ASB MAKES RECORD ALLOCATION FOR 1956-'57 ACTIVITIES

The HSC student council has allocated a record \$68,400 for the support of student activities next year.

This figure compares with budgeted and estimated expenditures this year of \$50,146 and with actual expenditures in 1954-55 of \$52,905.

The budget was approved by the council after hearings conducted with department heads by the student board of finance. The board was comprised of Bob Furber, student body treasurer, chairman; Bill Williams; Mike Fielding; Jim Callison; Larry Flammer, ASB president, ex-officio member; and John Black, faculty adviser, and Richard E. Harmer, graduate manager.

Every activity received an increase in what it may spend next

year, but not all received an increase in subsidy from student body funds. In some departments, such as intercollegiate athletics, anticipated revenue is rising even faster than anticipated expenditures.

EARNINGS INCREASE

Athletics next year will spend an expected \$35,725 but will earn an expected \$36,190, the approved budget shows. In 1954-55 athletics spent only \$20,571 and this year \$21,752.

The tremendous increase in expenditures and earnings next year reflects higher guarantees, increased gate receipts and larger season ticket sales. The largest increase is directly attributable to the Hawaii game at Honolulu Sept. 28.

Publications (Lumberjack, Sempervirens, football programs and news bureau) will spend \$14,970 next year, but only a little more than a third of this, \$5,470, will come from student body subsidy. The remainder will be derived from sales and advertising. Biggest increase came in Lumberjack, which spent \$3684 in 1954-55, climbed to \$4868 this year and expects to spend \$6345 next year, only \$2345 of which will be in ASB subsidy.

SIX MONTHS TRIAL

"All increases in allocations are contingent upon a successful student body operation for the six months ending Dec. 31," Mr. Harmer said. "If income is not equal to expectations allotments must be decreased accordingly."

Total allotments in each activity next year are (current year's allotments are included in brackets): Athletics, \$35,725 (\$25,071); publications, \$14,970 (\$12,667); language arts, \$2815, and fine and applied arts \$2265 (fine and applied arts this year includes both drama and music for a total of \$3727); social activities (e. g., homecoming, sno-ball, etc.) \$1850 (\$1675); ASB office, \$7520 (\$6,874); operations (e. g. student car, executive council, rally, etc.) \$3255 (\$2208).

\$2000 IN RESERVE

An additional \$2000 will be kept in ASB reserve and \$1090 will be allocated as needs arise next year.

Total anticipated revenues for next year are (current year's anticipated revenues are included in brackets): Athletics, \$36,190 (\$22,440); publications, \$9500 (\$8090); drama and music \$1000 (\$1025); ASB card sales, \$16,150 (\$13,000); social, \$375 (\$275); faculty cards, \$2175 (\$1700); AWS dance \$100 (\$100); bookstore donation, \$6000 (\$5500).

BASEBALLERS CO-CHAMPS

Humboldt State claimed its second co-championship of the year last weekend, as the Jack diamond nine swept a twin bill from Chico State in the final series of the season to tie them with Sacramento State for the conference crown.

Humboldt won the first game 6-2 behind the brilliant seven hit pitching of old reliable Jim Richardson, who has yet to taste defeat in league competition this season. He struck out six and walked four.

Gary Mauney threw a steady seven hitter at the Wildcats to nab the second contest 7-5. This was the fourth straight victory for the freshman right hander, who struck out six and walked four also.

The Jacks jumped on Chico pitching for four big runs in the first inning as they put the Wildcats in a hole before they could get started. Singles by Dick Dudley, Bob Lawson, captain Phil Huff and Al Schrader accounted for Humboldt's first inning scoring.

Jerry Garcea displayed his outstanding base running ability by stealing second, third and home on successive pitches in the second frame.

The second game was a saw-saw affair with both teams tying the score several times before the Jacks sewed it up in the top of the seventh inning. The score was tied 4-4 when Ralph Mayo powered a triple that scored Lawson and Schrader who had walked.

Chico came back to add a tally in the final inning but could not overtake the Jack lead.

Four Point System Now To Be Used

The grade point system that has been in use at Humboldt State ever since grade points were required is to be changed, beginning in September, 1956, according to Mrs. Myrtle McKitterick, registrar.

At this time, everyone's cumulative index will rise by one digit, but this does not mean that we have suddenly become a college of A and B students, she explained. Hereafter, instead of the familiar grade-point table, an A will be worth 4 grade points; a B, 3 grade points; a C, 2 grade points; a D, one grade point; and an F, zero grade points. Thus a student with all grades of C will have an index of 2.00, instead of 1.00 as heretofore.

