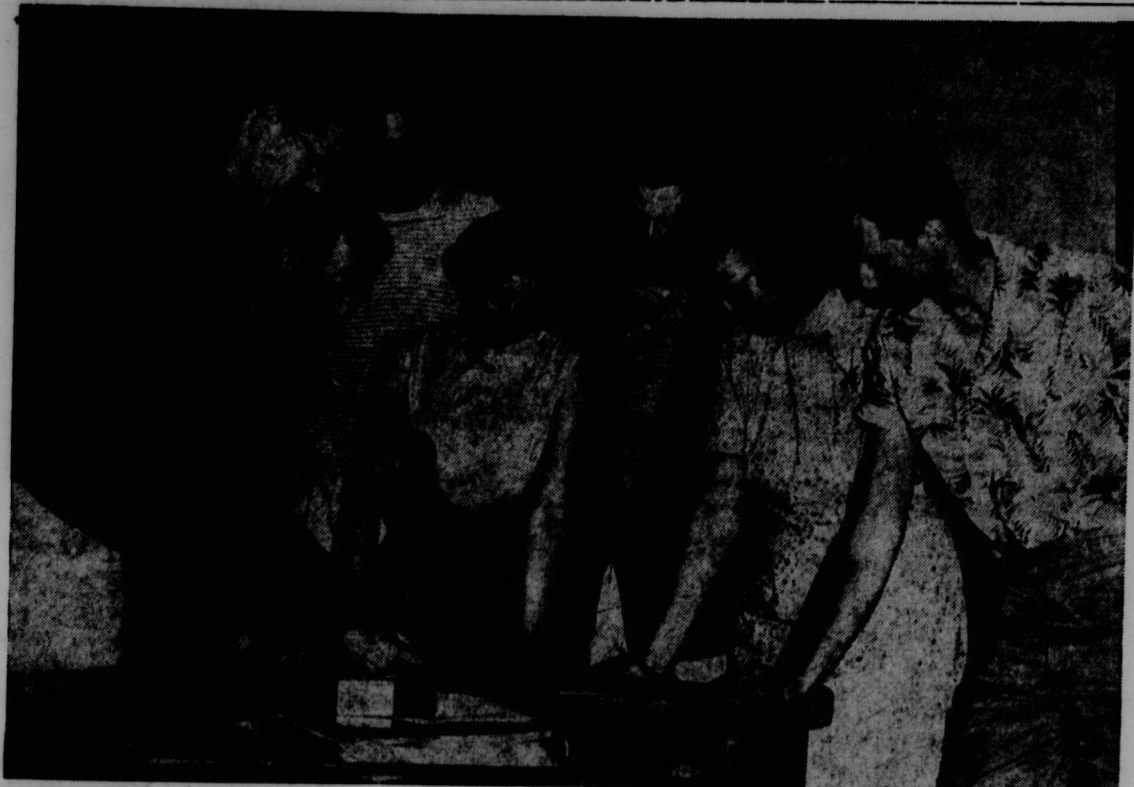

### LANDIS ADDRESS TO CONCLUDE MARRIAGE WEEK'S EVENTS



Sociologist Judson T. Landis, of the University of California, Davis campus, will climax a week-long program during Marriage Education week at Humboldt State College during April 9-14.

Dr. Landis, author of a sociology textbook used by 200 colleges, will address college students and visitors at 11 a. m. Friday, April 13, in the college auditorium.

The third annual Marriage Education Week, planned by and for the students, concludes at HSC today.

Dr. Judson Taylor Landis, associate professor of family sociology at the University of California, Davis campus, and national-

ly known authority in the fields of marriage and family relations, arrived on campus yesterday, and today will climax the week of discussion programs with an address on "Building a Successful Marriage" in the college auditorium at 11 a. m.

Six group discussions on specific topics were held during the early part of the week, with Dr. Landis appearing for question and answer sessions called "What's On Your Mind?" Thursday evening from 7 to 9 and Friday morning from 9 to 10:30, before his Assembly talk. The public is invited.

Appointed to the University of California faculty in 1950, Dr. Landis organized the university's first courses of study in marriage and family relations. Two of his major published works are the textbooks "Building a Successful Marriage," used by more than 200 colleges, and "Personal Adjustment, Marriage and Family Living," approved as a text for California high schools.

A party spokesman reports that a committee has been formed to study the offices of rally and assemblies commissioners and to nominate, in the parties name, appropriate persons to these offices.

### Lt. Gov. Powers To Appear Tues. On HSC Campus

Lt. Governor Harold J. Powers will speak at an assembly in the Humboldt State auditorium next Tuesday at 11 a. m. as part of his appearance in Humboldt County.

