

"BEGGAR'S OPERA" TONIGHT!

CURTAIN TIME 8:15 FOR GAY MUSICAL PLAY

Musical extravaganza, The Beggar's Opera opens in the college auditorium tonight at 8:15. Continuing tomorrow evening, February 25, the Gay classic will conclude its run March 1, 2, 3.

A political and social satire, the story is based on the adventures of MacHeath, a highwayman, and his band. The cast of 27 includes Frank Spaid, Pat Hammond, Bob Lloyd, Joline Benites, and Dorothy Sousa of Arcata; and Louis Davis and Herb McLellan from Eureka.

Admission is included on the college season ticket with general admission tickets obtainable for \$1 at the drama office. Students and faculty members with student body cards can obtain their tickets free of charge. All seats will be reserved.


Written in 1728 by John Gay, the play was extremely popular. The music was reharmonized for revival in 1920. Although music accompanies the play, the narrative is not dependent on the lyrics. Some of the tunes have reappeared with modern words.

About 50 short ballads are performed by the cast who are chiefly members of the College a cappella choir, a group of selected voices. Seven members of the Humboldt Little Symphony will comprise the orchestra.

In addition to the direction of members of the college drama and music departments, there is a special costume director, Mrs. Ethelyn Pauley; choreography by Miss Kay Gott of the physical education department, and sets by John Van Duzer. Frank Bettendorf is student stage manager.

The drama of the productions is directed by Dr. Stanley Glenn and the music by Dr. Leon Wagner.

TV Brevity Stresses Effect, Says Actor

... Conservation works ...

Television, the medium of today, will continue to be the medium of tomorrow, predicts veteran actor Thomas Mitchell, who visited this area last week on a conservation lecture tour.

The newer medium "has introduced the value of time, and the effectiveness of brevity," he explains, adding that most motion pictures could be improved by compressing them to half their present length.

"A movie will show the trip to the airport, the boarding of the plane, and a scene inside showing the stewardess, as well as the standard shot of the character descending the portable steps of the plane with other passengers. Television treats this whole thing very briefly. The character says, 'Well, guess I'll go to Los Angeles ... leaving out all sequences unnecessary to the plot. No sense has been lost, and a lot of time has been gained.'"

DIT-DAH COURSE FOR RADIO HAMS

Learn to be a ham radio operator! The Amateur Radio Club is offering Morse code instruction for anyone interested in obtaining a novice license.

A meeting to organize instruction periods was held last Monday. Previous radio experiences is unnecessary, says Dr. Roscoe Peithman, club advisor.

Students who qualify for the novice license would be able to join Amateur Radio Club members who often contact other amateur stations during the Monday lunch hours. The campus station, with call letters W6HIQ, has corresponded with Massachusetts and Miami this year.

Code instruction will be given by members of the club, including Don Hitt, president, and Jim Wakeman, who was a radioman in the Marine Corps.

A novice license permits operation of a short wave radio. To qualify for the license, an operator must be able to send and receive code at five words per minute and know basic radio operation and maintenance. The novice license, which is issued by the Federal Communications Commission, expires after a year and cannot be renewed.

The operator must then qualify for a general license, which requires a code rate of 13 words a minute and greater knowledge of radio theory and operation. At least three people on campus have earned general licenses, including Dr. Peithman, Don Hitt, president of the club, and Vern Rollins.

Dr. Homer P. Balabanis, dean of instruction, will leave Tuesday, February 28, for the midwest to interview candidates for some 25 positions open on the HSC faculty for the 1956-57 school year.

JACKS GAIN SURE TIE FOR CROWN

While the Jacks are assured of at least a tie for first place in the Far Western Conference, their chances for sole ownership of the crown hinge directly on the outcome of this weekend's series between Nevada and the Cal Aggies at Reno.

If Nevada, who has a record of five wins and three losses, takes both games of the series, the Wolfpack will be tied with Humboldt for the number one spot in the league. On the other hand if Nevada loses either one of its games with the Aggies, Humboldt will be the undisputed champions of the Far Western Conference.

In the case of a tie between the Jacks and Nevada, a "sudden death" one game playoff will decide the Northern champions. The flip of a coin will determine the court on which the game will be played.

The winner of this proposed playoff would then meet the top college from Southern California to decide who would represent California in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics tournament in Kansas City. Last year San Francisco was defeated by Loyola in this North-South engagement.

It has already been decided to hold the one game playoff between the Northern representative, either Humboldt or Nevada, and the yet to be determined Southern team on the North team's home court. If the Jacks do earn the right to playoff, the game will be played in the Eureka High gym rather than on the HSC home court, which is considered too small to meet spectator needs.

The N. A. I. A. tournament in Kansas City has 16 teams from throughout the United States competing for its trophy. A Far Western Conference team has never participated in this annual tournament and it is hoped that this year can be the first.

