Arcata Group Presents Play

Recently the Arcata Community Theatre, a group of local people interested in play production, presented "THE MALE ANIMAL" at the College Elementary School. Among members of the cast were several persons from Humboldt State College, including Mrs. Harry Griffith, Mrs. Leon Dillon, Eddie O'Donnel, and Leland Barlow.

The comedy, by James Thurber, was of particular interest because it portrayed the struggle of a college professor against reactionary trustees. Mrs. Griffith, as the wife of the professor, and Mr. Barlow, as the ultra-conservative trustee, were excellent in leading roles. Supporting players E. O'Donnel, as a radical student, and Mrs. Dillon, as the girl he loves. Both enacted their parts well. O'Donnel handled his drunk scene in Act Two with a realism that indicated long rehearsal.

The Community Theatre presents at least one play annually and needs new members, both as actors and for help behind the scenes. This is a good opportunity for those who cannot participate in student activities, particularly members of the faculty, their wives, and wives of students. President Gist Submits HSC Budget To State

President Arthur S. Gist of Humboldt State College has submitted a budget to the state with an expenditure of \$762,841 for the fiscal year 1948-49.

This budget is expected to go before the assembly ways and means committee Monday for pre-session consideration of the document. The budget includes an increase of \$201,508 in expenditures for the college. It also includes \$121,371 expected as revenue from fees, rentals and other sources.

Of the proposed expenditures, \$438,206 would be for support including \$349,788 for salaries and wages; \$47,903 for operating expenditures and \$40,515 for equipment. An estimated \$325,635 will go for capital outlay.

The budget proposes the expenditure of \$295,000 for the purchase of sites for buildings, dormitories and playfields—one of which would be a practice football field.

BULLETIN

Since the above article was written, the state legislature has passed on the HSC budget. (See editorial.)

Enrollment Normal For Spring Session

Registration this semester is normal, as compared to last semester, it has been stated by Myrtle McKittrick, registrar.

Many students thought that registration this semester had reached a new low, but that is not true. Here are the figures to prove it: Six hundred forty-nine as compared to 653 hopefuls last fall. If anything, Humboldt State is expanding and not decreasing in student enrollment. Last Fall, 739 students signed up for various courses, which over shadows the present registration figure. However, one must realize that there are always a few who are late-comers, so the figures will probably be just about even. It is not difficult to see that the Fall registration will naturally be larger than that of the Spring. It seems that most students graduate from high school in the summer, for some strange reason.

Many people have often wondered what the ratio is between men and women here in these ivy covered halls. One hundred and fifty-three women have signed the dotted lines so far, as compared to 496 individuals of the male gender. Need more be said.

It was generally agreed after spring that the new registration system is better than that used in previous years. Students are not the only ones who go short periods spent in lines. It seems the faculty agreed almost unanimously that the new set-up is the best.

"Post, Paste, and Posterity" Title of HSC Annual Show

"Paste, Paste, and Posterity" was the theme selected by the Humboldt students to title their Annual Spring Hilarities which will be presented March 11, 12, 13 in the college auditorium.

The 1948 Hilarities at Humboldt State will open with a scene on the college stage immediately after the Hilarities of '47 closed. Plans are discussed in this scene for the big show of 1948. The grandfather of one of the students enters into the discussion and through him and his family the audience is taken into the continuity of the show which is based on college years of the past, bringing out the theme: "Past, Paste, and Posterity."

The first act is presented in the form of a melodrama. Grandfather's oldest son, who is attending Princeton University, tangles with a villain from Yale. This traditional hero, heroine, villain melodrama presents a gripping drama of the past.

1920—The scene for Act II is a pre-game Stanford vs. California football rally, staged in the San Francisco Palace Hotel. Exemplifying the "Roaring Twenties" will be dances such as the Charleston, and Bunny-hug.

HSC GETS IT IN THE NECK AGAIN

An article in the last issue of the LUMBERJACK stated that Humboldt State College was to receive "funds totaling \$200,000 for sites for play fields."

However, since that article appeared, the education subcommittee of the California Assembly ways and means committee has seen fit to delete this \$200,000 from the college's expenditure budget, and the result is, naturally, that HSC will not receive its play fields.

This action seems odd on the part of our state government, especially when the play fields are greatly needed. But even more odd is the fact that the state could very easily afford to provide HSC with the facilities needed, in so much as the treasury of the State of California is now stuffed with more funds than it has ever before contained.

This case of the added play fields is not the first time that HSC has come out on the short end of a political football play. Last year the college requested funds to provide a swimming pool here. The result of that request was that after the bill appropriating the money had made its way through the state assembly, Governor Warren saw fit to defeat the appropriation by pocket veto.

By these acts, it would seem that our state government is not much interested in Humboldt becoming a great credit to the State of California. It seems that every time the college administration desires to improve the value of HSC, the state government throws a wrench in the machinery.

Perhaps the students of state colleges should take up Lobbying as a pastime.

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New Probation Rules at HSC Clarified

Forty-five students were placed upon probation at the end of the semester just closed, it was announced today by the Registrar's office. Nine of the forty-five are women students.

Under the new rules governing probation, Mrs. Myrtle McKittrick, Registrar, pointed out, the student's cumulative record is the factor which determines his status, and not the semester index as was the case under the old plan.

The rules provide that any student who has a grade point shortage of ten or more honor points is placed upon probation. The grade point shortage is determined by subtracting the honor points from the units attempted. If the student increases the shortage from ten to fifteen points, he will be disqualified. This means that a student on probation must make substantially a "C" average to avoid disqualification. If he makes better than a "C" average, the shortage would be decreased, and if it is less than ten, he would be off probation.

"C" AVERAGE REQUIRED

For graduation, the honor points earned must equal the units attempted. If they are exactly equal, this is a "C" average, or an index of 1.00.

"Units attempted" refers to the number of units for which the student is registered in courses that carry honor points. If the report card shows in the "units attempted" column 15-1, it is the first figure, 15 in this case, which is used in computing scholarship standings. The "-1" indicates a course which does not carry honor points, as Orientation II.

Students having questions about scholarship standing may call at the registrar's office for further explanation.

Students Often Conduct Class

Wildlife Techniques (Wildlife Management 5) is receiving excellent results through student participation in the course. Lately, activities have been diversified.

Students are often given the opportunity to conduct the class. Last week Fred Cook and Earl Biehn illustrated trapping procedures to the group. They demonstrated coyote and gopher sets, as well as small bird and animal traps, the latter being constructed of string. Last Wednesday, techniques in the preparation of mammal skins for museum mounts were carried out.

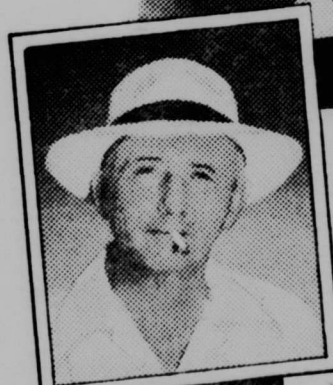
