The newly revised document will come up for student approval Wednesday, March 21.

Construction Bids Opened Mar. 27

Bids are now being received on the contract for completion of the Wildlife Building facilities according to President Cornelius H. Siemens. The sealed bids will be opened March 27, 1956, and construction is to begin as soon as the contract is awarded.

Included in the new construction will be a complete fish hatchery, fish ponds a small lake, bird and animal pens, brooder houses fur sheds a deer run, roads and parking facilities, an electric incinerator, and fresh water supply for the Wildlife Building's unusual water needs.

These will all be built on the city block immediately south of the Wildlife Building at the southwest corner of the HSC campus.

Today's Assembly To Feature Negro Spirituals

Religious Emphasis Week will end officially today at 11 a.m. in a program of Negro spirituals sung in the auditorium by John Patton, Jr., well-known Negro tenor from the San Francisco area.

Religion and The Fine Arts, the theme of events of the past week, has been expressed in an exhibit of religious paintings with a talk by assistant art professor Martin Mondrus; an address by the Rev. James Senter of the First Congregational church of Eureka on "The Cross On the Weathervane" a program by the HSC A Cappella Choir; a discussion of "Religion in Modern Drama" by drama instructor Dr. Stanley Glenn; and, last night, an explanation of "The History of the Protestant Hymn," by associate professor of organ Dr. Wilbur Martin, and several vocal selections by baritone John Irick of the Golden Gate Baptist Seminary in Berkeley.

Also highlighting the week's program was the appearance of the Rev. John Domin, professor of art at the Central Catholic High School of Portland, Oregon, who delivered an address yesterday at noon in the auditorium and was available for personal conferences since his Wednesday arrival.

The Rev. Paul C. Diebels was featured speaker at the Tuesday 3 p.m. coffee hour.

NEW FEATURES FOR ASB PACT DESCRIBED

A clarification committee, to handle problems falling between the jurisdiction of the college administration and the associated students, will be among the innovations in the new Associated Student Body constitution when the document comes up for approval on March 21.

On that date, members of the associated students will vote on the new constitution. The proposed revision is now on display in the main hall of the administration building.

Students will no longer receive their yearbook free of charge if the constitution is approved. A major change in the old constitution has amended the previous practice of paying the entire cost of the yearbook out of advertising and student body card revenues.

The change was made on request of publications officials, in anticipation of rising enrollments. Revenue from advertising cannot be increased, they pointed out, and printing costs do not appreciably decrease when enrollment increases. It would be impossible, they said, to provide a free yearbook if enrollment increases beyond the ability of the advertising budget to carry its share of the publication costs. Lumberjack subscriptions, as before, would be free.

An interim government, designed to handle student body business during the summer vacation, has been provided for in the new constitution. To be known as the Interim Commission, it will consist of five to seven officers or officers-elect of the association. Its acts would be subject to approval by the Executive Council. —C. S.


Dear Fran:

The meeting was called to order March 8 by vice-president Mike Fielding. Those present were Fern Fowler, Pat Heney, Frank Bettendorf, Bob Jacobson, Jim Westman, Larry Flammer, Craig Stark, Lewis Sbrana, Bob Furber, Dick Harmer, Dr. Karshner and Joan Guyn.

Old Business

Dr. Karshner reported that the President's Council approved the Knight's plan for a moveable information booth to be used on special occasions on campus. This council suggested that the booth be collapsible so that it may be more easily stored.

Jim Westman reported that stipulations for the third booster committee are being written and will be presented to the Council when completed.

Larry Flammer brought up the subject of a High School Leadership Meeting. This was postponed until the next meeting.

A motion was made and seconded that we approve the convocation program for entering freshmen as it is at present and continue to have this yearly ceremony.

The Council passed a motion to approve a suggestion proposed by the Lumberjack staff to make one-year subscriptions to the Lumberjack available for \$1 to persons not belonging to the student body, or in any way affiliated with the college.

