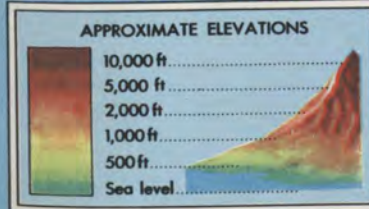

SOCIAL SECURITY

Since 1936, a vast system of taxes and payments has grown up under the general title of Social Security. This should by now have become part of the tax and retirement planning of everyone covered by its complex laws.

Most people in our country are covered by these laws and have benefits legally due them. With a few exceptions like doctors, employees of the Federal Government, and railroad workers; everyone who works for others, who is in private business for himself, who is in the professions, who is a farmer, or who is in the armed forces is covered by these laws and entitled to their benefits if he earns the required amount of credit for work under social security.

1. RETIREMENT BENEFITS

When you have worked long enough, and are at least 62, you can be paid monthly social security payments while you are retired. The amount of work credit required to receive benefits depends on when you become 65 (62 if a woman). Men and women who reached this age in 1957 or earlier need credit for 6 calendar quarters (about 1½ years) of work under social security. For each year that a man is under 65 (or a woman is under 62) after 1957, credit for an additional quarter of work is required.

The amount of your payments is figured from your average earnings under social security. The amount will also depend on whether you wish to receive them at 65 or decide to receive them earlier. Your monthly payments will be lower if you choose to receive

benefits before you are 65. The benefit table below shows about what benefit you may expect.

2. DISABILITY BENEFITS

If you become disabled before age 65, mentally or physically, so that you are unable to "engage in any substantial gainful activity," you may be eligible for monthly disability insurance benefits after you have been disabled for at least 6 months. The amount of your monthly disability payment will be the same as the amount of old-age insurance benefit you would get if you were already 65.

Another requirement that must be met is that the worker have credit for at least 5 years of work under social security in the 10-year period ending when he becomes disabled.

3. FAMILY PAYMENTS

When a worker receives old-age or disability benefits, or dies, payments can also be made to certain of his dependents, including: unmarried children under 18, or unmarried children 18 or over who were severely disabled before becoming 18; a wife 62 or older; a wife, regardless of her age, if she is caring for a child receiving benefits; a dependent husband 62 or older.

When a worker dies, payments may also be paid, in addition to the above, to his dependent parents 62 or older, and to his divorced wife under certain limited circumstances. In addition, when a worker dies, his widow (if she was living with him at the time of death) may receive a lump-sum payment in the amount shown on the benefit chart. When there is no eligible spouse, the lump sum can go to pay the worker's burial expenses.

This schedule of tax rates is designed to meet the future obligations of the program and keep it on a self-supporting basis.

THINGS TO REMEMBER:

a. Social security benefits are not paid automatically. They must

be applied for and evidence establishing the claim must be submitted to the local social security office.

b. You can always appeal any decision on your claim by requesting a review, a hearing by a hearing examiner, and a review of the hearing examiner's decision. Your local social security office will help you do this if you wish.

c. The social security office nearest you can give you an application blank to fill out to obtain a social security number, or to obtain a duplicate social security card if you have lost yours.

d. If you change jobs frequently you should check social security's record of your earnings every three years. A post card for this purpose can be obtained from your social security office.

e. Your local social security office is the place to find out about social security. To find the address, look in the telephone directory under: U.S. Government: Department of Health, Education & Welfare: Social Security Administration. The social security office will answer any questions you may have.

UNITED STATES CUSTOMS REQUIREMENTS

PERSONAL EXEMPTIONS—Each returning resident is granted \$100 duty free exemption once each 30 days. All articles purchased in the possession of the traveler at the time of his return to the U.S., or being shipped, must be declared to customs. The actual purchase price or fair market value must be reported. (It is advisable to retain receipts for all purchases.) Failure to declare all articles subjects the undeclared items to seizure. Duty is payable on articles in excess of exemption. If fair value exceeds \$100, exemptions will apply to articles of highest duty rate.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES—Returning residents are permitted free of duty one gallon of alcoholic beverages. Amounts in excess are subject to duty, state and federal excise tax. Permits are required for alcoholic beverages intended for sale or commercial purposes. Customs will not permit the release of liquor destined for use in violation of state laws.