All of the California state colleges and nearly all of the junior colleges in the state are making the change at this time, and it is expected that the University of California will follow suit in the fall of 1957. The advantage of the new system is that it provides differentiation between D and F grades, and still does not have to make use of any negative figures.

Another change being incorporated at the same time has to do with repeated courses. For a number of years, students who have received grades of D or F could repeat those courses, and the units were not charged to "Units Attempted."

FOUR WILDLIFERS EARN FELLOWSHIPS

Eight Humboldt State wildlife seniors will be engaged next year in postgraduate study, four of them on competitive research fellowships at other universities.

Bruce Wyatt, former president of Conservation Unlimited, club of wildlife students, will be at Oregon State college on an award with the Oregon cooperative wildlife research unit working in fisheries.

William Hines also will be at Oregon State, in game management. William Glenn Bradley will work this summer as a naturalist at Jackson Hole in the Teton mountains of Wyoming before enrolling this fall at the University of British Columbia as a graduate student in game management.

Fred Kindel, who completed his degree requirements here in January, has been at the University of Idaho this semester in the Idaho cooperative wildlife research unit on a fellowship.

Electing to remain at Humboldt to do graduate work are two fisheries seniors, Jim Joseph and Stanley Elcock, and two game management students, Joe Harn and Paul Shields.

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

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ACCORD REACHED IN SACRAMENTO ON 1957-58 BUILDING PROJECTS

Dr. Lawrence E. Turner, executive dean, represented HSC in Sacramento last week in a joint session with members of the State Departments of Education last week in a joint session with members of the State Departments of Education and Finance and with Legislative Auditor A. Alan Post.

Agreement was reached by the group on the scope for all major projects for Humboldt State College in the 1957-58 budget, Dr. Turner announced on his return.

By the end of 1956, final working drawings for the new auditorium-speech building will be completed, with a deficiency appropriation to be made in January, 1957, so that construction can begin in April.

Officially approved for the building are an 800 seat auditorium complete with full rigged state, scene shop, and costume shop; a speech correction unit; radio and television studios; a journalism unit, with facilities for campus publications; and classrooms suitable for speech and English courses.

Approved for preliminary planning, to be ready for inclusion in the 1957-58 budget, are the field house and swim pool to complete HSC's physical education facilities; an administration and business education building; a site

acquisition and development project to purchase property west of Sequoia Avenue for parking facilities and campus street improvements; and a project for underground distribution of the campus power and communication systems.

Though officially approved for preliminary planning, Dr. Turner pointed out, some of these last items can actually be financed in the 1957-58 budget only if the voters of California approve the special bond issue to be voted on in the November 6 election.

The discussion is being sponsored by the Arcata junior chamber of commerce.

Candidates invited to appear on the program and present their platforms are Ervin A. (Bunny) Hadley and Arthur W. Way, the incumbent, Republicans; Judge Carl A. Christensen and E. V. Griffith, Democrats.

A question-answer session will be included in the program, said Dr. Richard Boehmler, Jaycee president. Dr. H.P. Balabanis, HSC president. Dr. H. P. Balabanis, HSC dean of instruction, will be moderator.

In 1949 he was awarded an honorary doctor of laws degree by LaVerne college in recognition of his leadership in developing the legal and financial foundations of the California public school system.

In September, 1938, he joined the staff of the California Teachers association, and since 1947 has held his present post as state executive secretary.

Commencement activities will begin next Friday, June 1, at 7 p. m. when graduating seniors are honored at the annual faculty-senior banquet at Redwood Acres.

HSC PLANS BROAD EXTENSION OF CURRICULUM ON 5 YEAR PLAN

Humboldt State College is planning to broaden its instructional program during the next five years to offer five new teaching credentials, the master of arts degree in nine more fields and bachelor's degrees in six new majors.

This was announced this week by Dr. Homer P. Balabanis, dean of instruction. He pointed out that the curriculum expansion would be subject to final approval by the state board of education.

Approval already has been given to the new programs by Dr. James B. Enochs, curriculum specialist in the state department of education. The state board of education also has given its tentative approval, but each degree program will be set up in detail and then finally approved before it may go into effect.

Plans have been drawn for offering credentials in pupil personnel services, secondary administration, general secondary in industrial arts, general secondary in health education and general secondary in chemistry.

Master of arts programs for which plans are being laid are biological science, physical science, music, art, English, business education, speech correction and drama.

An occupational master of science program is planned in business administration.

Bachelor of arts degrees will be offered, it is hoped, in journalism and public administration, and bachelor of science degrees in nursing, forest management, range management and chemistry.

