Northwestern Calif. Group To Meet In All-Day Session

"Career Day" is the theme of the first Northwestern California Homemaking Conference to be sponsored here April 10 by the Home Economics Club of Humboldt State College. Guests of the club for the day will include delegates from Arcata, Eureka, Fortuna, Ferndale, Miranda, Hoopa, Crescent City, Fort Bragg, Mendocino, Hopland, Boonville, Willits, Leggett Valley, Middletown, Upper Lake, Lower Lake, Lakeport, and Laytonville.

The program for the day is planned to acquaint the girls with the opportunities and values offered from a higher education in home economics. A wealth of information will be presented regarding the many advantages a homemaker can gain from a general home economics course and the innumerable professional positions available for home economics graduates.

A welcome address from President Gist in the morning will include a brief history of the schools and the department. Mr. Don Karshner, chairman of the Division of Fine and Applied Arts, will view the future of home economics education at Humboldt State College. Dr. Ivan Milhous, Dean of Professional Education, will tell the guests of the importance of the program.

A recent reduction in force by the Veterans Administration has necessitated the limitation of the type of problems the Guidance Center at HSC will be able to handle. Mr. John M. Houston, Chief of the Center announced today.

Mr. Scott Nagel, VA Training Officer, who has been giving veterans aid in filing delinquent subsistence appeals, changes of address, and other problems under PL 346, has had to extend his territory and is now serving only veterans under PL 16. Men under the G. I. Bill at HSC are urged to see the College Registrar's Office for VA forms and to write directly to San Francisco concerning their problems, always using their "C" number.

The Guidance Center handles vocational advisements and educational testing only. Mr. Houston urges veterans who are interested in taking interest and aptitude tests to make appointments with him as soon as possible since present plans call for the closing of the Center on June 30.

Student body elections will be held on Monday, April 19, 1948.

The members of the student body have been notified about petitioning procedure through the medium of the bulletin board. However, anyone planning to turn in a petition to the executive council should remember that such petitions must be turned in before Monday, April 12. They may be put in student box 76 as late as 8:00 that morning.

The polls will be located as usual in the social unit and will be open from eight to four. All student body members are urged to vote in order to insure a true representation of the wishes of the students in general.

The following section of the constitutional by-laws is printed to give complete information on the election laws. It should be pointed out that at the student body meeting of March 18, the Executive Council was given permission to set the election date without regard to the new constitution.

SECTION I. ELECTIONS.

1. The officers of this Association shall be elected by secret ballot.

2. Voting polls shall be open from 8:00 A. M. to 4:00 P. M. There must be two inspectors at the polls at all times. The votes shall be counted by the Executive Council and the results shall be posted the next day.

3. The nomination of officers shall be by signed petition of twenty-five members of the Associated Students. Petitions for nomination shall be filed with the Executive Council not less than one week or more than three weeks prior to the primary elections, during which time a notice to the effect that nominations are in order shall be posted on the official bulletin board, and shall be published in the LUMBERJACK. Such notice shall include a copy of this section, a list of the officers to be nominated, and the date of the primary election.

4. There shall be two general elections, one to be held between March 1 and March 15, the other to be held between December 1 and December 15. These shall be called the Spring Election and Winter Election respectively. There shall be chosen at the Spring Election the following Student Body officers: President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and two men and two women members

EDITORIAL

In the last issue of this paper there appeared an editorial, written by the President of the Associated Students of Humboldt State College, which explained that the constitution of the Associated Students of Humboldt State College had been revised and that the new version would be presented for ratification by the students at a subsequent regular student body meeting.

"Everyone," wrote Darrel Brown, the student body president, "is urgently requested to attend the discussion and vote upon the document under which you will be governed."

Just prior to the recent Spring Vacation the president of the Associated Students of Humboldt State College called a Student Body Meeting, the meeting during which the above mentioned constitution was to be discussed and voted upon. This meeting was properly advertised on the bulletin board situated in the main hall, and it was held at the designated time, and the constitution in question was ratified per schedule—BY SOME 52 MEMBERS OF THE ASSOCIATED STUDENTS OF HUMBOLDT STATE COLLEGE.

This is a record of which the students of HSC should be proud. After all, there are only 680 students enrolled at Humboldt.

If the students of Humboldt State College are any criterion of college students throughout our nation, and if college students throughout our nation dispatch their citizenship duties after leaving college in the manner which the students of HSC carried out the duty of ratifying their student constitution, there is no reason in the world why the U.S. should not become a Fascist state within their generation.

GRIPE BOX

The Gripe Box is the Coordinating Committee's means of learning the gripes of the student body and, thereby, facilitating action which will remove the cause of those gripes. All serious gripes are investigated and answered in this column.

