

Pick ASB Reps - At-Large

VERY GOOD GOVERNMENT BROOM IN NEAR SWEEP

Controlling a light vote with the only political party machine operating today on the HSC campus, the Very Good Government group made nearly a clean sweep of Tuesday's ASB election of four new representatives-at-large. The new members will serve one year, until January, 1957.

Chosen were Arcata sophomores Frank Bettendorf and Bob Jacobson, Happy Camp junior Fern Fowler, and Fortuna sophomore Pat Heney.

State Okays Two New AB Degrees, Three Masters

The State Board of Education, in its January session, granted HSC officials approval to offer five new degrees.

President Cornelius H. Siemens announced upon his return from the meeting that, on the recommendation of Dr. Roy E. Simpson, state superintendent of public instruction, the Board approved two new baccalaureate degrees, in physics and in psychology, and three new master's degrees, in physical education, in game management and in fisheries.

"These new programs come as a natural result of our fast growth," Dr. Siemens said. "We plan to continue to expand our offerings to meet the real needs and interests of our students and of the region we serve."

Increasing numbers of students requesting degree programs in these fields have pointed out the need, resulting in the new curricular.

The present two year pre-professional work in physics and psychology will be expanded, and the degrees of bachelor of science in physics and bachelor of arts in psychology may be conferred in June, 1957. Some upper division courses are being taught this fall, with the fourth year courses to be added next fall.

For students who already hold a four-year college degree, graduate work will be offered next year leading to the master of arts degree in physical education and to the master of science degrees in game management and in fisheries. Humboldt State has qualified for these graduate degrees, for which there has been much student demand, on the basis of outstanding staff and facilities.

In these fields alone, new buildings and teaching equipment in excess of \$2,000,000 have been added to the campus recently or are scheduled within two years. The additions include the Wildlife classroom building and outside facilities, a new men's gymnasium, a swim pool, field house, and baseball field.

The new master's degree programs greatly enlarge the graduate offerings at HSC, which already include master of arts degrees in elementary education, in secondary education, in educational administration and supervision, and in social sciences.

All but Jacobson are members of the Very Good Government party.

The new members will be full voting members of the student body council, and will be installed at the council's first meeting of the spring semester which starts January 25.

Tuesday's elections were conducted by members of the existing executive council, under supervision of vice president Mike Fielding, Eureka junior.

Outgoing representatives are Eureka senior Don Leach, Eureka freshman Gary Barnes, Eureka junior Jackie Sintic, and Klamath junior Jane Wylie.

Other student body officers are elected at the general elections held late in the spring term, and serve the following school year.

HSC Foresters Form New Club

Campus forestry students have formed a Forestry club, one of whose major objectives is, "to be of service in the field of forestry."

The group also aims to promote fellowship among forestry-lumbering and pre-forestry students here and promote professional interest in forestry.

Officers are John Dell of Oakland, chief forester (president); David Sturdyvin of San Fernando, assistant chief forester (vice president); William Sanders of Chula Vista, secretary forester; David Flohr of Petaluma, fiscal forester (treasurer), and Robert Archibald of Ukiah, whistle punk (sergeant at arms). Gerald Eller of Ramona was elected representative to the college inter-club senate.

As one of its first projects the club plans Saturday to plant several thousand redwood seedlings on Hammond Lumber company property at Big Lagoon. Planting stock will be furnished by the Redwood Region Conservation council.

The club members also plan to develop a slide collection and materials for exhibits, to add to the college dendrology collection of fruits and cones, and to carry out some experimental work.

Faculty advisers are Edwin Pierson and Gerald Partain, assistant professors of forestry-lumbering.

Dr. Wasserman Picked For USC Cancer Study

HSC chemistry professor William J. Wasserman, Ph. D., has accepted a grant from the National Cancer Institute to carry out some research in the area of synthesis of polycyclic compounds.

The work will be done in the chemistry laboratories of the University of Southern California at Los Angeles, this summer.

Dr. Wasserman's job will be to supervise the project currently being supervised by Professor Milton G. Kloetzel, who will summer in Europe.

It is not possible to be too specific about the nature of the problem, said Dr. Wasserman, since it is dependent upon the outcome of work currently under way.

