

Little Symphony Concert Planned

The Humboldt Little Symphony will be heard in its January Concert January 15th, at 8:15 in the Eureka Junior High School Auditorium. The orchestra, sponsored by the Division of Fine and Applied Arts, will present a program of music by Bach, Beethoven, Mendelssohn and Schubert.

One of the featured numbers on the program is the Mendelssohn E-minor Violin Concerto played by Henry Simonson and accompanied by the orchestra. Mr. Simonson was formerly a member of the Los Angeles Philharmonic and has recently made his home in this community. He has been a member of the Seattle symphony as well as the Los Angeles orchestra and has appeared many times in the metropolitan areas.

Charles Fulkerson, conductor of the orchestra, is a member of the Division of Fine and Applied Arts at Humboldt State College and is well known for his musical activities and achievements here and elsewhere. Last summer he appeared a second time as soloist at the Bach Festival in Carmel and has been requested to return next summer to again play in the festival. He has had varied experience in the conducting field including director of the San Jose Light Opera Company for 2 seasons and assistant choral conductor to William J. Finn, the summer of 1943. Fulkerson studied orchestral conducting at U. S. C. under Lucian Calliett and has been conductor of the Humboldt Little Symphony since the war.

The orchestra personnel is made up of musicians from all neighboring Humboldt communities including Eureka, Arcata, Fortuna, and Ferndale. College students form the nucleus of the orchestra and are actively interested in the more serious forms of music and orchestral playing.

This concert will consist of symphonic works entirely and will mark the orchestra's first appearance this season. This will be the first time the orchestra has appeared in concert, alone in its history. Because of the fine caliber of its musicians, the group has been able to prepare a complete symphonic presentation of music by the masters.

Student Body members are admitted to this concert without charge but must procure tickets from the Student Body Office prior to the date of the concert.

Hilarities of '48 Open March 11

Just nine weeks from this coming Thursday, (or on March 11), "Hilarities of 1948," featuring a "Cavalcade of College Life" theme, will open on the stage of the college auditorium.

Rehearsals will start at the beginning of next semester and will be held during students' free periods on Monday and Wednesday or Tuesday and Thursday. The student written acts for this year's show range from serious drama to comedy, farce, and musical comedy.

Wildlifers To Take Quail Census

After the quail season is over, the students of the Humboldt State College Wildlife Department will take a quail census on the "North Spit." Prior to the opening of hunting season the Wildlife students made a census on the same spit.

The number of birds totaled in the last census will be subtracted from the number totaled in the previous census. The results will reveal the kill for the season and determine whether or not the area was overhunted.

Notes For HSC Motorists

Defective rear windows, as well as windshields, are now unlawful. A police officer may arrest you and require you to produce in court evidence that your rear window, as well as your windshield, conforms to requirements of the code.

The Department of Motor Vehicles has announced that license renewal is now in progress, and will continue until February 4. Private passenger car owners renewing by mail should not forget to add \$3 to their present fee and round the amount off to the nearest dollar.

The minimum 1948 fee is \$7.00.

Humboldt State College, although small in total enrollment compared to some of California's better known colleges and universities, is high on the list of institutions with large schools of education. In the past year, the School of Education at Humboldt has skyrocketed from 1/5 to 1/3 of its total enrollment. This, plus the facts that it has been honored with the state presidency of the C.S.T.A., and is the only college in this area, makes it of major, state-wide importance in the education of teachers.

The semi-annual conferences of the CSTA (California Student Teachers' Association) and the C.T.A. (its parent organization) were held simultaneously in Los Angeles on the 5th and 6th of December. The H.S.C. chapter president, Bob Thoman, returned from the conferences all fired up with ideas on teacher recruitment. This problem is the most important one facing education at this time so it received high priority.

Reports at this meeting from the various college chapters offered many suggestions that Humboldt could follow, two of which will definitely be undertaken after the membership drive is completed at the spring semester registration.

One is the formation of panels to send to the high schools in this section to discuss with the school's prospective graduates the attributes of the teaching profession and answer their problems concerning same. The other is the sponsoring of high school Future Teachers of America Clubs. Mr. Harry Griffith and Mr. Albert Graves, co-sponsors of the C.S.T.A. at Humboldt, are in complete accord with these ideas and feel that it will help considerably to induce high school students into the (wide-open) teaching profession.

Mr. Griffith stated that he expected the local C.S.T.A. membership to reach its all-time high of over 100 members in February. This will give it two voting delegates, plus the state president, at the state convention—more than any other school in the state including the universities represented.

Mr. Gist announced that the organization, which is both recognized and recommended by the school, will receive complete support from the faculty in its membership drive and activities.

New Editor

Vernon Whalen, a former newspaper reporter, and now an education major at Humboldt State, has been chosen to succeed Paul Gelfman as editor of the LUMBERJACK. Whalen, with the aid and advice of the LUMBERJACK staff, the faculty, and the student body, hopes to improve the paper's content and increase its value to those for whom it is published.

Registrar Tells Probation Rules

"Any student short ten or more honor points, who is now on probation, and who increases his shortage by five or more honor points with this semester's grades will be subject to dismissal," Mrs. Evelyn Plunkett, recorder, announced recently.

At the end of this semester anyone who has an honor point shortage of ten or more will be put on probation automatically. From then on, according to Mrs. Plunkett, all probation cases will be handled under the system outlined above.

One honor point is awarded to a student for each hour of credit earned, two for each hour of B, and three for each hour of A. Honor points which a student needs to maintain a C average are considered a shortage.