HSC Building Bids To Be Opened Tuesday, June 12

The HSC Advisory Board met last week in its final session of the 1955-56 school year, with Chairman Don O'Kane of Eureka presiding, to make plans for next year.

Advisory Board members present in addition to O'Kane were Edward Goodwin, vice chairman; Chester Connick, treasurer; Dr. Cornelius H. Siemens, executive secretary; Waldron Hyatt of Eureka; Will Patton of Fortuna; and Robert Matthews and Frank Giannoni of Arcata.

Dr. Siemens, making a number of progress reports, announced that the Division of Architecture has advertised for bids for the three new buildings which will be constructed this year for music, art, and home economics.

The bids are to be opened June 12. Designers are working now on plans for the roof to be constructed over the west stands of the football stadium, with final plans to be completed in June.

Items for the assistance budget for next year were considered, with adoption of the budget planned for the July meeting of the Advisory Board. The assistance budget serves to finance those projects which the state cannot finance and the student body is unable to take care of completely, such as trips for the band, assembly tours, and special items of equipment.

At the July meeting, special attention will be given to a discussion of radio broadcasting of athletic events, it was announced.

Dr. Raymond Dasmann, assistant professor of wildlife management, received national attention this week when the May 21 issue of Sports Illustrated carried a story on his views of the proposed doe hunt in Humboldt county.

The article, appearing in the "Outdoor Week" section, quotes Dasmann to the effect that the doe hunt, while bitterly opposed by sportsmen's groups, would not be harmful. "The change was

FULKERSON TO GO TO EUROPE ON YEAR'S LEAVE

Planning to study and participate in chamber music in Europe for a year, Charles Fulkerson, associate professor of music, will be on sabbatical leave during 1956-57.

A member of the HSC faculty since 1941, Prof. Fulkerson has been conductor of the Humboldt Little Symphony since 1946, was founder and has been one of the leading performers in the college chamber music ensemble and for the past ten years has been a soloist and associate conductor of the renowned Carmel Bach festival.

Prof. Fulkerson, his wife, Jean, and daughter Julie, 14, will leave Arcata July 1. They will sail from New York on the Dutch Lines for Rotterdam on July 12 and will spend the first part of the summer attending music festivals.

At the Holland festival the Fulkersons will hear chamber music performed under such eminent conductors as Szymon Goldberg, George Szell and Eduard Van Beinum. After the Holland festival the family will attend the Aix-en-Provence festival and the International Festival of Music at Lucerne.

They also hope to attend the Pablo Casals summer school in Zermatt. In September both Mr. and Mrs. Fulkerson will enroll at the State Academy of Music and Art in Vienna. In the winter they will travel to Venice to attend classes at the Bernadetto Marcello conservatory.

The Fulkersons also plan to spend some time in Rome, Stuttgart, and other music centers of the continent. During the summer of 1957 they will attend music festivals in Prades, Copenhagen, The Hague and Edinburgh.

They plan to return to Arcata in August, 1957.

Julie, who will be enrolling as an Arcata high school freshman this fall, will continue some basic studies by correspondence and will study ballet and the violin abroad.

Mr. Fulkerson was on leave from HSC in 1949, studying at Juilliard conservatory and Columbia university in New York.


Professor Schuler completed the second semester at the Copenhagen academy in April, and is now traveling through Finland. He will return to Arcata in time for the fall semester of 1956.

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DEAN GALLOWAY TO LEAVE FOR APPOINTMENT IN TEHRAN

Dean Galloway, HSC order librarian and past president of the Redwood District, California Library Association, has received a two year appointment as librarian and visiting assistant professor of public administration at the University of Tehran's Institute of Administrative Affairs, Tehran, Iran.

Galloway will leave Arcata for Iran in midsummer, taking his family with him for the two years abroad. The appointment is scheduled to go into effect on or about July 1, 1956.

"We hope to see a great deal of the world in the process of going and returning," Galloway said. "Since Iran is half-way around the world, we plan to go via Europe and to return via the Orient."

The position will include the building and organization of a collection of books and other

materials in public administration and related fields of study, to service the needs of students and faculty in the Institute. Galloway will also administer the library and library staff, and will administer a program of translating the basic materials into the Persian language, the language of instruction in Iran.

Galloway received his bachelor of arts degree in 1947 from HSC and was first appointed to the library staff that year. Later he attended the University of Southern California for graduate library study, and received the master of science degree in library science from that university in 1950.

Examination schedules for the crucial week are available in the office of the registrar.




He will be in San Francisco June 17 through 29 to tour Standard facilities and discuss in a series of meetings company offices and other professors problems faced in the everyday operations of the company.