TO: Dr. Joseph Forbes, Prof. of Physical Education.

ASSIGNMENT: Re-design the American football.

Mitchell, who is remembered for his many fine performances in motion pictures, including Academy Award-winning roles in "Stage Coach," with John Wayne in 1939, and "Gone With the Wind," with Clark Gable and Vivien Leigh in 1941, is at present the star of the TV series entitled, "Mayor of the Town," sponsored by Richfield Oil Company.

February 16, 1956

The meeting was called to order on the above date by vice-president Mike Fielding. Those present were: Fern Fowler, Pat Heney, Frank Bettendorf, George Ibarreta, Bob Jacobson, Bob Furber, Larry Flammer, Lewis Sbrana, Dick Harmer, Dr. Karshner, John Dufour, a guest, and Joan Guyn.

Old Business

Larry Flammer is to head a committee composed of Fern Fowler and Bob Jacobson to investigate possible locations for rental typewriters if it is definitely decided to install them. Larry also reported on his progress in checking the list of students who have not yet purchased Spring A. S. B. Cards. It was decided to wait until the Board of Finance made its check on card holders in activities before action be taken to encourage non-card holders to purchase their cards.

John Dufour passed out copies of a duplicated report which pointed out the functions of a student court and the changes necessary in forming such a court from the Board of Control. Council members are to read this report and be prepared to discuss it at the next meeting.

New Business

A motion was made, seconded, and passed to approve the Intercollegiate Knight's plan to establish a moveable information booth to be furnished and operated by Knights on certain occasions here on campus.

The A. S. B. President brought attention to the problem of irregular parking of cars near the science building. He is to refer this to Bill Johnson and the maintenance department.

A motion was made, seconded, and passed to accept the following proposed changes in the Veteran's Club Constitution: Sec. 2, Art. IV, Sec. 2 of the By-laws.

Mike Fielding reported that he has drawn up voting procedures for the coming election which will be duplicated and placed in the council members boxes.

A motion was made, seconded, and passed to accept the following prices for the Sweetheart Ball to be held Feb. 16; \$1.25 per couple with A. S. B. cards, \$1.50 per couple without A. S. B. cards, and no admission for freshmen class members.

In behalf of the Public Relations Committee of I. C. S., Frank Bettendorf reported on a meeting held with Dr. Turner and he offered assistance in carrying out the program, wherever possible.

Pat Heney said that John Pastorini, salesman for the Student Council Awards will be in Arcata Feb. 27, and that delivery can be made on these awards

well before the end of the semester.

A motion was made, seconded, and passed to approve Hotel Benbow as the location for the Spring A. S. B. Retreat. A letter is to be sent off by Lewis Sbrana and Frank Bettendorf to make reservations.

Larry Flammer reported that a large board will display the major changes in the A. S. B. Constitution to be voted upon in the coming election. Possible election dates are to be discussed at the next meeting.

George Ibarreta said that the plaque for Hello Lane is soon to be placed near the upper steps to the library. He said, too, that the trophy cabinets in the main building are being reorganized and brought up to date. Faculty members are being encouraged to contribute trophies they may have in their offices which would be appropriate in these cabinets. A group of girls on campus are to hold a trophy shining party.

Bob Jacobson, for Circle K, asked what progress has been made on the I. C. S. Clean-up the Campus program. This information must be secured from Intercollegiate Knights, since this project was turned over to this group.





Final Series With Raiders

JACKS COMPLETE SCHEDULE WITH WEEKEND SERIES

The Humboldt State College Lumberjacks complete their 1955-56 basketball schedule this weekend when they tangle with Southern Oregon in the last games of a four-game home-and-home series. Games will be played in the HSC gym tonight and Saturday night.

Lumberjack followers may have their last opportunity to see the Jacks at home this year, although the Jacks likely will play more games: with Nevada in a playoff for the conference championship, in the NAIA post-season tournament, or both.

Humboldt still leads the Far Western conference with a 7-3 record, but Nevada also has lost only three games. If Nevada wins twice against Cal Aggies in the Wolf Pack finale this week at Reno, Humboldt and Nevada will finish the conference schedule with identical records and the tie will have to be resolved by a playoff or a vote. Nevada is highly favored over the Aggies, who have yet to win a conference game this year.

Going into the Southern Oregon series with a 14 won, 9 lost record, Humboldt has a fine opportunity to better last years 14-11 record. Wins in both games would give the Jacks their best season's record in a decade.

Southern Oregon and Humboldt split the two games at Ashland last December 19 and 20, the Jacks bouncing back from a 69-57 licking to take the second game 64-60.

Bill Hollingsworth, a SOCE regular who rejoined the team this season after two-years in the army, dunked 25 points in the Raiders' winning game with Humboldt and 18 in the losing tilt.

