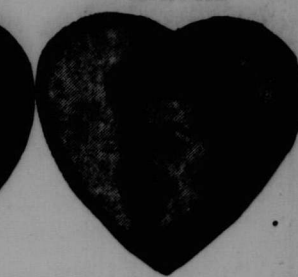

Fire Repairs On Gym Started

Repair work on the southwest corner of the gym began last Wednesday morning and will continue for approximately 30 working days, it was stated this week by Business Manager Frank Devorey.

Reconstruction of the corner and repair of the wiring system, burned February 5 in an early morning blaze that caused an estimated \$12,500 damages, will cause almost no interruption of normally scheduled classes, and probably little relocation, Devorey said.

\$100 Scholarship Added HSC Funds

One hundred dollars was added to HSC scholarship funds recently by the Northern Humboldt Teachers' Association, represented by Mrs. Roy H. Sorenson of Arcata.

The association, in its initial scholarship to the college, is donating the money to a student majoring in education. Mrs. Sorenson, president of the group of more than 200 members, states that the gift is to be awarded to a student on the basis of need, character and scholarship.

Albert Blood, newly appointed coordinator of the college scholarship program, received the money and will oversee choice of the recipient. Blood, also placement officer and assistant sociology professor, assumes administration of scholarship awards, contacting donors and student candidates.

Members of the association are teachers in primary and secondary schools in northern Humboldt county. The group is a local chapter of the California Teachers' Association.

The new scholarship, which will become effective in September, will be conferred at the college's June commencement ceremonies, along with other awards.

BALLAD OPERA NEXT FRIDAY

The Beggars' Opera, the Humboldt Players' forthcoming musical production to be presented February 24, 25, and March 1, 2, 3, at 8:15 p. m. in the college auditorium is not a true opera. Rather, it might be compared to a comic opera. A still more applicable term which has dialogue and song, might be "ballad opera." This type was not unfamiliar to the American continent during the 19th century, as the lasting popularity of "Down in the Valley" will testify.

While the narrative consists mainly of the rascality of MacHeath, a highwayman, with the law and with women, most of the music in the opera is gay and simple. Some of the ballads are lyrical and still heard today.

All seats for the production will be reserved. Tickets, are available in the drama office, room 22 of the college administration building, phone Arcata 432.

Dr. Stanley Glenn, assistant professor of speech, directs the production, and Miss Kay Gott, assistant professor of physical education, has arranged the choreography. Mrs. Ethelyn Pauley is costume director and John Van Duser, associate professor of drama, has charge of settings. Frank Bettendorf is student stage manager.

HERITAGE WEEK CLIMAXES IN 11 A. M. ADDRESS

American Heritage week draws to a close today with a major address by 1954 Nobel Prize winner, Dr. Linus Pauling, who will discuss the development of American science in the college auditorium today at 11 a. m.

This address marks the last of four such presentations which began Tuesday evening with Professor Reese Bullen's discussion of Art in America. With the aid of slides, Mr. Bullen traced the course of realism, impressionism, and cubism - their influence and period of popularity in America. "Modern art is not a fad," says Bullen, "Industry and advertising are now utilizing it to a great extent."

This was followed Wednesday evening by Professors Jones and Roske's narration entitled tragedy and legacy of the Civil War, Thursday night's program featured a talk on our heritage of freedom, by Dr. William Warren Sweet, nationally recognized historian of American religion.

Throughout the past week room 132, Ad building, has displayed an "Art in America" show, borrowed from the San Francisco Museum of Art, and a "Popular Art in the United States" show borrowed from the Smithsonian Institute.

The audio-visual room in the library is showing historical documents of the United States from the national archives.

A display by California artist Phil Dike is on display in the art gallery. All exhibits will close tonight at 10 p. m.

ACTOR SPEAKS ON HSC CAMPUS

Conservation of natural resources was highlighted by motion picture actor, director, playwright, and producer Thomas Mitchell yesterday, as he spoke at a special 11 a. m. assembly in the auditorium.

Arrangements for the speaker's Humboldt county tour were made jointly by the Richfield Oil Company and the Redwood Region Conservation Council.

He arrived in the area Wednesday, and, after luncheon at the Eureka Inn, was taken on a trip through the Scotia plant of the Pacific Lumber Company. He attended an informal dinner at the Scotia Inn that evening.

Directly after his campus appearance, Mitchell was entertained by members of Conservation Unlimited at a Nelson Hall luncheon. He returned to his Los Angeles home by air yesterday afternoon.

