Slated For Three Nite Run - Dec. 2, 3, 4

Tomorrow night marks the opening of "The Adding Machine", first play of its type to be presented by the Drama Department of Humboldt State College. The play will run December 2, 3, and 4 with all seats reserved.

Wilber Jensen and Marby Hampton will portray the lives of Mr. and Mrs. Zero, while Carol Beck takes the part of Daisy, Mr. Zero's secretary. The entire cast includes 23 players, many of whom are new to the Humboldt State stage.

When the curtains part and "The Adding Machine" begins, the audience will witness the directing art of Don Karshner and Student Director Zatha Bralich. However, the direction of the play was not all they had to do, for there were committees for make-up, costuming, sound effects, and publicity to appoint. Then to see that they carried out their work to perfection.

Don W. Karshner, Assistant Professor of Speech, at Humboldt State College has shown his ability to produce and direct plays in the past years at HSC. Every fall he and a group of dramatic students choose a serious play to enact; in the spring a 3 act comedy is chosen and produced. In this way the students will have a chance to do serious and comical acting. Some of the fine plays which Don Karshner has produced and directed are: Joan of Lorraine, Guest In the House, Blithe Spirit, and The Man Who Came to Dinner.

Each production needs student directors, and here is where Zatha Bralich takes her bow. Many readers will remember Zatha for her fine performance of Maggie in "The Man Who Came to Dinner". Zatha is a Speech-English major and is now in her Junior year at Humboldt. Her previous education was received at Long Beach Poly High School and Long Beach City College.

Staging for the fall play, "The Adding Machine," is under the direction and supervision of John Van Duzer, an assistant professor of Speech at Humboldt State College. He also has charge of lighting and sound effects, designing and painting scenery, building props, and seeing to it that the right props are in the right place

at the correct time. To assist John Van Duzer in these tasks are; set designing and painting, Dale Fagernas, Chris Nelson, Paula Elliot, Bob Russell, Jacquie Hiles, Mary Sue Blitch, Mary Hull, Margaret Wurche, and Mrs. Gladys Martin; set construction, Mal Buchanan, Dave Tolle, Lynwood Carranco, Rubin Peterson, George Fales, and Gene Bartlett.

Sound and lighting effects play a master part in the producing of "The Adding Machine." Rubin Peterson will handle the sound effects, while Harry Gift, Billy Johnson, and Lee Livingston provide the proper lighting atmosphere.

Another important group of unheard workers are those who collected, sewed, pressed, and prepared the costumes for "The Adding Machine". It was not easy finding dresses with hip-low waist lines or shoes with jeweled heels; but Joanne Compton with her committee of Mrs. Gladys Martin, and Pat Teich tackled the job and came up with all the necessary articles.

Standing in the wings with script in hand will be Leon Pike and Bertan Baker. These two will handle miscues and other speech difficulties.

Loa Kingston supervised the printing of tickets and programs. Arrangements for refreshments to be served at the college Social Unit during intermission are in capable hands of Pat Teiche.

Before the audience gathers in the auditorium, a make-up crew is busy with the job of preparing the facial characteristics of the actors to fit the person whom they are to portray. The job is not hard but requires skill, patience, and agility. In this department can be found Margaret Wurche, Janet Oppenheimer, Kathy Stockhoff, Loretta Allen, Dale Fagernas, Homer Harlin, Kathy Kiewatch, Bob Russell, Mariona Wurche, Jean Heise, Dorothy White, and Mary Hull.

With all committees tending to their jobs, "The Adding Machine" promises to be one of the best plays to be given at Humboldt State College. Constitution vs Rally Committee

The Rally Committee Chairman, Clay Carley, has stated that he believes the Song Queens and Yell Leaders are in a rut and are not serving the college to the best of their ability. When asked what he meant by this statement, he asserted that there have been no new routines worked up in the past two years or new yells originated.

By the way, I have seen no new half time stunts, if I even saw one, in the past two years. Could it be the Rally Committee that is in the rut? All I would like to know is, what more can the Song Queens and Yell Leaders do? Sure the Song Queens could work up new routines if the band would work up new songs, if there was no mud on the track, and if the rain didn't fall. According to a recent news item, a forty-one gun salute was fired in honor of England's new baby prince.

Why? So far there has been no report that this baby is fundamentally different from other babies, and I know of no evidence showing that his parents possess special physical, or mental, qualities.

Then why the hallyballoo? It is reiterated frequently that England is one of the leading democracies. Insofar as her system of representative government is concerned, this can be acknowledged cheerfully. But one of the principal connotations of the term "democracy" is totally contrary to the idea of divinity and superiority as attached to royalty.

Today, it is more or less commonly recognized that inequality at birth is a fact, but we still cherish — at least ostensibly — the principle that all persons should be given equal opportunity to develop in full socially desirable potentialities.

According to this, the new prince is not equivalent of any other baby — but, then, neither is he necessarily superior; that is, not superior except in the eyes of millions of Englishmen, who, although far advanced in some aspects, show in their reverence for

royalty a pathetic and somewhat inconsistent lack of philosophical maturity.

A recent speaker at H. S. C. reminded us that when dealing with Joe Stalin we are locking horns with an Asiatic.

Of course I have not had the travel experience of this speaker, Mr. Gros, but like other Americans I have come into contact with many nationalities — including Russians — and have acquired some knowledge of psychology and anthropology (check with Dr. MacGinitie). So, with humility, I venture to contest Mr. Gros' implication that Asiatics are different from other peoples in their basic make-up.

Confucius and Buddha were Asiatics. Can we place them in Stalin's category? Hitler and Mussolini were not Asiatics. Need we point out their similarity to the Georgian?

With due respect for Mr. Gros' sincerity and motives, I must say that these generalities implying fundamental differences between races are detrimental to attempts made to achieve world harmony. There is no scientific basis for such assumptions, their dissemination only contributing to the general confusion hindering solution of world problems.

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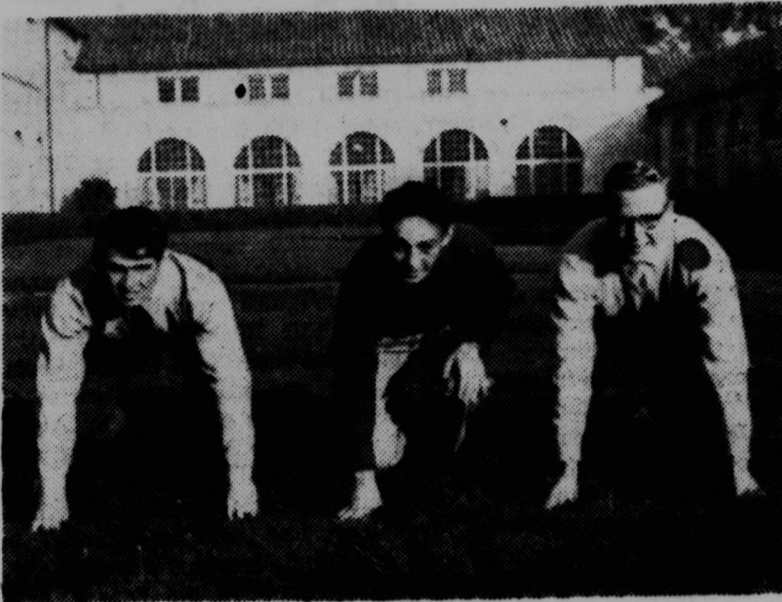

Elwin Dreyer, manager of the Chara Jersey Farm, owned by Ralph W. and Charlotte L. Brown, is teaching an agricultural course to students at Humboldt State. After obtaining his B.