Lloyd Hoffine, a three-year letterman and all-league player in the Oregon Collegiate conference, scored 18 in each game and will be another man to watch. Other SOCE starters likely will be Hal Titus, 6-6 center and another three-year letterman; Dale Bates, two-year letterman, and Punk Biddington or Chuck Crandall.

Lumberjack coach Franny Givins will counter with Jumping Joe Myers in the pivot, George Ibarreta and Hank Cooper, with the other two starting berths a

tossup among Warren Baker, Glenn Wallace, Larry Taylor and Paul Shields.

In preliminaries at 6 p.m., the HSC Junior Jacks will play North of Fourth Friday and Rio Dell American Legion Saturday. The jayvees go into their final games with a season record of 18-7 against amateur and high school competition. Starters will be Jim Babcock and Bobo Carlson at guards, Pete Mathieson at center, and Gary Mauney and Charles Hale or Dennis Collieran at forwards.

Both the jayvees and varsity will be able to practice in the HSC gym this week for the first time since fire damaged the plant February 5.

SENIOR HOOPSTERS IN LAST GAMES

Paul Shields, also a senior, will play his final regular game for Humboldt tomorrow night against Southern Oregon. He returned to the lineup late in the season.

Paul's 3.8 average does not reflect his value to the team this year as he was a very strong defensive standout on the squad.

Hawaii Scheduled To Meet Jacks In 1956-57 Football Season

With negotiations completed for a football game with the University of Hawaii on September 28, the Humboldt State College Lumberjacks look forward to the tough 11-game schedule that awaits them for the coming season.

Humboldt played 11 games in 1955 for its longest football schedule in history. In the 1956 season Humboldt again will play the entire schedule from Sept. 15 through the Thanksgiving game of Nov. 22 without an open date.

The Lumberjacks were to have played Moffett Field at Eureka Sept. 29. The Moffett game has been moved up to Sept. 15, giving the Jacks again only two weeks of practice for the opening of the strenuous campaign.

The Humboldt-Hawaii pact followed several years of negotiating between Phil Sarboe, HSC head coach and athletic director, and Henry B. Vasconcellos, athletic director for the Rainbows.

Under the two-year contract, Hawaii will play at Humboldt in 1957. Humboldt has an option to renew the home-and-home plan for 1958-59 if all factors work favorably toward a continuation of the series.

The complete schedule: Sept. 15, Moffett Field at Eureka; Sept. 22, Southern Oregon at Ashland; Sept. 28, Hawaii at Honolulu; Oct. 6, Sacramento State at Sacramento; Oct. 13, San Francisco State at Arcata; Oct. 20, Western Washington at Arcata; Oct. 27, Cal Aggies at Davis; Nov. 3, Chico State at Arcata; Nov. 10, Nevada at Reno; Nov. 17, Long Beach at Arcata; Nov. 22 (Thanksgiving Day), Lewis and Clark at Arcata.

Tough Schedule For Tracksters

Preparing for their recently announced 1956 track schedule, the Humboldt State thinclads face the longest and toughest cinder schedule in the history of the school when they begin the season with a three-way meet on March 24, announced track coach Bob Doornink last week.

Beginning with a three-way meet on March 24 at Chico against Chico and Nevada, the Lumberjacks will run and jump in three three-way meets and three dual meets before the conference meet at Sacramento on May 12.

The Jacks hope to make a serious bid for the conference crown this year, Doornink said. Humboldt trackmen broke five school records last season but in the conference meet finished last. With 45 men out and more reporting, the squad should be much improved, Doornink said.

May 5 — Dual meet with Southern Oregon at Ashland.

May 12 — Conference meet at Sacramento.

Nevada led all the way in beating Sacramento State College 71 to 60 in a Far Western Conference basketball game.

JACKS TAKE TWO FROM MOFFETT FIELD

The Lumberjacks were back in the win column once again, as they took both games of a doubleheader from the Moffett Field Flyers last weekend, by the scores of 66-56 and 65-56.

Led by Warren Baker who contributed 18 points to the Jack cause, the Lumberjacks had things fairly well their own way in the first game. Coach Franny Givins put his reserves into the game during the latter stages of the second half and during most of the last quarter.

Humboldt jumped to a 12-3 lead in the first quarter and held a 31-21 advantage at halftime. In the third quarter, the Flyers cut Humboldt's lead to six points but could not maintain the pace, as the Jacks pulled away to a 58-40 lead at the end of the quarter.

In the second game of the series, Humboldt ran up against a fired up Flyer quintet that was determined to make the Jacks earn their victory. Moffett Field led throughout the first half, except for the final minutes, when Humboldt, paced by Taylor and Ibarreta, rallied to a 36-32 half-time lead.

The Jacks took over in the second half and slowly built up a substantial lead. The reserves came in late in the game for both squads.

Following Taylor in the scoring was George Ibarreta with 19 points.