Awards Now Open In Phelan Gifts To Drama Writing

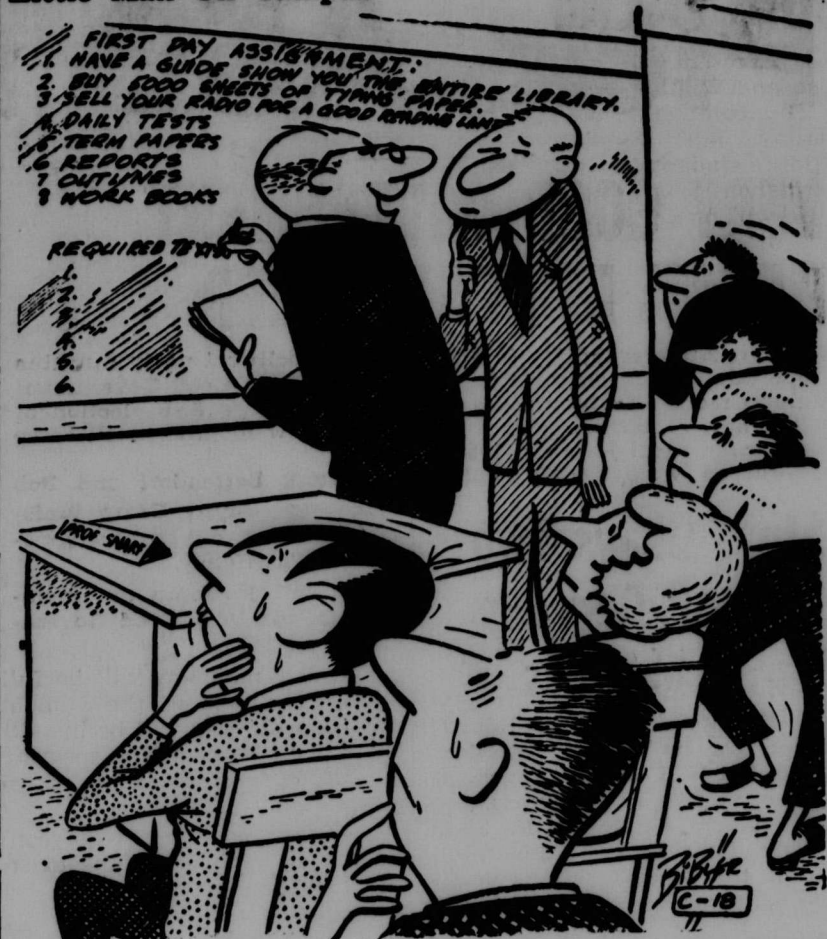

WHAT DOES A PROF DO WHEN NOT PROFESSING?

An old campus question is the one about, "What does a college professor do when he isn't busy being a college professor?" . . . but asked of Martin Watkins it has elicited a new and startling answer.

Thursday night, December 8, he donned a special costume and traveled through the fog to the Eureka Municipal auditorium where hundreds of fight fans had congregated. There he climbed into the ring . . . but not to box.

Assistant Professor of English Martin Watkins is, it is believed, the first college professor in the nation who is a licensed professional fight referee. His background in what sportswriter Al Tostado calls "fistiana" includes a bout with the New York State Amateur lightweight champion in 1935, membership on the University of North Carolina boxing team, and the winning of the Central Carolina Golden Gloves lightweight championship.

He was trained by Edward Cohen, his cousin, who was also trainer of the world's flyweight champion, Corporal Izzy Schwartz.

The instructor chose a formal education rather than a boxing career about 1940, and states that he has managed to maintain his interest in the sport in spite of his work as a professor of literature, and in spite of the fact that some people feel the two things just don't go together.

He points out that former world's heavyweight champion Gene Tunney was a Shakespeare enthusiast, and mentions that former world's light heavyweight champion Billy Conn was a member of a literary club, one of whose members was Robert E. Spiller, foremost scholar on Am-

erican literature, and, incidentally, the dissertation supervisor of "Marty" Watkins.

Little Symphony Concert Feb. 2

The Humboldt Little Symphony conducted by Prof. Charles Fulkerson, will present its Mid-winter Concert in the Eureka Junior High School Auditorium Thursday evening, February 2, at 8:30 p. m.

The program will consist of music by Beethoven, Vivaldi, Corelli, Mozart and Brahms. Soloist with the Symphony in its February concert will be Carla Petersen Powell. Mrs. Powell will sing two Mozart arias; one from the "Magic Flute" and one from "Don Giovanni."

Another soloist on this program will be Floyd Glende, assistant professor of music education at Humboldt State College. He will play one of the concertos from the set of the "Four Seasons" by Vivaldi.

Corelli's Concerto Grosso in G Minor will feature Esther Thompson, Marianne Pinches, and Elaine Bux as soloists. This 8:30 concert is free of charge and the public is cordially invited to attend.

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JOB TALKS SLATED FOR WILDLIFERS!

A representative of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife service will be at Humboldt State College Wednesday, Jan. 18, to interview wildlife students for summer and permanent jobs.

He will be the first representative of the service to interview

students specifically for jobs in waterfowl management. Dr. Charles Yocom, associate professor of wildlife management, noted that "state and federal agencies are taking a greater interest in our students and graduates."

