Dinner Highlights First Formal Dance

"Snow Ball", the first formal dance of the year, to which student body card holders will be admitted free, is being planned by the Nelson Hall Women and the Coordinating Committee on Student Activities, under the direction of Kent Merrill, Chairman. Ray Bullock and his orchestra will play for the dancing in the Westchester Room of the Eureka Inn from 9-12. Ham and turkey served buffet style during the intermission will be the highlight, stated Merrill.

Non-student body card holders will pay \$2.50 per couple to attend the "Snow Ball". Each of the Nelson Hall women will earn \$1 and contribute this money toward the dance fund; the remainder of the cost to be paid for from the Student body social fund.

New Transmitter For Radio Club; Talks To Oregon

The newly constructed 400 watt transmitter in the physics laboratory in Hut V. went on the air for the first time last week when the station W6HIQ of the Humboldt State College Amateur Radio Club carried on a conversation with W7OPK in Newberg, Oregon.

William Wegner, president of the club, and R. E. Peithman, faculty advisor to the club, were present during the contact.

This is the second transmitter to be put into operation, the first being a low powered transmitter of 25 watts. The station is licensed under the trusteeship of R. E. Peithman, associate professor of physical science, who holds an amateur station and operator's license.

Earl Abrams, vice-president of the club, also holds a license and operated a station at Point Barrow, Alaska, where he worked before coming to HSC.

The Amateur Radio Club wishes to extend an invitation to HSC students to join the club. A background in radio is not necessary, only an interest in amateur radio. The next meeting of the club will be Thursday noon, Nov. 30, in Hut V.

Future Teachers Can Register For Job Placement

The HSC teacher placement office is now accepting registrations from seniors and graduate students who are seeking teaching positions, it has been announced by Dr. Ivan Milhous, director of teacher placement.

Dr. Milhous stated that seniors graduating in January should register immediately, as offers of teaching positions for the spring semester are already being received by the placement office.

"Indications are that prospects for teaching positions for the coming semester are excellent, especially on the elementary level," Dr. Milhous said. "Furthermore," he added, "the recall to service of many teachers, who are military reservists, is being reflected in an increase demand for teachers."

Commenting on teachers' salaries, Dr. Milhous said that the salary situation remains very favorable.

Although the placement service is maintained primarily for teachers placement, Dr. Milhous said that seniors seeking positions in other fields, such as business, also may register with the service. Upon receiving registrations from non-teaching applicants, the placement bureau will collect confidential references for them. These references will be kept on file in the placement office, to be shown to prospective employers at the request of the applicants.

Guidance Director Speaks To CSTA

Dr. Burton Henry, HSC dean of men, has requested all students using the parking lot please observe the wide white line on the south side of the parking lot next to the tennis court. The space between this line and the tennis court fence, Dr. Henry said, is to be used as an exit for cars so they will not have to back out the whole length of the parking lot.

Dr. Henry also pointed out that there have been several complaints about cars not observing the stop sign at the corner of Pine street and Laurel Drive near CES. Because the lives of school children are endangered as well as those of students, cars should come to a complete stop before entering this intersection. The new stop sign on the opposite corner, near Jenkin's Hall, makes it necessary for cars coming up the hill to stop. The Arcata City Police will enforce this regulation.

"Silver Whistle" is the first play to be produced in the newly redecorated HSC auditorium. Harry Damrell designed the set which was constructed by members of the cast under the direction of John Van Duzer, associate professor of speech and drama.

Pat Quackenbush, Mrs. Duane Gurnee and Miss Morgan are on the make-up staff and Coleman Bullis is the prompter. Dr. Don Karshner and Van Duzer are faculty advisors for the production.

A Saturday evening performance will also be held in the HSC auditorium at 8:00.

"All My Sons" Awarded Medal For Best Play of 1947

Arthur Miller, author of "All My Sons", a three act play to be presented here by the Humboldt Players in January, is also well-known for his current Broadway hit "Death of a Salesman".

"Sons" was awarded the New York Critics' Circle award for the best play of 1947, a year in which plays by O'Neill, Hellman and Anderson also opened. The play has since been produced in Holland, France, England, Germany, and other countries. The film version released in 1948, starred Edward G. Robinson and featured Burt Lancaster, Mady Christians and Howard Duff.

Directed by Rod Shepherd, assistant professor of speech, and Alfred Braun, student director, Miller's prize-winning play will be seen by Humboldt audiences Jan. 4, 5 and 6 in the college auditorium.

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At Home At Humboldt

Had the students of Humboldt State College been present at the faculty forum held on the evening of Nov. 20, they would have witnessed a discussion unique in the annals of present-day mass education. For here we had the entire faculty -- and wives too -- discussing not courses, or grades, or teaching techniques, but how to create on our campus the type of environmental conditions that would enable our students not only to learn, but to live happily.

