### Plaza Ave. Dedication; Mayor Ham to Speak

Dedication of the new Plaza avenue, gateway to Humboldt State College will take place at 11:30 a. m., Friday, Nov. 3.

Speaking at the ceremony will be Senator Arthur Way and Mayor Allen Ham. Representing the Humboldt State College Advisory Board, Robert W. Matthews will officially cut the ribbon opening the \$120,000 project.

The new approach to HSC is forty feet wide with sidewalks on both sides and extends from Highway 101 to Sequoia Avenue, one block west of the college.

Guests on the platform at the dedication ceremony include Mr. Ralph Miller, State Department of Public Works, Division of Highways; Mrs. Mildred Sears and Mrs. Forrest Waters, Humboldt Alumni Association; Ernest Stromberg, Dr. Vernon Hunt; Ralph Brown, Merwyn Rickey, student body president at HSC; the Homecoming Queen Helen Gross; and Dr. Cornelius H. Siemens, president of HSC.

The Arcata High School Band will furnish music for the ceremony.

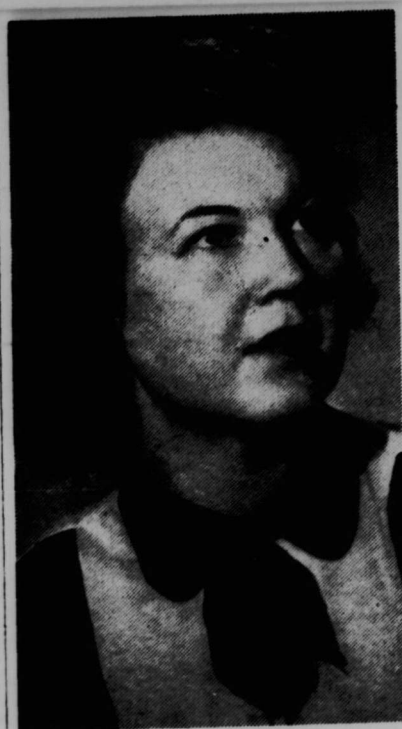
### Dr. Christensen Cites Project; Operation Signpost

To rectify this situation Dr. Christensen has offered the suggestion that some campus organizations undertake the project of putting signs on roadways leading to Eureka and Arcata, stating the names of these towns. If a student wants a ride, he can wait under the sign naming his destination. Many people are passed by automobiles, because the drivers have no way of knowing the destination of the pedestrian, Dr. Christensen stated. ### Yellow Cards Vital; 10 States Represented

The yellow information cards filled out by the students at the registration period are very important to the Registrar's office according to Myrtle McKittrick, registrar. They are a source for state reports. From these cards, information such as the number of students attending Humboldt State College and the number of students enrolled in each class is determined. It also shows the states represented by students enrolled here. These cards reveal that attending HSC this semester are six students from Oregon, four from Washington, two from Idaho, one from Wisconsin, one from Texas, one from Connecticut, one from Minnesota, one from Missouri, two from the Samoan Islands and one from the Hawaiian Islands. These figures are based on the home addresses given by the students.

They come back to renew old school ties, to greet old friends, and to re-assure us of their loyalty to our alma mater. As the present hosts of the college, let each one of us feel a personal obligation to make the alums feel welcome and prove the present days are not much different from "the good old days".

The Personnel Deans have observed and participated in at least 4 HSC homecomings, and each year we have seen a gradual improvement in the calibre of the over-all Homecoming program. At the present time we have been extending the services of our office to this year's Homecoming committee, and can report to you that they have been working ceaselessly to produce a fine event. The members of the committee have consistently developed their plans in order to produce a top notch show. Their philosophy seems to be that if we do something that is worth doing, let's do it right.

The value of Homecoming can be measured only by the intangible feeling emanating from the students and caught by the alumni. ## Large Attendance At Alumni Banquet; Siemens Gives Talk

"The Alumni Association can be the big power behind Humboldt State college," President Cornelius Siemens said when speaking at the annual Alumni dinner, held in the Bayside Hall October 23.

President Siemens spoke to approximately 175 alumni and faculty members at the annual affair. Mrs. Mildred Sears was toastmistress, while Mrs. Edith Olsen was general chairman of the dinner.

The new building program, which will include 14 new buildings, will triple the size of the present campus in area, and will house a student body from two and one half to three times its present size.

Other speakers at the banquet were Dr. Homer Balabanis, dean of arts and sciences who introduced the faculty; Hugh B. Stewart, a member of one of the first graduating classes in 1917, Mrs. Susie Fountain, Humboldt State's first alumna; and Maurice Hicklin, chairman of the division of language and literature, who reminisced about his 25 years at Humboldt.