The council approved having Mr. Cecil A. Hinshaw, member of a Quaker group, here on campus to speak at an assembly April 25.

A motion was made, seconded, and passed that a letter be sent to all club presidents inviting them to our next meeting, to be held in room 130, March 15, to discuss means of enforcing the clause in all the club constitutions which states that members must be holders of A. S. B. cards.

A motion was made, seconded, and passed to approve Jerry Buck as chairman for the 1956 Dad's Day.

New Business

Bob Jacobson presented the council members with copies of the Religious Emphasis Week program, and asked for any additional activity which the members might like to see scheduled.

A motion was made, seconded, and passed to accept the Spurs constitution, presented by Fern Fowler, and to revoke the Spokes constitution, which will be replaced by the former.

Larry Flammer reported that there will be copies of both the old and the revised A. S. B. Constitution made available in the library, in order that students may become familiar with the revisions that they will be voting upon March 21. There was discussion concerning the purchase of "I voted"

tags by the Student Body for the coming A. S. B. election. Investigation is being made concerning the wisest quantity to purchase; this matter will be reported upon at the next meeting.

A motion was made, seconded, and passed to approve the form of the ballot for the approaching election as presented by Larry Flammer, in behalf of the Constitution Publicity Committee.

After lengthy discussion by the group concerning the feasibility of having two election booths for the March 21 election, it was decided to refer the matter to the Constitution Publicity Committee. It is to be recommended that this committee present some ideas along these lines at the next Student Council Meeting.

Frank Bettendorf reported that he expects correspondence from Hotel Benbow soon in regards to arrangements for the Spring A. S. B. Retreat.

The council approved the suggestion made by Dick Harmer that a typewriter be placed in the library, and that the number of times it is used over a period of time be tallied in order to see if its demand would justify the purchase of a typewriter to be made available for student use.

Craig Stark reported that Alpha Phi Gamma, a national journalism fraternity, has been approved for Humboldt State College.

New Control Board Added To KHSC

The latest improvement in the rapidly developing radio department is a secondary control board, in addition to the main KHSC console used on the air.

The purpose of the secondary control board, according to Dr. William Ladd, radio head, is to permit station personnel to record or audition programs without interfering with regular equipment while the station is on the air.

The new control board, located in newly revised studio B, includes a remote amplifier, a Magni-corder recording unit, a radio receiver, and one turntable.

This new facility enables beginning announcers to practice program techniques before being assigned to regular shifts on KHSC.

Another advantage of this secondary control room brought out by Dr. Ladd is that it facilitates air checks and the recording of commercial station broadcasts. He stressed that any faculty member may have a program recorded and replayed in the classroom by notifying the radio department in advance.

The new control board is also utilized by Dr. Richard Boehmiller in his speech therapy work.

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





SERVICE TEAM ADDED TO FOOTBALL SCHEDULE FOR 1956 SEASON

Another strong service squad, San Francisco Presidio, was added to the Humboldt State 1956 football schedule this week to replace Long Beach State. The

game will be played Nov. 17 at Arcata.

Phil Sarboe, head HSC football coach and athletic director, announced the switch in opponents. The Long Beach eleven asked to be relieved of its commitment to play in Arcata because of expected financial difficulties in making the long trip northward.

The game was to have been the first between the two state college squads.

Contracts have been negotiated with all eleven opponents for 1956 and no further changes in the slate will be made Sarboe said.

He pointed out that Humboldt felt "extremely fortunate" in being able to sign a club as fine as Presidio at a comparatively late date. Hal Fisher's Presidio team should provide competition on a par with that shown by the Presidio basketball squad which won over Humboldt this season at Fortuna. Presidio lost in football to Chico State last season 14-7.

The Lumberjacks will play six games at home opening against Moffett Field Sept. 15 in Eureka. The schedule has no open dates from Sept. 15 through Thanksgiving day Nov. 22.

Competition began last Tuesday and will continue through Saturday.

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