The representatives will be Vernon Ekedahl, refuge manager, of the Sacramento National Wildlife refuge, Willows, Calif. He will represent the Fish and Wildlife service region 1, with headquarters in Portland.

Most students employed for summer work will be student assistants at western wildlife refuges doing waterfowl management studies, brood surveys, nesting population estimates, habitat improvement work and general refuge maintenance.

Each student will be required to write an extensive report covering

ing the season's work.

Humboldt students have been extremely successful in getting summer work, Dr. Yocom pointed out. Last year 30 students were employed on a temporary basis in game and fish management. At least one student each year has been employed on a national wildlife refuge.

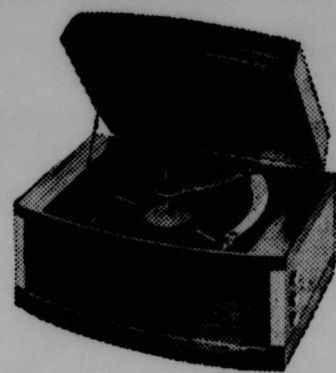
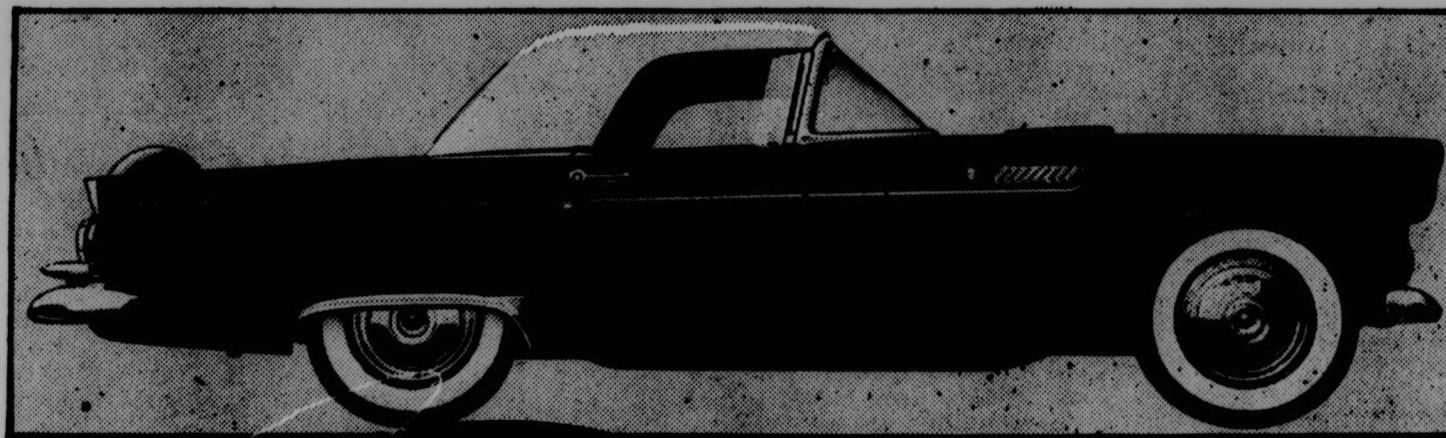

DEFENDING CHAMPS FAVORED OVER JACKS IN SERIES

Lumberjack hoopsters will be back on their home court this weekend when they meet defending FWC champion San Francisco State Friday and Saturday nights in the HSC gym.

The two game series will be the second meeting this year for the two clubs. The Jacks dropped their first opening game in the Far Western Conference tournament to the Gators 69 to 49 and the strong San Francisco squad went on to win the tournament crown with three straight wins.

The gator team this year includes only three returning lettermen, but several returning servicemen have bolstered Coach Dan Farmer's squad. Guard Gary Kenny and forward Ernest Browning were starters for last year's championship team. Kenny was named to the All-Conference second team last year while Browning is said to be the fastest man on the Gator team this year.

Forward Victor Gipson, just returning from service ball, will start along with Kenny and Browning. The 6-1 sharpshooter won the recent FWC tournament trophy with 59 points in three games.

Thatcher Nance, tallest of the starters at 6-5, will hold down the center position, while Milt Garfield will start at the other guard for San Francisco.

The Gators will put their seven won, three lost record on the line Friday. Last week they picked up a pair of victories over the University of Nevada to run their present winning streak to five games.

Coach Franny Givins will be depending heavily on forward George Ibarreta to rack up points against the favored Gators. Ibarreta leads the Jacks in scoring with 171 points to his credit as of the January 7 game against the Aggies.

Other starters will be Jumping Joe Myers, who presently leads the team in rebounding at center, forward Larry Taylor, second to Ibarreta in scoring, and hustling guard Hank Cooper.