# Fidel Caliesch Shows Paintings, Lithographs

Featuring a varied selection in media, style and subject matter, an exhibit of thirty drawings and lithographs will be shown for two weeks in the social unit at HSC.

A one-artist exhibit is the last three year's work of Eureka artist Fidel Caliesch, son of John F. Caliesch of 3624 Utah Street, Eureka.

Although Caliesch has exhibited in the San Francisco Open Air Show, at the California College of Arts and Crafts, and at a traveling exhibit covering the western states and Hawaii, this is his first one-man show.

Varied subject matter includes two drawings of local interest, one of the Vance house on G Street in Eureka, the other of Santsche's Gun Shop on Broadway at Bucksport. Other subjects are nudes and landscapes. Media to be represented are ink, charcoal, conte crayon, ink washes, lithographs, and serigraph or silk screen.

Caliesch categorized his work as being chiefly expressionistic. Caliesch, who graduated from Eureka High School in 1944, is a senior student at HSC, majoring in art. He has spent alternate years at the California College of Arts and Crafts in Oakland, which will award him a bachelor of arts degree in June, 1951.

The exhibit, which opened October 30, will be open during the week days from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m. and will be open Thursday evening November 2, from 7 to 9 p. m.

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## Phoasents Released By Wildlife

According to Dr. Fred Glover, assistant professor of biological sciences, the Wildlife department has recently released approximately 200 phoasents in the Arcata and Ferndale areas; both releases were made in regions open to hunters. All birds were banded with aluminum bands carrying serial numbers and "Notify California Division Fish and Game, San Francisco." Any one recovering the banded birds are strongly urged to send the bands to San Francisco, or to the Wildlife Department at HSC.

Last May, day-old chicks from the state farm were brought to Humboldt State as part of the training program. Virgil Mullis has been in charge of the student operated pens. Humboldt County, through the Board of Supervisors, donates money to the college for the maintenance of the rearing unit.

## HSC Seismograph Records Several Earthquakes In This Region

Earthquakes, one of nature's most electrifying tricks, because of the damage they cause and the unexpected terror which results, are under constant study. Geologists use complicated mechanisms called earthquake recorders or seismographs to find the location of the quakes and their strength. Experts can tell by various means even the kinds of rock the shock waves go through to reach the seismograph.

On our campus is located one of the finest seismographs in use today. Two years ago the University of California intended to erect such a machine in our main building but it was so sensitive it recorded the footsteps in the hall and even the wind rocking the building.

The small white building behind the bleachers in Redwood Bowl is the resting place for University of California's seismograph on top of a 20 foot square block of solid cement resting on a Franciscan layer of bedrock.

It was just recently that the seismograph began to function correctly. Professor Perry Byerly, head of the entire seismograph system at Cal., traveled here

every few months to check ours, and others in the network of seismographs he runs.

Inside the building there is an automatic shortwave receiving set which sets the clock with official government time signals.

The recordings are made with a light beam focused on a sheet of photographic paper wound around a revolving drum. Bill Bray, Humboldt College student, under the direction of Dr. MacGinitie, changes the record and sends it to Cal where it is filed with records from other seismographs for references for additional earthquake information.

The seismograph is recording 24 hours a day. The other one in the local vicinity is located at Ferndale.

Several weeks ago after a noticeable quake in our region Dr. MacGinitie, showed the record to his Geology class and it was found to have two other earthquake traces which were felt only to the recorder.

Certainly Humboldt is not behind in the science field and with erection of a new science building Humboldt State should be proud of its scientific achievements.

Laurence will direct all training and all bouts in the newly re-introduced sport. AAU rules and regulations will be followed in all bouts.

