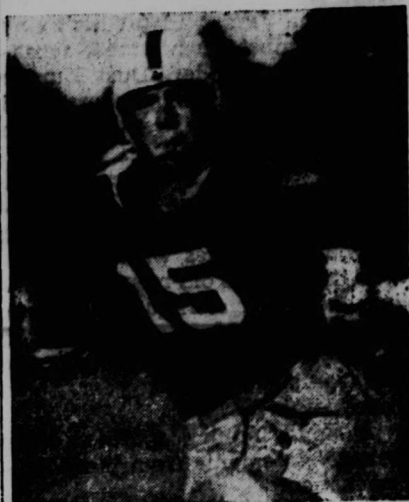