SMITH TO ATTEND CHEM. INSTITUTE AT OREGON STATE

A stipend to attend the Third Chemistry Institute for college teachers at Oregon State College, Corvallis, Ore., has been awarded to Dr. Arthur E. Smith, associate professor of chemistry.

The program is planned to give college teachers the opportunity of working together in small discussion groups to solve instructional problems, and to bring them into contact with productive research scientists.

The major cost of the institute is borne by the National Science Foundation, which has awarded a stipend to Dr. Smith, allowing him to take his family to Corvallis.

With three similar meetings in the United States during July, Dr. Smith will attend the Pacific Coast session, which will be held from July 9 to August 8. Other meetings are the central states' sessions at Indiana University, Bloomington, Ind., and the Rocky Mountain session at Montana State College, Bozeman, Mont.

Lectures in the areas of analytical, in organic, organic, physical and biochemistry will be presented, with subsequent discussions on how to incorporate material presented by lecturers into the college undergraduate curricula. Two technical field trips are scheduled, one of these including the research laboratories of the world's largest pulp and paper mill.

OUTSTANDING SPORTS YEAR FOR HUMBOLDT DURING 1955-56 SPORTING SCENE

Humboldt State's 1955-56 sports diary contains the facts and figures of perhaps the most successful sporting year recorded on the campus of the green and gold.

Humboldt had the distinction of claiming co-championships in basketball and baseball for the first time in many decades. The Hilltoppers 1956 track team was one of the most successful in the school's history and the grid team though not a first place finisher, was one well worth remembering.

FOOTBALL
The 1955 Jack football team, coached by Phil Sarboe, provided Humboldt rooters with many thrills. Its well timed passing attack and strong ground game earned the number four spot in the Far Western Conference race. Finishing the season with a respectable seven win, three loss and one tie mark, the '55 team kept the winning football tradition alive at Humboldt. Fire was added to the already red hot rivalry between Humboldt and Chico, as the Wildcats handed HSC a rather decisive defeat.

A will-o-the-wisp sophomore quarterback named Warren Baker unlimbered his strong right arm for eleven touchdowns and the number one spot among the small college passers. Baker was mentioned on the Little All Coast selections.

Humboldt placed four men on the Far Western Conference sec-

ond team and they were Happy Haft, Bob Hanson, Warren Baker and George Psaros. Psaros, although playing only the last part of the season at halfback, lead the Jack ball carries with over 300 yards.

Members of the starting eleven were Happy Haft and Phil Huff, ends; Bob Hanson and Joe Myers, tackles; Jim Joseph and Jerry Kilduff, guards; Caesar Piamma, center; Warren Baker, quarterback; George Psaros and Hank Cooper, halfbacks; and Ralph Mayo, fullback.

BASKETBALL
The 1956 Jumping Jacks shared the Far Western Conference title with the University of Nevada as both teams finished the season with a seven win and three loss league record. Humboldt defeated the Wolfpack for the NAIA play-off berth.

The Lumberjacks were in turn defeated by their opponent from the south, the San Diego Aztecs, 91-63 for the right to go to Kansas City.

Climaxing the most successful basketball season at Humboldt, Joe Myers and George Ibarreta were named to the All Confer-

ence first team. Glenn Wallace and Hank Cooper received honorable mention for their efforts.

The team finished with an overall 17 win and 10 loss record, and was coached by Franny Givins. Members of the team were Larry Taylor, Paul Shields, George Ibarreta, Hank Cooper, Warren Baker, Glenn Wallace.

BASEBALL
Starting off the season rather unimpressively, the diamond Jacks gained momentum with every game 'til they were one of the two best teams in the league.

Humboldt Completed the season with a nine win and one loss conference mark as did Sacramento State, who were last year's champions. The baseballers overall nineteen win and six loss record was the best ever racked up by a Humboldt baseball team.

The Jacks were fortunate in having the league's top pitcher in the form of Jim Richardson who is now undefeated in league play after eight games and two years of pitching for Humboldt.

Members of the baseball team were Jerry Garcea, third base; Al Deniz, center field; Dick Dudley, second base; Phil Huff, first base; Al Schrader, catcher; Ralph Mayo, right field; Larry Taylor.

TRACK
The Lumberjack cindersmen were no exception to Humboldt's outstanding year in sports, as they racked up four wins in six meets and finished a creditable fourth in the conference meet in Sacramento.

Coach Bob Doornink took twelve men to the conference meet this year. They were Harman Bonnickson, Earl Barnum, Hank Cooper, Harvey Kester-son, Erick Hughes, Jim Davis, Wayne Smith, Norman Scott, Terry Wallace, Paul Williams, Ben Zlataroff, Dave Sturdyvin.

