### Max Fisher Now C.S.T.A. State President

Max Fisher of Humboldt State College is now the state president of the California Student Teachers Association!

Max, an elementary education major, was installed into the state office on April 10 during the state convention of the C.S.T.A., held in the Palace Hotel, San Francisco, on April 9-10.

Also present at the state convention were Robert Thoman, president of the HSC chapter of the C.S.T.A., and Vernon Whalen, editor of the LUMBERJACK, who is the president-elect of the HSC chapter.

The state convention, composed of some 56 students representing nearly every college and university in California, is called twice a year by the C.S.T.A., for the purpose of disseminating information among the many schools involved.

The convention was concerned primarily with: 1. What are California Schools of Education doing toward disseminating information about professional organizations to education majors; and 2. What programs of C.S.T.A. recruitment are the schools undertaking. The convention was broken into committees which discussed these points. A report of what ensued will be given by HSC representatives at the next regular meeting of the local chapter, which will be held April 26.

At the close of the state convention, Bob Thoman was chosen by the delegates to represent the schools of Northern California at the UNESCO conference to be held in San Francisco on May 13, 14, and 15.

### Humboldt State Spring Concert Slated May 4

Many soloists will be heard at the Spring Concert to be held on May 4th in the Eureka High School Auditorium by the Humboldt Little Symphony which will make its second appearance this season.

One of the high-lights of the concert will be a "satirical suite," "the Carnival of the Animals," by Saint Saens. Hazel Jeffers and Joyce Cousins will be the duopiano soloists. Solo clarinet passages will be played by Duane Gurnee, formally of the Hollywood Bowl Orchestra. Margery Jones, a graduate of the Eastman School of Music at Rochester, will be heard on solo flute passages. Marvin Crawford will play xylophone and Elma May Draut will play harmonica. These instruments along with the string section of the orchestra make up the unique instrumentation of the suite.

This composition is scored for orchestra, chorus and baritone soloist. Leland Barlow, a member of the Division of Fine and Applied Arts of Humboldt State College, will be the baritone soloist in this work.

Many familiar faces will be seen and heard at this concert under the able direction of Charles Fulkerson.

There will be two performances, the first at 1:15 p. m. for the young people of Humboldt County and the other at 8:15 p. m. both on May 4th.

### Many Offices Undetermined; Run-Off Election Tomorrow

In the heaviest student body election ballot ever to be cast at Humboldt State College, Mark Melendy, a dark-horse entered by a surprise, highly organized third party, the Radical Party, was elected Monday by a majority to head the Associated Students of Humboldt State College during the 1948-49 school year.

Henry Frank and James Carvel both received a heavy vote for the vice-presidency, while Tom Wright and June Jorgensen received heavy votes for the office of secretary. However, neither of these offices was filled in Monday's election, but a run-off election will be held tomorrow in the social unit. The polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 4 p. m., as they were Monday.

Des Shanahan, the only candidate for the office of treasurer, needless to say, was elected.

### Brown Urges Club Elections

All clubs and organizations on the Humboldt State campus should have their elections before or during the week of the Associated Student Body elections, it has been announced by Darrel Brown, president of the Associated Students.

It is hoped holding elections early this year will allow clubs the chance of getting an early start on preparations for next year.

### President Gist Asks Safety Drive Be Held

A request by President Arthur Gist that some organization on the Humboldt State College campus undertake an extensive highway safety campaign high lighted a meeting of the Co-ordinating Committee last week. President Gist's idea was to present movies and safety experts to the student body for the purpose of arousing sentiment against careless driving as a means of decreasing highway accidents.

To facilitate President Gist's request, John Green, president of the Coordinating Committee, appointed a committee consisting of himself, Louise Frost, and under the chairmanship of Vernon Whalen, editor of the LUMBERJACK, to study the matter as to the method by which such a campaign could be undertaken.

Harold Tupper made a report to the Coordinating Committee concerning the college handbook, which will be published next Fall. Tupper reported that the Executive Council of the Associated Students had tentively appropriated \$250 for the handbook, which will contain no commercial advertising.

Also discussed by members of the committee were various methods by which student polls could be taken.

Mark Melendy, the president elect, has the distinction of being the first married man ever to be elected student body president of HSC.

Eight "write in" votes were cast for various offices, including one for Imogene Platt—as a councilman.

## EDITORIAL

A general practice in student-instructor relations is for students to be subjected to examinations (sometimes called tests) at the command of the instructor. The instructor sets the date and hour for the examination, and the student takes the examination at that time—or else. Of course, most instructors (perhaps all) allow students to “make up” examinations in cases when it is impossible for the student to be present at the appointed time. There may be some students who take advantage of instructors by creating reasons for not taking examinations at the appointed time, but their number, if they exist, is negligible.

It is unfortunate, however, that the students have no command over the punctuality of the instructors. Instructors subject students to examinations at specific, pre-arranged times, but are not compelled to correct the examinations and hand them back within any reasonable time after they have been given. In fact, it seems that some instructors never get around to handing papers back.

## This Situation is Entirely Unfair to Students!

Is there not some demoralizing effect generated within the students when their instructors give examinations and then make their classes sweat out weeks (sometimes months) of wondering whether or not the examinations were passed?