What are we doing for the health of the student? Do we have a program of activities, varied enough to meet the needs of all students? What can we do to allay the feeling of insecurity that harasses some students because of the impending draft? Do our students feel that they are doing something worthwhile at Humboldt? Are they happy and doing their best work in their chosen majors, or do they need better orientation and guidance? Are they worried over finances? Where do they live and under what conditions? Do they receive recognition for work well done outside of the classroom? Especially those who come from far away places, do they feel alone? Are any of them stranded for the Thanksgiving weekend?

Such are the issues upon which the faculty focussed their attention. When we speak of close, personal relations between students and faculty we mean, therefore, that at Humboldt the professor takes a personal interest not only in what the student learns, but how he lives -- which is more important.

Indeed there was a time when faculty members and students lived together in colleges -- and this is still true of a small number of schools. But in most cases, today, the college or university has resolved itself into an impersonal fact conveying machine, and has resigned into the hands of the undergraduates themselves the whole management of their life outside the classroom and the constitution of their environment; so that no longer are professors and students members of the same community having common experiences and learning through mutual understanding.

Mere knowledge is dulled by time, but what the student gets out of his personal association with the good professor lives on and becomes part of his character. That is the opportunity Humboldt offers to every student.

Some time ago a friend asked me about a former student now a successful businessman and enthusiastic Humboldt alumnus. How did he do at school? He was the type of fellow, I said, who did not get much out of books, but who got a lot out of his professors. That is possible only at Humboldt -- and a few other places. Ask those who have been here before.

27 STUDENTS WORK IN CENTRAL VALLEY ON 10-DAY PHEASANT PROJECT

Twenty-seven advanced Humboldt State college wildlife students left Nov. 16 for 10 days to work with the State Division of Fish and Game on state cooperative hunting areas during the pheasant season.

Accompanied by Dr. Fred Glover, associate professor of biological sciences, the students worked in areas in the Sacramento and San Joaquin Valleys. The work consisted of checking hunters' permits as they entered the hunting areas, and checking the hunters' bags as they left.

The purpose of the work in addition to giving the wildlife students practical field experience, was to improve hunting conditions especially on privately held lands. The request for assistance from the college wildlife students was one of several in recent months from the State Division of Fish and Game.

Gordon became consultant of the California Wildlife Conservation Board in 1948. He was for 20 years head of the Pennsylvania Game Commission. Since coming to California he has surveyed fish and game conditions throughout the state.

He is vice president of the American Wildlife Foundation, director of the National Rifle Association and an honorary member of the Wildlife Society.

TEACHING REQUESTS STILL ON UPSWING

Nine hundred and seventy-eight teacher positions were offered Humboldt State College graduates between June 1, 1949, and Sept. 30, 1950, it has been announced by Dr. Ivan Milhous, director of teacher placement. The greatest demand was for elementary teachers.

Requests for secondary teachers numbered one hundred and sixty-nine, and there were sixty-four requests for teachers holding kindergarten-primary credentials. The remaining 745 positions were open to elementary teachers.

HSC's placement bureau was able to supply fifty-eight teachers to California's crowded school system, Dr. Milhous stated. Thirty-five of these entered the elementary field, fourteen on emergency credentials. Of the remainder, two filled junior high school positions, two undertook kindergarten work, while seventeen others went into the secondary field. Two HSC trained teachers went into elementary school administration.

"The teacher shortage", Dr. Milhous said, "especially in the elementary field, is becoming increasingly acute, despite the fact that the number of teachers is increasing statistically."

The increasing acuteness of the teacher-shortage situation, according to Dr. Milhous, is due to the fact that the demand for teachers is on the upswing. He stated that the demand for teachers last year was some fifty per cent greater than for the preceding year.

In view of this increasing demand for trained teachers, Dr. Milhous explained that it is to the advantage of all teachers, who are qualified to do so, to register with the HSC placement bureau.

The quotes are ours. The words are Jack Whetstone's, the varsity basketball coach, who says that the names fit his system much better than the old terms.

There is a difference, too. Whereas guards would play under the basket on defense and in the outer zone on offense in the old system, "Goons" take the inside at all times on the Humboldt system.

It could lead to an interesting season for the Lumberjack horse-hiders. Every year, Humboldt starts the season with two strikes against her.

The weather always keeps Humboldt's baseball team from working out until almost time for the season to open.

While Humboldt's players are watching the rain pour down, Chico, the Cal Aggies and San Francisco State, to a lesser degree, are playing baseball.

Last spring when Humboldt opened her season against Chico, the Wildcats had already played fifteen games. Needless to say, Humboldt was snowed under.

When Humboldt played Chico later in the season, it was a different story. With a few games under their belts; the Lumberjacks forced the champion Wildcats all the way. Chico won, but their ace pitcher Mel Dalrymple, had to pitch the entire first game and relieve in the second game. Dalrymple signed a pro contract last summer.