Classes will not be excused for the assembly, but all students are invited to hear Mr. Powers. His topic likely will be on a phase of California state government, said Elmer Haskins of Eureka, one of the sponsors of the lieutenant governor's visit here.

Mr. Powers will be introduced by president Cornelius Siemens.

The lieutenant governor and Mrs. Powers are scheduled to motor to Eureka Monday afternoon, appear on a television press conference at 6:15 p. m., and be guests of honor at the Humboldt County Young Republicans dinner Monday at 8 p. m. at Redwood Acres.

Mr. and Mrs. Powers are scheduled to leave Tuesday afternoon following a luncheon in their honor in Nelson hall.

### Industrial Arts Exhibit Today

The work of outstanding young craftsmen from Humboldt county high schools and from HSC will be on display at the second annual HSC Industrial Arts Show Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, April 18, 19 and 20, in Jenkins hall on campus.

Sponsors of the show are members of the HSC Industrial Arts club working in cooperation with the north coast section, California Industrial Education Association.

Club members will host members of the association at a dinner meeting April 18 at 6:30 p. m. in the College Elementary school after which the educators will judge works on display. Winning entries will receive certificates of merit.

The displays will be open all three days from 8:30 a. m. to 4 p. m. and on Wednesday also from 7 to 9 p. m., said Bob Meeks, club president.

Some of the items on display will be for sale. Funds derived will go toward a scholarship being set up by the club to assist an outstanding student majoring in industrial arts at HSC.

A chance for adults to become aware of the boldness, directness and wonderful color and pattern characteristic of children's paintings is offered in the current exhibit at the HSC art gallery.

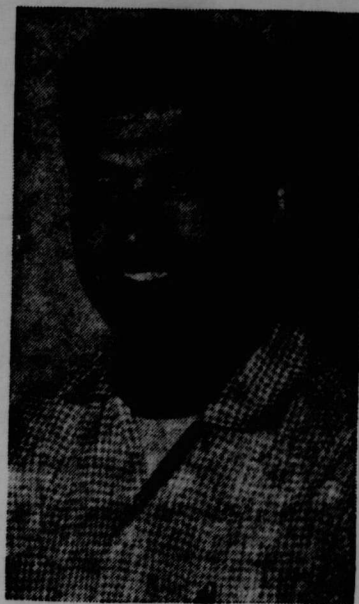

### Eight Sided Platform Revealed By O. V. Party

**DO YOU WANT A VOICE IN YOUR STUDENT GOVERNMENT?** You have the opportunity to select the students who will represent you, by casting your ballot in the forthcoming Student Body election Wednesday, April 25. The **OCTAGON** - **VOLUNTEERS** urge each and every one of you to take advantage of the privilege **AND VOTE**. Two previously established political parties have joined forces in an attempt to bring you more equal representation and the best possible service. THE **OCTAGON PARTY** and **VOLUNTEERS FOR GOOD GOVERNMENT** present, for your evaluation, the following eight sided platform:

#### 1. A. S. B. CARD - SPLIT!!

Under the present system, certain students cannot receive the full benefits of the A. S. B. card. In an attempt to satisfy the minority as well as the majority, we advocate the **SPLIT CARD SYSTEM**. Under this system, there would be a card that would allow all students to enjoy the following benefits: **MEMBERSHIP CARD** - belonging to the Associated Student Body; Clubs; Organizations; privileges of voting; receive the Lumberjack; Health Cottage; etc. The other card would be an **ACTIVITIES CARD** which would allow benefits such as: Free admission to athletic events; dramatic presentations; discounts on school functions; and the yearbook, to mention a few.

#### 2. SEVEN DAY MEAL TICKETS - NO!!

We, as many other students on campus, believe that with increased enrollment housing will become a larger problem than it is at present, but a seven day mandatory meal ticket is not the answer to this problem. This would only create a financial burden on students who would not and could not be on campus during week-ends.

#### 3. REGISTRATION - SIMPLIFIED!!

All students are familiar with the long lines during the registration periods. **BUT** with the more simplified plan we will propose, registration time could be cut in half.

#### 4. LUMBERJACK - LARGER!!

Humboldt is growing and with it so should school publications. A six-page weekly newspaper would increase printing costs, but with proper budgeting procedures, this **CAN** be accomplished and **SHOULD**.

#### 5. ACTIVITIES - IMPROVED AND VARIED!!

We feel that the present activities program on our campus is not providing the entertainment that **YOU** want. With better communications between the students and our Activities Commissioner you will have a better voice in your activities program for the year.

