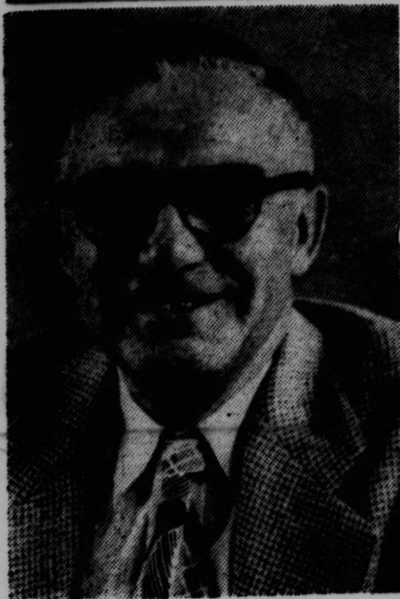

New Radio Studio Near Completion

Now under construction on the campus is the new radio building which is to replace the radio "Shack" at the northend of the main hall. The new building is located across the parking lot from the administration building next to Varsity Hall. It was formerly a residence and is now being converted to an efficient radio building.

When finished the building will house at street level an entrance lobby, a large studio which will also serve as a classroom and a club room for Rho Mu Chi, or as a studio for audience participation shows. Other features include a master control-room, an auxiliary studio adjacent to the control room which will serve as a filing room for transcriptions and records, studio B, smaller than studio A, which will serve as a studio or classroom, and Mr. Shepard's office which can be used as a sponsor's booth, observation room, or a studio.

Outside the building will take on the color of the other campus buildings. Cement walks will surround the building. Special lead wires will be installed into Nelson, Redwood, and Varsity Halls, Humboldt Village, the Co-op, Quad, and the Administration building.

If construction continues to schedule the building will be ready for use the latter part of this month.

H. S. C. Wildlifers Attend National Convention In San Francisco

Sixty-four Wildlife students attended the three day 15th Annual Wildlife Conference held in San Francisco. This conference was one of the largest attended in the 30 years they have been held. The group from Humboldt State composed one of the largest unit groups registered. This is the first convention to be held west of the Rocky Mountains.

The conference was opened by Roy E. Simpson, Superintendent of Public Instruction, Dept. of Education in California.

The formal opening speech and welcome was given by Dr. I. N. Gabrielson, president of Wildlife Management Institute, Washington, D. C. He expressed his views on the convention and outlined the program.

The first morning was devoted to a general session including appeals for conservation of natural resources: wildlife, water and soil.

Luis A. Macias, Chief of Game, Direccion Forestal y de Caza, Mexico spoke on Mexico's future lying in education, expressing the need for trained personnel and education of the country toward conservation.

Harrison P. Lewis, Chief Dominion, Wildlife Service, Ottawa, spoke on "Aspects of Conservation Education in Canada". In the Canadian schools conservation is taught in the 7th and 8th grades and as individual courses in the 10, 11, and 12 grades. The officers in various providences. The new curriculum being formed puts more emphasis on conservation and wildlife management throughout Canada. In no providence is conservation left out of the elementary curriculum.

S. F. Olson, Wilderness Ecologist, Isaac Watson League of America, Chicago, posed the question of how conservation affects the multitudes. If conservation is to become a part of each person it must be presented to the public and brought before the younger generation through schooling and actual experience.

Jack Culbreath, Educational Manager, Game and Fish Commission, Denver, spoke on "Where do we stand on State Conservation Education Programs?" He mentioned that only 36 states are conducting any definite educational programs and some of these very inadequate. With this he proposed an international conservation and education program controlled by the individual state to meet its needs. Various states are now conducting their own plans of conservation education and these must be improved and expanded. Programs developed with the youth affect the future conservation programs.

J. H. Baker, President, National Audubon Society, New York, desired "Aiding Teachers and Youth Leaders in Effectively Presenting Conservation". Numerous laws have been passed in states requiring conservation education but the question is where to find the instructors. Where is the conservation education in our public schools that we need for in the training of teachers, regardless of subjects, they should include some nutrition and control problems, wet-land and fresh-water resources, small game, coastal and marine resources, big game, and status of waterfowl.

The remainder of the convention included technical sessions on Disease, ultimate survival?

The conference summarization consisted of synopsis of the program of all general and technical sessions with comments of significant trends and probable developments.

UWF Taking Part In State-Wide Move

Phil Simons, corresponding secretary of the United World Federalists, announced at a recent meeting, that this chapter would sponsor a college contingent of the UWF caravan about March 27.