GRIPE:

Many gripes have been issued about the noisy condition of the library, but still the noise goes on. There must be some solution to curb the noise. Most people don't realize that it's up to them to keep it quiet, therefore nothing is done.

In large-university libraries you can hear a pin drop, it is so quiet. Could something be done to incorporate some of that quietness in our own library?

ANSWER:

The misconduct of students in the library has been of great concern to the Administration, the Board of Control, and to the students in general. We, the members of the Board of Control, feel the conduct in the library is up to that part of the administration in charge of the library. In large universities you can hear a pin drop in the library, yes, but the conduct there is usually controlled by the administration. The admin-

Vets Will Get Leave Unless V. A. Notified

Unless veterans attending colleges and universities under the G.I. Bill notify the Veterans Administration within 30 days before the end of a term or semester that they do not want to take leave, VA automatically will place them on 15 days leave, it was announced recently.

The administration explained that veterans in colleges and universities are placed on subsistence rolls from the date of enrollment until 15 days after the close of the term or semester.

This automatic 15-day leave policy makes it possible for veterans studying under the accelerated program to receive unbroken subsistence payments between term or semesters.

Dr. Wayne Massey New P.E. Instructor

Humboldt State's athletic department has been very fortunate in recently acquiring the services of Wayne W. Massey, Ph. D., who is considered to be one of the top men in the physical education research field, to replace Joe Forbes who is on a leave of absence to continue his graduate work.

Coach Massey has had considerable experience in physical education, having been on the P. E. staffs at Kansas State Teachers College, Oakland City College in Indiana, where he was Director of Athletics and Physical Education, and with the University of Oregon conducting research work.

Coach Massey is a graduate of Iowa University where he received his doctor's degree in physical education and did research work on physical education tests and measurements.

During the war, Coach Massey served in the navy as a Lt. senior grade with the rehabilitation program conducted in naval hospitals.

Doctor Massey is married and has one son. Mrs. Massey is also vitally interested in the physical education field being director of physical education with the State Department of Education in Oregon.

It is a matter of some distinction for Humboldt State to have a Ph. D. on its coaching staff as there are relatively few Ph. D.'s in physical education.

Dr. Massey has been gathering material for a book he is writing on research methods in health and physical education. Such a book written by a faculty member would be a feather in Humboldt State's bonnet.

Humboldt's new mentor has taken over the track squad and is already working with the green and gold clad spikesters.

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Naval Reserve Commissions Available

Applications are now being accepted from qualified enlisted personnel on inactive duty in the Naval Reserve for commissions in the Volunteer Reserve.

Ex-enlisted personnel with less than a year's service on active duty in the Navy who have satisfactorily completed a 4-year course (at least 120 semester hours) at an accredited college are eligible to apply for appointment.

For each year of active duty in the naval service during World War II, an equivalent year of college work may be waived, providing the candidate is of the 4-year college educational level. This level is indicated by a passing mark in the Officer Selection Test, with a percentile score of at least 50.

Applicants who have had at least two years of active duty in the service require only 2 years of college credit for eligibility, but must pass the Officer Selection Test. Not more than 2 years of the college requirement may be waived because of active duty.

Active duty is a student status cannot be considered in waiving the college educational requirements.

All applicants must have been honorably discharged as enlisted men or warrant officers in the naval service, including the Coast Guard and its reserve, and must have been on active duty during some part of the war, between 7 December, 1941, and 2 September, 1945.

Persons not in the enlisted naval reserve, may enlist in the inactive reserve with the rating they held at time of discharge, and may then apply for a commission, provided they served on active duty during World War II.

(Continued from page one.) of the Board of Control. There shall be chosen at the Winter Election the following Student Body officers: two men and two women members of the Board of Control. Those persons elected at the Spring election shall serve for one school year beginning with the fall semester following election. Those persons elected at the Winter Election shall serve for one school year beginning with the Spring semester following the election.

5. The Spring Election and Winter Election shall have two parts each, namely a primary election and a final election. Candidates who receive the majority of the total votes cast at the primary election shall be declared elected. Whenever a final election shall be necessary to choose the President, Vice-President, Secretary or Treasurer, the ballot for such election shall contain the names of the two candidates receiving the highest number of votes for the office to be filled. Whenever a final election shall be necessary to choose members of the Board of Control, the ballot shall contain one more candidate than the number of such members, either men or women, necessary to fill the office. The candidates for such election shall be those receiving the highest vote at the primary. The candidate receiving the lowest vote at the final election shall be eliminated.

6. For purposes of inaugurating these new election laws, there shall be elected at the Spring Election of 1948 four men and four women members of the Board of Control. The two men and two women receiving the least number of votes at this election shall serve only one semester. The offices vacated by these four people shall be filled at the Winter Election in December, 1948. This paragraph 6 of Section 1 of the By-Laws shall be stricken from this Constitution upon completion of the Winter Election in December 1948.