STATE TO PURCHASE ORGANS

HSC organ students of James T. Mearns, associate professor of music and member of the American Guild of Organists, are overjoyed at the recent change in state policy to permit the purchase of organs for state college instruction.

Humboldt State College is one of several state colleges slated to have organs in time for use in the fall semester of 1956.

Organ classes at HSC have travelled downtown to Arcata's First Methodist Church for study and practice at the organ, for many years.

KHSC BUILDS TAPE LIBRARY

In addition to maintaining a regular broadcast schedule on the campus radio station, KHSC, radio workshop students at Humboldt State are participating in a number of special services.

As a semester project graduate student, Ken Stodder is working on the development of a tape library, which will contain major programs presented at the college. This tape library is being developed in co-operation with the Humboldt-Del Norte Audio-Visual department and is available for use by campus groups, faculty members and high schools of this area.

Yesterday crews from KHSC set up equipment and recorded the Dr. William Sweet program. This morning, the talk by Dr. Linus Pauling will be recorded by workshop students. These programs will be re-broadcast over local commercial radio stations.

Recently added to the tape library was the faculty quartet production "Don Juan in Hell", which was later played to the Arcata Theatre group.

January Grad Wins Game Fellowship

Fred Kindel, January graduate in game management at Humboldt State College, has won a \$3,000 competitive research fellowship at the University of Idaho, it was announced last week.

Kindel will be engaged in studies on elk in Idaho under the direction of Dr. Paul Balke and Dr. Kenneth Hungerford at the University of Idaho in the Idaho cooperative wildlife research unit.

The fellowship will provide \$1500 for each of two school years plus employment on a state salary during summers.

Kindel, the son of Mr. and Mrs. James F. Kindel of Coleville, enrolled at Humboldt State after two years at Los Angeles Valley junior college. He was active in Conservation Unlimited, club of wildlife and fisheries students, while at Humboldt State.

Other January Graduates

Five other students who completed their work in the game management program in January are now engaged in various game projects. They include Mrs. Sera Miller Baxter, who has joined her husband Rae Baxter in Alaska, where he is working for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife service. Baxter is a 1954 graduate of the HSC fisheries program.

project with Darrel Cooley, Arlan King and Dale Horne.

Roy Magnuson has been employed by the California Department of Fish and Game as a biologist at San Pedro as a biologist in a cooperative tuna project. Magnuson graduated last January from HSC with a degree in fisheries.

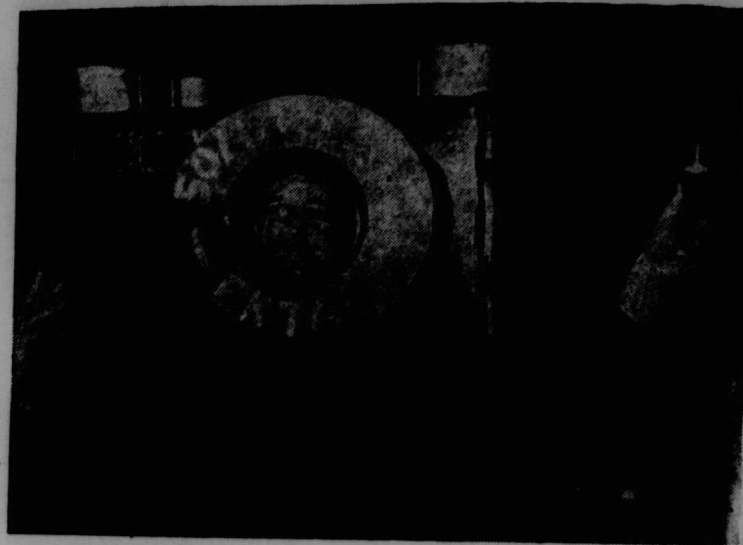
Claude Gribble and his combo provided music to excite the senses and the feet of brightly clad dancers.

Irv Baney has been appointed the new ICS representative; Pat Benson, the new secretary, and Jim Mayo, the new treasurer... a distinct change.

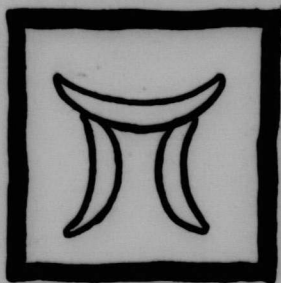

JACKS CROWN HOPES FADE WITH LOSSES TO NEVADA

Chances for the Humboldt State College Lumberjacks garnering their first Far Western Conference crown in 14 years were considerably lessened last weekend in Reno, as the University of Nevada hoop team swept the two game series, 63-58 and 68-57.