KHSC Announces Department Heads

The Radio Workshop has announced the appointments of the following personnel to head various departments at Radio station KHSC.

Cameron Woods will be in charge of the News Bureau and all special events. Cameron has already made one change for the better, namely: The evening news broadcast has been shifted from 6 p. m. to 5:30 p. m., which will enable those listeners who eat in the Commons to digest news as well as food.

Bob Crittenden has been appointed Music Director; Don Chamberlain will be Program Director, assisted by Loretta Allen as Continuity Chief.

The greatest delay in getting on the air, as many may have guessed, is caused by the difficulty in getting parts and material. Mr. Delay expressed hopes last week of receiving the long awaited shipments soon after the Yule Tide rush.

Works of Daumier, Rebot, Legros and other great French artists are included in the exhibit to be shown from eleven to five in the afternoon.

Sponsoring the exhibit is the college art department, under the direction of Mr. Bullen and Mr. Schuler. The art department also announces plans for the coming Regional Art Festival to be held at the College in February.

Exhibited at this time will be works of many outstanding west coast artists. A portion of the show will be devoted to elementary and high school art, in addition to works of Humboldt College students and faculty, and local artists.

Alpha Psi Omega To Present Play

Alpha Psi Omega, Humboldt's dramatic honorary, will present Edmond Rostand's heroic comedy, "Cyrano de Bergerac," in a fifty minute play reading during the 1:00 p. m. assembly hour next Tuesday, January 13, in the college auditorium. This is the first of two play readings to be given before the end of this semester.

Clif Mitchell, who recently turned in an outstanding performance as Jimmie Masters in "Joan of Lorraine," will interpret the juicy dramatic role of Cyrano. Jane Saunders will read the part of Roxane, his leading lady. The part of Christian will be played by Bob Wasson, who contributed a superior performance as Cauchon, the Bishop of Beauvais, in "Joan of Lorraine." The role of the Duenna will be read by Mary Meyer in her first appearance before a student audience. Darrel Altimus and Dick Sierka, who both appeared in the fall play, will appear as de Guiche and Le Bret respectively. Zatha Tallman will carry the performance along as the narrator. The production is being directed by Jinx Kennedy.

Cyrano de Bergerac is acclaimed one of the greatest of romantic comedies of the nineteenth century. It was first performed in Paris in 1897 with the immortal Constant Coquelin in the title role. The beautiful lines sparklingly humorous dialogue, and fast dramatic action offer a wealth of opportunity for a high level of dramatic interpretation by the cast.

The assembly will start promptly at 1:05 p. m. No admission fee will be charged.

The National Education Association recently announced the opening of a campaign to win Congressional approval of a \$300,000,000-a-year program for federal aid to public schools, and the association's secretary, Willard E. Givens, revealed the amazing facts that there are 100,000 teachers employed on emergency, substandard certificates in the U.S.; that salaries are so low in many states that teacher's purchasing power is less than it was before the war; that more than 2,000,000 children are without proper instruction, and that there are educational slum districts in many states.

The problem of the \$300,000,000-a-year program for federal aid to public schools, along with the other problems of education mentioned above, should be of keen interest to the students of Humboldt State College who are majoring in education, because, as future educators, the plight of our educational system faces them. The problems of education are many, and one means by which educators, present and future, can gain the knowledge of what those problems are, the knowledge of how they may be overcome, and the unified front necessary for the utilization of that knowledge is by belonging to the "professional" education organizations open to them.

For the student-teachers of Humboldt State College, the opportunity to join such a "professional" group is now available. The organization is the California Student-Teachers' Association. The CSTA is now conducting a state-wide campaign to recruit into the organization all of the student-teachers in the state.

To gain entrance into the CSTA is not difficult. The fees involved are not great. The benefits to be gained are many. In view of the problems facing our education system, it is to the advantage of every student-teacher to belong to the California Student-Teachers' Association.

But more than that, it is every future California educator's duty.

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Scholarships Go Begging In U. S.

Scores of scholarships paying from \$50 to \$350 a year are going unused, and almost eighteen per cent of all scholarships and grants in the U. S. are inactive because of a lack of applicants.

According to nation-wide survey made by Varsity Magazine, thousands of dollars in school aid go begging each year simply because students are unaware of the fact that the grants exist. Moreover, the belief that proficiency in studies is the only basis for scholastic awards has discouraged individuals who may be eligible for other reasons.

A four-point program of obtaining information on scholarships is included in the Varsity report: (1) City and state scholarship lists can be obtained from local Boards of Education; (2) University catalogues list all scholarships available at the individual institution; (3) Library reference books mention all new scholarships announced in newspapers and magazines; and (4) A government publication entitled "Scholarships and Fellowships," available through the Government Printing Office in Washington, D. C., discusses most of the available American student aid grants.

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Registrar Designs New Pamphlets

Pamphlets, designed and written by Mrs. Myrtle M. McKittrick, have been received at the office of the Humboldt State College Registrar recently that give a concise picture of the courses that are required, or would be of help to students planning to enroll in the various fields at Humboldt State. These pamphlets will be used mainly for enclosure in letters of application to Humboldt, but students interested can get them at the Registrar's Office.

The pamphlets cover the fields of Art; Music; Speech, Radio, Dramatics, Economics and Business, Home Economics, Health, The Biological Sciences Including Wild-Life Management; Preparation for High School Teaching; and Social Sciences. In addition there are a number of general pamphlets, Looking Ahead To Humboldt State College and Humboldt State College, a four year liberal arts college.

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
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CES Has One State Gets One

CHICO STATE HAPPY