Glenn Wallace, a two letterman who was named to the All-Conference team before entering the service will probably replace the injured Paul Shields at the other guard spot.

HSC HOOPSTERS CLASH WITH GAELS TUESDAY

Coach Franny Givins' Lumberjacks won't have much time to rest after their weekend series with San Francisco State before they go into action against the Galloping Gaels of St. Mary's College Tuesday night at the HSC gym.

The non-conference clash will be the fourth meeting of the two teams. Always a threat, the Gaels lead in the series with three wins over the Jacks. The squads met twice last year, each team winning one.

This year the Gaels have had a successful season, with wins over the University of California, the Cal Aggies, and Sacramento State, and a close 50 to 51 loss to Stanford University.

Coach Jim Weaver will bring to Arcata a strong squad led by all-time Gael scoring great Bill Sanchez. The 6-1 senior forward last year scored 429 points for the second highest individual total in Gael history and has won all-American honorable mention for the last two years.

Bill Bagley, 6-4 senior, who has already been drafted by the professional St. Louis Hawks, is a likely starter at guard. He will probably be paired with guard Stan Stewart, a senior letterman who was benched last year with a back injury.

Bill Getris, a veteran of three years of college play and two years of Army tournaments will be starting for the Gaels at center.

Rounding out the lineup at the other forward will be Odell Johnson, who transferred to St. Mary's this year from Fresno J. C. where he averaged 29 points per game last season and was named most valuable player in the Big Seven League.

IBARRETA LEADS HOOP OFFENSE

Forward George Ibarreta still leads Humboldt hoopsters in the individual scoring column according to figures released by the college this week. Ibarreta has scored 63 field goals and 45 free throws for a total of 171 points in the ten games covered by the report.

Larry Taylor follows Ibarreta with 94 points in 10 games for a 9.4 points per game average, while Jumping Joe Myers is third with 87 points and an 8.7 game average.

In the rebound department, Myers leads the squad with 53 offensive and 69 defensive recoveries for a total of 122 and a per game mark of 12.2.

Guard Paul Shields, who was injured in Saturday's game against the Aggies, was second to Myers in rebounds with 55 to his credit. Shields had also racked up 71 points offensively for the Hilltoppers.

At the free throw line, Ibarreta also leads with a mark of 45 scored out of 58 attempts for a 77.6% average. Myers is second with 29 out of 49 for a 59.2% and Taylor is third with 22 for 29 attempts for a 75.9% average.

Highest team scoring took place in the second game with Oregon Tech when the Lumberjacks put 98 points on the scoreboard to set a record for HSC intercollegiate hoop play. It was in this game that Ibarreta set the high mark for individual scoring in one game this season with 29.

The Jacks have a six won, four lost record so far this season with wins over Shasta Plywood, Oregon Tech, Southern Oregon, Sacramento State and the Cal Aggies of Davis. Humboldt State has scored a total of 626 points as against 617 points scored by opponents.

Shields Injured Against Aggies, Out For Season

Humboldt State's two game rout of the Cal Aggies last weekend was marred by the news that starting guard Paul Shields had suffered a broken ankle in Saturday night's game. The injury will probably put him out for the remainder of the season.

The injury occurred during a scramble for the ball in the second half of the hard-fought game. Shields was treated at the Aggie infirmary and the injury was found to be a fracture after the game.

Coach Franny Givins rated Shields as the finest defensive player in the conference and always gave him the job of guarding the toughest member of the opposing team. Always a hustler, Shields was also averaging seven points per game, and was second only to Jumping Joe Myers in rebound work under the backboard.

JACKS TAKE TWO FROM AGGIE FIVE

Humboldt State's Jumping Jacks opened Far Western Conference play last weekend with two wins over the Cal Aggies on the Aggies home court at Davis. The Jacks won the opener Friday 57 to 43 and had to come from behind to take Saturday's game, 61 to 59.

In Friday's contest, George Ibarreta and Paul Shields scored 24 points in the first half to give Humboldt a comfortable 32 to 19 lead at halftime, and the Jacks were never in trouble the rest of the way.

Glenn Wallace, named as a starter for the first time this season, contributed 11 points to the Jack score, while Ibarreta was high scorer with 20 points to his credit.

In the second game, however, the Hilltoppers had to come back in the last few minutes to stop an inspired Aggie team. The Jacks were trailing 54 to 59 with two minutes remaining in the second half when Hank Cooper scored on a jump shot, then stole the ball and went all the way downcourt to score two more. Cooper went on to tie it up with a free throw resulting from a foul he received on his fullcourt drive.

Then with five seconds to go, guard Ron Fredericks scored the winning field goal from 20 feet out.

The victories give the Jacks a season record so far of seven wins to four losses.