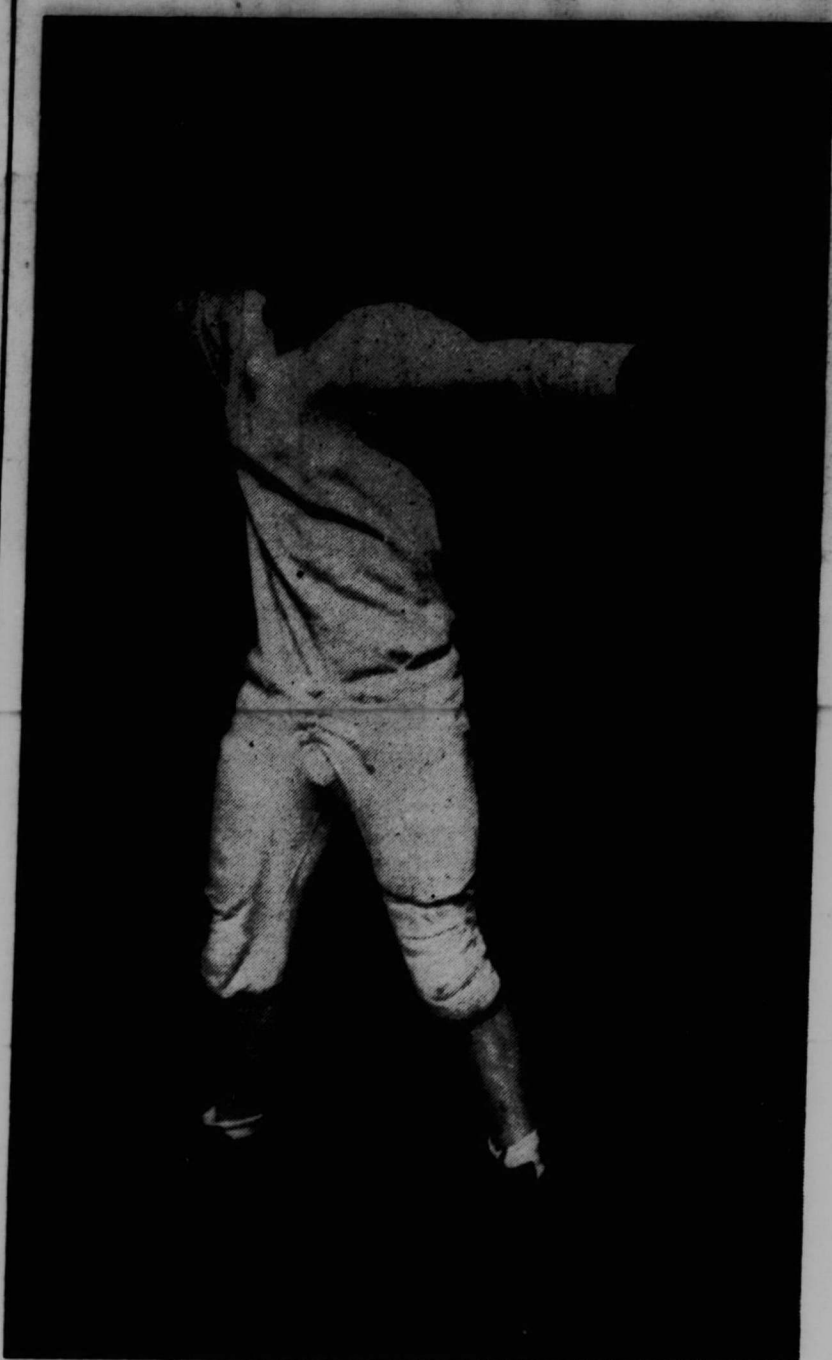

Led by a light, fast, backfield that was three deep, San Francisco State's Golden Gaters routed a game Humboldt State team 53 to 0 in the bay city October 26. The Gaters struck for two touchdowns in each period, and stopped three Humboldt drives, two of them inside her own six.

The pennant bound Gaters, led by a lightning fast little halfback in Rudy Smith, were never in danger after they stopped a Humboldt drive on their own six in the first quarter. Humboldt threatened once more just before the half-time, but was stopped on the SF two when time ran out.

Little Dennis Kinser, who was forced to play nearly the entire game at fullback when Kenny Dunaway re-injured his ankle in the game's opening moments, was nearly the entire Humboldt offense, completing 17 out of 35 passes, with at least half a dozen of the incomplete tosses resulting from dropped passes.

Alme Allen, the 190 pound sophomore guard, was magnificent from his center linebacker spot, making tackle after tackle in the waning moments of the game when all of Humboldt's reserve-thin line was ready to drop from exhaustion.

The Gaters struck first, climaxing a 61 yard drive early in the first period with fullback Walt Jourdan going 30 yards for a score. Humboldt struck back immediately after receiving the kickoff, with Kinser passing to Ivancich for 70 yards and a first down on the State 6. An intercepted pass ended the threat and brought the ball out to the SF 14, from where Rudy Smith broke Humboldt's back by scooting 86 yards for a score over tackle.

An intercepted pass in the closing minutes of the first half gave Humboldt another scoring opportunity, when Denny Kinser intercepted a pass on the SF 25 and ran it back to the SF 2 yard line. Two plays and 4 feet later, the half ended, still leaving Humboldt scoreless.

The last gasp wasn't out of the game Lumberjacks yet, however. A tricky double pass from Dennis Kinser to Harley Felure to Kinser netted 33 yards in the fourth period, but the Gaters again stopped the drive, this time before it got into dangerous territory.