6. At present the bookstore facilities along with the service is inadequate due to the limited space available for this operation. The placing of a one-story building next to the Co-op, obtainable at a nominal cost, would eliminate this problem and allow the bookstore to carry a larger variety of items for your convenience. This, in turn, would release the downstairs portion of the Co-op as a lounge and activities room for students.

#### 7. PARKING - REARRANGEMENT!!

It is our intention to investigate all possibilities to find a workable system to facilitate sufficient parking areas.

#### 8. SERVICE - STUDENT REPRESENTATION!!

The **OCTAGON** - **VOLUNTEER** party will take full measures, at all times, to constantly act as your representative in your student government.

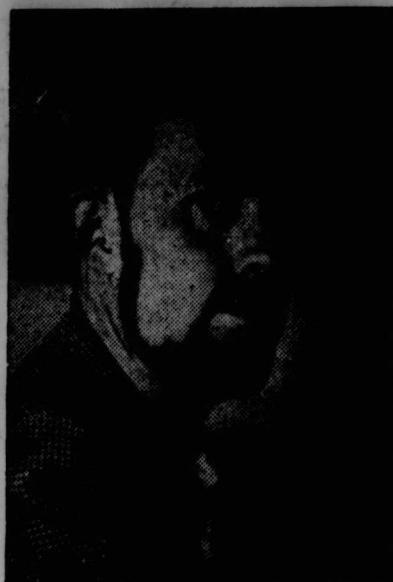
## The Editors Mail

Dear Fran,

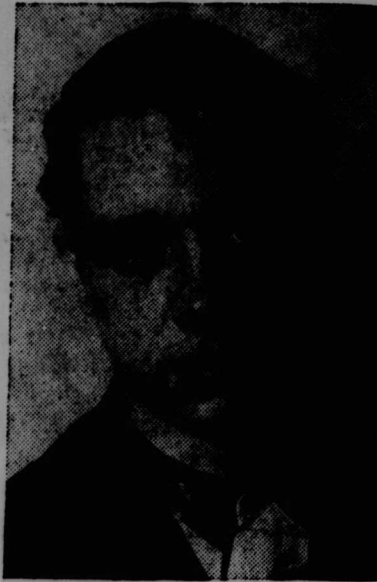

## Arnot, Shaver To Hold Debate With Nordic Students April 16

Two Scandinavian students, touring the U.S. in debate performances under the auspices of the U.S. State Department, will engage Humboldt State students Monday, April 16, at 7 p.m., at a dinner meeting of the Knife and Fork Club at the Vance Hotel in Eureka. College faculty and students may attend the dinner and program by making reservations, \$3.25 each, with the division of fine and applied arts by Wednesday, April 11.

HSC debaters Jim Arnot, pre-law student from Eureka, and Jim Shaver, sophomore student from Pacific Palisades majoring in the social sciences, will meet the visitors in an audience debate. With arguments designed primarily to influence the audience, the debate will be decided by audience balloting. Group discussion will follow the debate. Visiting students will be Harald Uncas Serner, 24, of Sweden, who received a law degree in 1954 from the University of Stockholm; and Poul J. Svanholm, 22, of Denmark, who is studying law at the University of Copenhagen.

This is the first time HSC has been included in the itinerary of the annual debate tour by foreign students, although the program has existed for about 30 years. Arrangements were made by HSC Debate Coach Milton Dobkin with the sponsoring organization, the Institute of International Education, centered in New York City. A debate team from the U. S. tours Europe each year on the same program, which is under the auspices of the U. S. State Department.

Equipped to debate seven topics on their tour, the Scandinavian students have chosen for their local appearance the current national college topic, "That the non-agricultural industries of the U. S. should guarantee their employees an annual wage", and will take the affirmative side.

Just prior to their appearance in Eureka, the Scandinavians will visit Stanford University April 10, and will continue north to the University of Oregon, visiting approximately 50 colleges in the country.

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# Minutes of the Student Council

The meeting was called to order April 5 by vice-president, Mike Fielding. Regular members present were: Pat Heney, Craig Stark, Jim Westman, Frank Bettendorf, Bob Jacobson, George Ibarreta, Larry Flammer, Bob Furber, Dick Harmer, Joan Guyn, and Marilyn Wright, the new assembly commissioner.

The following corrections were made on the March 22 Student Council Minutes: The public address system has been approved for use before elections from 51 minutes to 59 minutes after the hour; the Spring Prom has replaced the Junior-Senior Prom of past years.