## After All, Our System is Based on These Examinations. They are Important to Students!

If instructors feel that examinations are not important enough to grade and hand back, then let us do away with them. Or at least give the students a fair break in this game. If it is within the instructors' rights to hold off grading and handing back examination, it should, in turn, be within the rights of the students to take the examinations when they please.

The removal of this “weak link” in Humboldt State's student-faculty relations should be undertaken by the faculty and the student body government as the first step in our recently conceived campaign to improve student-faculty relations at Humboldt State College.

Home Economics is higher education of college level designed for preparing to live as well as to prepare for earning a livelihood. Our H.S.C. college Home Economics Department aims to prepare girls as professional homemakers which implies all aspects of home and family life, such as child care, family relationships, family economics, clothing selection and construction, food purchasing, preparation and meal serving, as well as the use of all human resources of time, energy, talents, and wholesome personalities. Home Economics education trains not only to improve skills, but to develop healthy attitudes and relationships toward family members, neighbors, and citizens. Students working together in small informal groups develop a deeper understanding and appreciation of human beings by developing tolerance, cooperation, judgement and kindness.

Many courses are available to men who are also “homemakers,” for do they not also have personal, social and economic conflicts which may be enlightened by a home economics background?

We have every reason to believe that all of Northern California would profit appreciably in greater values received for every person and family in Home Economics education and its broad and varied opportunities were more clearly understood and appreciated by every man, woman and child of this community.

## Elementary Teachers Still In Demand

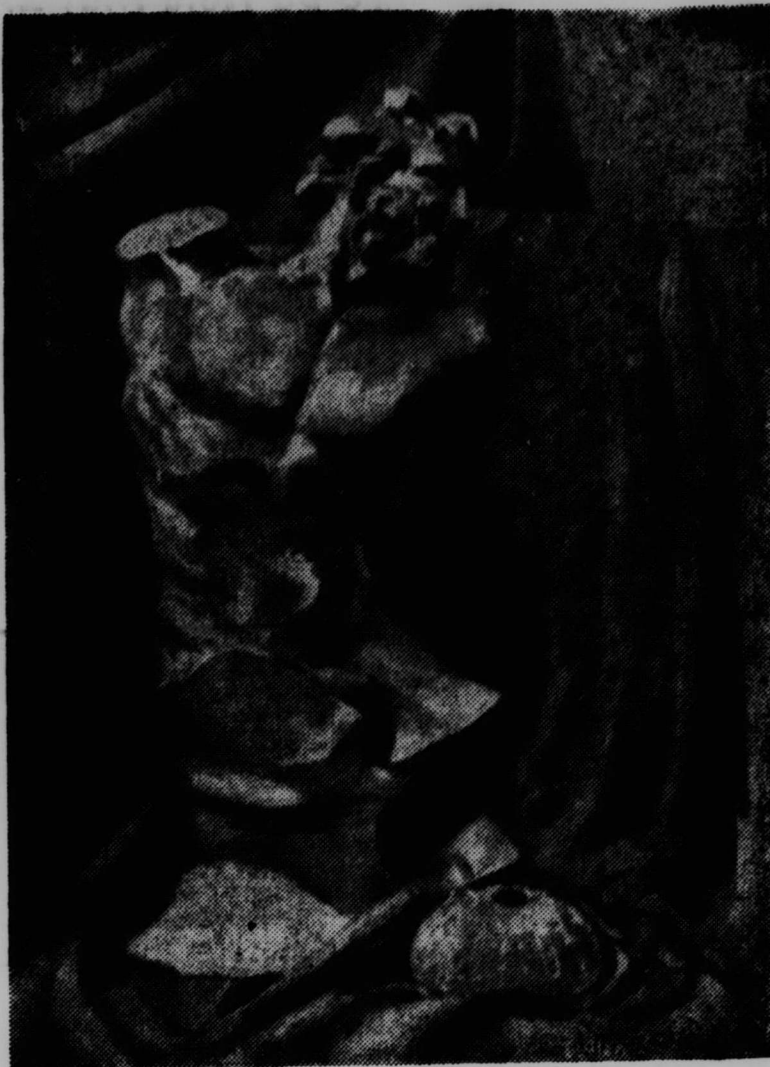
Elementary school teachers are in great demand in California, but an adequate number of high school and junior college teachers are employed in most sections of the State, according to Lloyd D. Bernard, manager of the University of California Bureau of Guidance and Placement.

"We are losing ground in the race between elementary school teacher supply and demand," says Mr. Bernard. "War babies are now entering the kindergarten and enrollments will continue to increase rapidly. California's birth rate is still rising and her general population increasing while the number of teachers in training is up only slightly."

However, Mr. Bernard stated that he believed 1948 should see a reasonably adequate supply of high school teachers except in agriculture, home economics, girl's physical education, industrial arts and business administration.

"Similarly, the junior college teacher supply should be sufficient except in these fields," he said.

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## Seniors Win Track Meet; Brown, Soule Shine

"It is", replied a redfaced bystander wearing a freshman beanie.

"It is", replied a sloppily dressed individual carrying a dilapidated notebook on which was inscribed, "two more years to go and I start livin' again."

"Yeah", replied a disgruntled character wearing a dripping sweatshirt on which was printed "if the next year is as bad as the last three, draft me!"

Yes, all three of the perturbed bystanders answered the unidentified gentleman's question correctly, as student prexy Darrel Brown, won four first places to pace the powerful senior cinderpath artists to an overwhelming victory in the H.