TENNIS
The Jack netmen finished fourth in the Far Western Conference this past year and were coached by Hank Yamagata, was in his first year at this position.

The tennis team beat Cal Aggies and Chico, but were defeated by Sacramento, San Francisco, and Nevada in conference competition. The tennis squad consisted of Bob Agnew, Bill Williams, John Marcuz, Mike Fielding, Mike McGovern and Gary Holmes.

GOLF
Humboldt's golf team was not too successful this season as they finished last in the conference tourney in Sacramento.



Franny Givins coaches the squad which was comprised of Vinum, Joe Kramer, Bob Archibald, Bob Rice and Jim Knox.


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

22 GRID LETTERMEN RETURN FOR COMING SEASON

With 22 tried and proven lettermen returning to the football wars for Humboldt State College, Coach Phil Sarboe is expecting a successful year, even though the schedule is the roughest in the history of the College.

Last year the Jacks finished fourth in the Far Western Conference and ended the season with a seven win, three loss and one tie record. Coach Sarboe said that he is "very proud of last year's football team and only hopes that the '56 team will be as good as '55." He added, however, "A couple of games during the past season I would like to forget, but I hope to convince the

squad that it is up to them to change those scores."

A large gap will be left by eight graduating lettermen who although small in number constituted a big portion of last year's club. These graduating seniors are Bob Hanson, guard; Joe Myers, tackle; Gene Marks, guard; Merle Hagbo, quarterback; Happy Haft, end; Jim Joseph, guard; and George Psaros, halfback. Others not playing this year because of various reasons are Glenn Wallace, end; Ray Murphy, tackle; Ozzis Gooden, back; and Jim Evans, center.

The top grade of football players needed to fill these shoes is illustrated by the fact that both Haft and Myers have received questionnaires from the Baltimore Colts and the Chicago Cardinals, professional grid teams.

Jim Joseph, who was voted captain of last year's squad, will be a terrific loss not only because of his excellent football abilities but also for his inspirational and leadership qualities.

Coach Sarboe has not been caught unprepared, however, as he has several boys coming up from last year's undefeated Jay Vee squad to bolster the team as a whole. Some of those expected to make the varsity squad this season are Chuck McAninch, Jim Ennis, Carl Carlson, Wayne Emery, Joe Beason, Jack Moore, Jim Guernsey and Bill Wilbur.

RESERVE QUARTERBACK NEEDED

Although Warren Baker was the best small college passer in the nation last season, Coach Sarboe says that more reserve strength is needed at that position. This season Baker will undoubtedly be a marked man, with the probability that opposing teams will concentrate on stopping Baker. In that case a couple of good reserve quarterbacks may come in handy before the season is over.

Coach Sarboe refuses to make any pre-season forecasts, but did say however, that, "In view of the attractiveness of the schedule this year, the spirit of the squad is higher than its ever been in the five years I've been here at Humboldt."

This may or may not be an indication of the success of next year's team, but in any case the club should be in top physical condition, as rumors have it that the nucleus of the squad will stay in shape by running all summer and not waiting until September 1, when official practice begins.

BIDS ON NEW GYMNASIUM TO BE OPENED SOON

Bids for Humboldt State's new \$848,400 gymnasium will be open June 26 with construction to begin immediately thereafter, announced Dr. Lawrence E. Turner, executive dean at HSC.

Dr. Turner also announced that construction on the new baseball diamond will begin about the same time as on the gym. The diamond, which is budgeted at \$74,500, will be located just west of the wildlife facilities and is scheduled to be completed one year from next fall.

The new gym facilities include a swimming pool, which is to be standard intercollegiate size, and field house, both of which have been approved for the new year's budget. Details of the pool and field will be decided at next year's meeting of the state legislature.

Consisting of two stories, the new building will have all locker rooms, showers and offices on the first floor. The dimensions of the floor are 142 feet by 129 feet.

The top floor will house the gym, which will have a seating

Jack Hitters Set Torrid Pace

The batting averages for Humboldt State's baseball team were released recently and they revealed one of the reasons the Jacks powered their way to the co-championship of the Far Western Conference this season. The team as a whole batted .364 in the conference over a ten game schedule and hit .320 in the overall season. This is compared to last year's conference average of .306 and the overall of only .292.

Freshman Al Schrader led the Jack swatters with a .423 batting average in the overall season while Bob Lawson led the regulars in the conference grid with a .483 mark. Schrader also led in two base hits with six, and bases on balls with 18 over the season.

Bob Lawson was the leader in runs batted in with 31 while Phil Huff, who was first in home runs with two.


Last Chamber Program To Be Held May 27
