Don Chamberlain announced the program, while Pat Hofferbert acted as technical director, under the supervision of Ted DeLay, Professor of Speech. The program was recorded the previous Tuesday, March 9, before the college extension class in Public Opinion at the Eureka Junior High School.

HSC Students Urged To Report House Vacancies

All students of Humboldt State who learn of housing vacancies, either in Arcata or Eureka, are urged to report the fact to the office of the Dean of Students.

Mr. Harry Griffith, Dean of Students, stated recently that there are some 60 couples at HSC who are waiting for places to live.

"Last fall," Mr. Griffith said, explaining the college housing situation, "forty couples were unable to enroll at Humboldt State because they could not find places to live."

He stated also that many single students were unable to enter HSC last fall for the same reason.

Anyone who knows about a rental, either a house or an apartment, is urged by Mr. Griffith to inform his office as to the address of the rental. This will enable HSC home-seekers to investigate.

Student Council Statement Clarified

The statement over the signature of the Executive Council relative to book costs which appeared in a recent issue of the LUMBERJACK should be corrected. The Executive Council secured the information from the office of the Dean of Students and was in error when it stated that books selling at the bookstore for \$2.50 would cost as much as \$5.00 at public bookstores. Actually this might be the case, but intent of the article was to indicate that because of mark-up differential the bookstore would have to charge as much as \$5.00 to earn the same profit as some dealers.

There is a published book list price under which no dealer is supposed to sell, but the mark-up above this price is a matter of the individual dealer concerned.

1948 Hilarities Score Before Capacity Houses

A capacity audience enthusiastically received the fourth annual all-student show, the "Hilarities of 1948."

The two hour variety show was crammed with music, comedy, and dancing, all cleverly tied together by means of "Grandfather Witherspoon's" reminiscences while looking through the family scrapbook.

The highlights of "Past, Present, and Posterity" were the musical numbers. Outstanding solos were offered by Donn Stephens, June Gassaway, and Gene Orlandi, while the College Choir and the Troubadours contributed delightful selections to the excellent program. The original music written by John Gasser, Elmer Haskin, Ted Lantheaume, and Fern Stahl was especially tuneful and melodious.

The comedy honors went to the players of the melodramatic "Nellie Finds Romance," with Mary Hull, Bryan Shieman, and Ray Phillips turning in excellent performances. Jim Edwards as the hotel clerk in the "Honeymoon" number and Charlotte Marks as Calamity Jones in the 1865 scene won praise from the audience for their very fine acting. EDITORIAL

The constitution of the Associated Students of Humboldt State College has been revised and the students are asked to note the major change in the election laws. The proposed system of elections serves two main purposes.

First, in providing overlapping terms for council members, the system guarantees that half the council will have been in office one semester when a new student government takes over, thereby guaranteeing that four people will have the word on recent student affairs.

Second, the system allows eight council members instead of six. It seems that with a larger student body we should have large representation in the student government.

Certain other changes include more stringent qualifications for student body president and the insertion of amendments passed during the past several years.

This constitution will be presented for ratification by the students at the next regular body meeting. Everyone is urgently requested to attend the discussion and vote upon the document under which you will be governed. It would be well for each student to become acquainted with the constitution before the scheduled meeting.

Dear E, in answer to your request that the social unit be equipped with hot water, soap, etc. The co-ordinating committee has done the following: It has made arrangements so that anyone contacting Miss Vincent in accordance with the minimum three day application (notification) for the use of the social unit shall be given a slip to fill out for the use of dishes, soap, towels, etc. This slip will then be given to the school custodian (Fred Ogilwy) who will see that the needed supplies are available on the specified day. Fred is checking on the hot water supply now and hopes to rectify the situation.

Due to your gripe, E, all these supplies can be taken care of now with just one brief stop at Miss Vincent's office. Your gripe yesterday was today's solution—keep up the good work.

Answer to Gripe on Allocation of Funds to Band, Sports, etc.

First, a misunderstanding must be corrected. The \$1,006.25 was apportioned for band and orchestra, not just band alone. Generally, a given number of people in band and orchestra require more money to do a comparable amount of work or advertising for the school than do an equal number of people in choir because of the expense of musical instruments. In the past it has not been generally true that departments are self-supporting. We hope that to be the case this year. Athletics should be, but it cannot be assumed that dramatics or music or any other department will be self-supporting, although they may be.

Athletics receives \$2.50 from each student membership. This is the largest single subsidy, true, but the program has the largest number of participants. It does more than any other department in establishing intercollege relations.

We do not attempt to justify any situation. These are the facts as the majority saw fit to approve in the budget. H.S.C. has a right to boast all of its departments.

President Truman and many educators predict that the peak has been reached by veterans seeking education and training under the GI Bill of Rights and Vocational Rehabilitation Law (Public Law 16). This is a prediction that may or may not be borne out by the fact that veterans in training under these laws, reached an all-time high in December 31, 1947.

As of that date 2,801,687 veterans were enrolled in some type of education or training, which was an increase of 410,017 over the total of 2,391,670 on the same date a year before.