This meeting was also attended by representatives of the various clubs and organizations on campus for the purpose of discussing methods of revising the present plan for purchasing Associated Student Body Cards. Larry Flammer presented a plan wherein a stipulated amount would automatically be paid at the registration, both fall and spring semesters, for membership in the A. S. B. An additional and optional amount could be paid for an activity card each which would entitle the holder to reduced rates at athletic and social affairs on campus. Such a plan would go into effect next fall if approved.

A motion was made, seconded, and passed that this body postpone any action toward enforcing the requirement of 100 percent A. S. B. membership in order for clubs to remain in existence. This matter is to be referred to Assembly Bill 827 for definite action.

A motion was made, seconded, and passed to accept April 25 as the date for the election of Student Body Officers for 1956-57. The committee to work on preparations for the election are Larry

Flammer, Bob Jacobson, and Bob Furber.

The President's Council announcement was read which will make the purchase of a 7-day meal ticket at Nelson Hall mandatory for students living in the dormitories. There was a lengthy discussion in opposition to this plan by the members present. In behalf of the evidence to show that most meal ticket holders are definitely opposed to this plan, the Student Council will make every effort to assist the students in maintaining the present option to buy a 5-day ticket.

Larry Flammer announced that Dr. Baker will be the next Board of Control adviser. Upper division students who are interested in being a member of this board may sign a sheet which will be posted on the main bulletin board.

Frank Bettendorf is to try to contact Mr. Thompson, the owner of Hotel Benbow, to secure rates for the accommodations of those who will attend the Spring A. S. B. retreat.

The Student Body President announced that there is to be a get-together of a group of Scandinavian debaters on April 16 at 2 p. m., council members are invited and urged to attend. Dick Harmer said that he would

like the council to take steps toward improving the appearance of the sign in the plaza. The council agreed to contribute the sum, possibly \$200, necessary to finance this improvement; Dr. Siemens has agreed to supplement this amount. Bob Furber, Mike Fielding, and Dick Harmer are to work on this project.

Dick Harmer reported a high school student leaders' conference, which is held each year on different high school campuses. He said that Dr. Karshner wanted to know if the council would be interested in having the Associated Students host one of these meetings. The group seemed in favor of this suggestion and it was decided to discuss this further at the Spring A. S. B. Retreat.

### TRACKSTERS MEET GATORS AND CAL AGGIES

Humboldt State's rampaging trackmen set their sights a little higher tomorrow, as they travel to San Francisco for a three-way meet with the San Francisco Gators and the University of Nevada. The meeting will be held at Cox field in San Francisco and is scheduled to get underway at 1:30.

Last weekend Humboldt won its first major track meet in ten years, as they almost completely dominated the track events and came out of the meeting with ten first places. The scores were Humboldt 82½, Cal Aggies 70½ and USF 7.

San Francisco State is probably the toughest competition that the Jacks have had to face yet this year, with possibly the exception of Chico. The Gators, who finished second in the conference meet last year, recently met and soundly defeated Sacramento State.

The Jacks have met and defeated the University of Nevada previously this year, and are not expecting as much trouble from Nevada as they are the strong Gator squad.

### Tennis Men Engage In First College Meet

The Lumberjack tennis squad has been working hard during the past week trying to line up their number one and two players for their first intercollegiate competition tomorrow against Southern Oregon at the Eureka High school tennis courts. Matches are scheduled to start at 1 p.m.

Coach Hank Yamagata said individual rankings on the HSC team would be determined late this week as the result of intra-squad battles.

Bill Williams, and Bob Agnew, both sophomores from Eureka, have been waging a nip and tuck battle through the pre-season skirmishes for the No. 1 spot on the team.

Williams played No. 1 Sunday as the HSC netters won 6-1 over a team of alumni and faculty players on the hilltop courts. Williams won over Paul Jensen of last year's squad 6-4, 6-2.

Playing No. 2, Agnew won over Archie Jones of the faculty 6-0, 6-0. John Marcuz, junior from Eureka, won over Bill Myers of the alumni 3-2 in a one-set match. Mike Fielding, Eureka junior, handed Leon Wagner of the faculty a 6-3 loss in another one-set go, and Mike McGovern, Eureka freshman, lost to Al Gautraud of the Arcata High school faculty 6-1, 6-0.

In the doubles matches, Agnew and Fielding won over Jones and Wagner 8-2, 6-1, and Williams and Marcuz defeated Jensen and Myers 7-5, 4-6, 7-5.

The Southern Oregon match will be the first of a home-and-home arrangement. HSC netters are scheduled to travel to Ashland the following week end. Two meets against conference opponents, a joust with Shasta jaycee at Redding and the conference matches at Chico round out the schedule.

### JACKS WIN TRIO ON ROAD TRIP