On that date, units from colleges and high schools from all over the state will converge on Sacramento, obtaining signatures on petitions en route, asking that our national foreign policy foster a movement to change the United Nations to a World Federation Government of Nations, along the line of the states of the United States.

To implement this, the joint resolution was passed in the California State Legislature, which was an actual petition to the United States Congress, asking to call a constitutional convention to make it possible for the U. S. to join in a world government if and when it is proposed.

The student proposed petitions will be taken to the state capitol where they will be bonded, forwarded and placed in the National Congressional Library.

Weekly 'Play Night' Set in College Gym

If so, the college gym is open from 7:30 p. m. until 9:30 p. m. each Thursday evening, and from 1:30 p. m. until 4:30 p. m. on Saturday afternoons. The Thursday night program, under the direction of Hermie Kroeger and Jack Norton, is for both men and women. The activities for the evening include team sports such as badminton and volleyball.

Saturday afternoon's program provides basketball for the boys. It is directed by Mel Klein.

Martha Lynn and Donna Sherman are receiving no competition in their quest for the offices of female council members.

During the recent LUMBERJACK poll, a number of readers torpedoed us with this suggestion: "Why don't you write editorials taking a stand on political and national issues?"

In response we would like to point out that political and national issues are so handled by the bigger papers that what we could propose on those matters would probably be merely an echo of what has already been said.

Most important, however, we feel that there are enough issues at hand which warrant precedence over national scope and for us to act in reverse would be against our objective, which is to emphasize news or issues which affect directly the larger number of students on campus.

When, however, an issue, political, national or otherwise, arises which directly affects the student body or faculty, we will take a stand on it.

The Editor

The following article appeared in the LUMBERJACK for the first time on October 15, 1947. It was written by one Peter Anderson, who is no longer a member of the student body of Humboldt State College, but because of its satirical fitting of the shoe upon the foot that should wear it, we are reprinting it.

RULES SUGGESTED TO SOUR STUDENT MEETINGS

8. Smoking is permitted in faculty offices.

10. Extreme care should be taken when smoking in and near the wooden structures on the campus.

John DeWitt and twenty fisheries students visited Prairie Creek Fish Hatchery under the auspices of Steve Smedley, superintendent of the hatchery.

Physical layout, water supply, pipe lines, filters, treatment of water, and troughs were observed. This hatchery produces one million steelhead and one half million chinook salmon per year which are planted in this vicinity.

Humboldt State receives from Prairie Creek Hatchery, 20 thousand young chinooks yearly for the school's hatchery. These are placed in the hatchery to be reared by the fisheries students.

Marsh Tops Humboldt In Season's Scoring

Rolling up 578 points in fifteen games, Humboldt State scorers came through their collegiate season with a 49.3 points per games average, according to official statistics.

The Lumberjacks played sixteen collegiate games, but the records are missing for the first San Francisco State game.

Like Abou Ben Adhem, the name of lanky Bob Marsh leads all the rest in the individual scoring column. The high scoring forward rolled up 214 points over the regular season for a 14.3 average. His conference average was 15.8.

Excellent Eddie Oliveira overcame a series of injuries to compile 98 points in 9 games for a 10.9 average, followed by the "iron man" of the Humboldt team, "Spider" Klingenspor with 128 points.

Lumberjacks Meet Northern Team In "Showdown Series"

Meeting in a two night tournament to decide the top basketball team of Northwestern California, Humboldt State college and three loaded independent clubs meet in the Humboldt State gym tonight.

The Fort Humboldt Post, American Legion, boasting many former Humboldt State stars, opens activities against the Ferndale VFW. Humboldt State will meet the powerful McNamara and Peep quintet, whose record is the most imposing of any of the teams, in the nightcap.

The winners of tonight's games meet Friday night in the Eureka Municipal Auditorium for the tournament championship.

The list of players entered in the tournament reads like a half of fame of local college, independent and high school players during the past few years.

The Fort Humboldt American Legion is made up almost entirely of former Humboldt State players. Leading the scintillating array is Len Longholm, and Gene Moses, with Curt Spinaz, Norm Bird, Don Terbush and Ted Speier and many others supporting them in the Legion bid for a championship.

The Ferndale team is made up almost entirely of former high school and independent stars, but the Cream City entry has a good record over the season. Such stars as Stan Bansen and Elwood Early will lead the VFW in their quest for county honors.

The McNamara and Peep team has the best record of all the entries and a brilliant group of basketballers. The tournament will settle once and for all the question of the best basketball team in this area.