The Lumberjacks, who have finished the season with a 7-3 league mark, can gain a tie for the crown if Nevada and San Francisco State lose any one of their remaining four conference games.

The first game of the crucial series was hard fought all the way with very little to choose between the two teams until the final four minutes of play, when the Wolfpack built up an advantage and kept it. The first half ended with Nevada holding a 24-20 lead, after overcoming a seven point deficit built up by the Jacks.

George Ibarreta led the Hill-toppers scoring attack with 18 points, while Joe Myers contributed 16 points to the lost cause.

The University of Nevada was never headed in the final game, as they jumped to a quick 8-1 lead and led 28-21 at the half time. With 12 minutes to go in the first half, Humboldt narrowed the Wolfpack lead to three points and was the closest they came to overtaking the hustling Nevada five.

The Jacks came out of the half time rest period as if they meant business and narrowed the score to 49-44, but Jim Lyon, who scored 32 points for Nevada, sunk two jump shots and Nevada was off once again. Humboldt stayed fairly close to Nevada because of their success at the

free throw line, as they hit on 19 of 22 attempts.

Ibarreta duplicated his Friday night output with 18 markers, as did Myers who scored 16 for the Jacks.

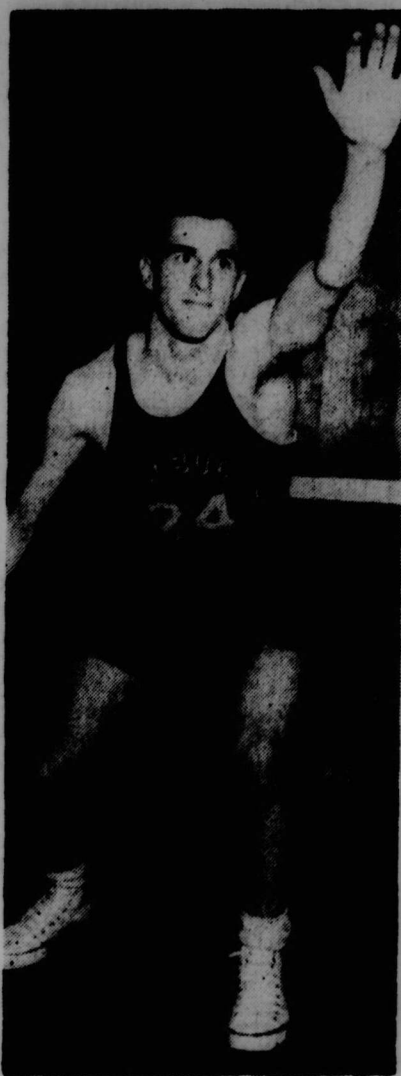

Humboldt and Moffet Field have never met in basketball competition, although their football squads tangled last fall. Moffet Field has played San Francisco State twice this year and lost both engagements, while the Jacks were victors over the unpredictable Gators this year.

Moffet has a rather mediocre nine win, fifteen loss record this year but it tied for first place in the tough Twelfth Naval District league. This league has some of the finest Navy teams on the coast included in its competition.

Coach of Moffet Field is Joe Moore who is known to sports fans in this area as the former Eureka High school assistant coach. Moore was the coach of Humboldt's Hank Cooper when he was in the Navy and says that Cooper is "one of the best players he has ever coached."

CAL AGGIES GRID COACH RESIGNS

The Cal Aggies head football coach Ted Forbes has resigned his post at Davis and will take over as supervisor of physical education for the Sacramento City Unified School District, it was announced recently by the Director of Physical Education at U.C.D., I. F. Toomey.

Forbes went to Davis in 1948 and took over as head football coach, and also as supervisor of physical education. Forbes coached Far Western champions in 1949 and 1951. This past football season, Forbes led the Mustangs to runner-up spot in the conference.

Graduating from UCLA in 1942 with a B.A. degree, Forbes was a star halfback for UCLA and was one of the schools all time greats. He captained the 1941 team and was named its most valuable player.

A second lieutenant in the Air Force during World War II, Forbes was stationed in Texas where he was an instructor until 1945, when he was released to return to study and receive his master degree at UCLA. In 1954-55, Forbes received his doctor's degree after a year's study at Columbia University.

Will Lotter has been chosen to take over the coaching duties vacated by Forbes. He joined the Aggie coaching staff as assistant football coach in 1952. Lotter took over as temporary head coach in 1954 when Forbes was working on his doctor's degree at Columbia.

Lotter was a halfback for the University of California at Berkeley and played in the 1948 Rose Bowl.

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