GIFTS—valued at less than \$10 sent to the U.S. are not subject to duty or taxes. Alcoholic beverages and tobacco are not included in this privilege nor perfume valued at more than \$1.00. Gifts for personal use must be included in returnee's personal declaration.

RELIGIOUS ARTICLES—Altars, statuary, shrines, regalia, books, stained glass, may be accorded free entry when imported in good faith for use by any organization operated for religious purposes.

AUTOMOBILES—Foreign passenger cars are subject to customs duty of 7½% of the appraised value. Vehicles taken abroad may be returned duty free by showing proof of registration.

PETS AND GAME BIRDS—Animals and birds for personal use and breeding purposes free of evidence of communicable disease may enter the country subject to health, customs, federal, state and municipal laws and regulations; vaccination not required for cats or monkeys; necessary for dogs arriving from most countries. Special permits required for wild birds.

FOOD PRODUCTS—Meat products may be imported from countries where the meat inspection systems are equivalent to the meat inspection system in the United States. Shipment must be accompanied by an inspection certificate. Meat products are prohibited from countries where rinderpest or foot-and-mouth disease exists. Unprocessed agricultural products (including flowers and fruits) generally cannot be brought into the U.S.

CALORIE CHART

Counting the calories with every meal is common practice for many, so it is important to know just what they are.

For convenience sake, the kilogram Calorie (spelled with a capital C)—which represents the heat necessary to raise the temperature of 1 kilogram (2.2 lbs.) of water 1°C.—is generally used to express the energy-producing value of food.

If our food intake is more than our body's energy needs, the body stores the excess, mainly as body fat, and we gain weight. If food intake is insufficient, the body draws on its own reserves with resultant loss in body weight.

Whether we gain, lose or maintain weight depends on calorie intake in relation to body calorie requirement.

FAMOUS NATIONAL DISHES

FRANCE: SUPREMES de VOLAILLE AMANDINE—Chicken breasts, boned and skinned, sautéed until browned, then simmered in a sauce of blanched almonds, tomato paste, meat glaze, chicken stock and white wine.

BOEUF BOURGUIGNONNE—Beef in large cubes, browned in butter and flamed with Cognac, then cooked in a casserole with carrots, onions, parsley and Burgundy red wine, and garnished with sautéed mushroom caps.

HOMARD à la NEWBURG—Lobster cut up and sautéed in butter, then flamed with Cognac and sauced with dry sherry and heavy cream added to a cream sauce.

ITALY: CHICKEN CACCIATORE—Chicken browned in olive oil, then simmered with onions, tomatoes, garlic, sweet peppers and white wine.

LASAGNE—Wide noodles baked in layers with tomato sauce, sliced Mozzarella cheese and grated Parmesan cheese.

ZABAGLIONE—Dessert made by beating egg yolks, sugar and Marsala wine together. Served hot.

GERMANY: PAPRIKA SHNITZEL—Thin slices of veal sautéed in butter and served with a sauce of paprika, shallots, light stock, white wine and sour cream.

TORTEN—Elaborate cakes, rich with nuts and eggs, sparse of flour and butter: Nusstorte (nut), Punsch Torte (rum flavored), etc.

APFELKRAUT—Sauerkraut simmered with chicken stock, crisp bacon, sautéed onions and tart quartered apples.

SPAIN: PAELLA VALENCIANA—Chicken sautéed and combined with rice cooked with saffron and chicken stock and baked in a casserole with lobster, shrimp, mussels, Spanish sausage (chorizo) and pimento.

CAMARONES al ESTILO ESPAÑOL—Shrimp sautéed in olive oil and butter with onions, garlic, parsley, tomatoes, green olives and seasoning.

FLAN—Custard of egg yolks, cream, sugar and milk, baked in a mold coated with caramelized sugar, then unmolded and served cold.

Have the patient lie down. Cover him. Blankets under his body are important to keep him comfortably warm yet not overheated. Do not move an injured person unless it is absolutely unavoidable and never by lifting him head-and-heels. Keep the patient very quiet and assure him that everything possible is being done for his welfare. Never give an unconscious person a drink but do loosen the clothing around his neck.

SHOCK

The most important signs: weakness, skin pale, moist and cooler than customarily. Other symptoms: beads of perspiration about the lips, forehead, palms, armpits; possible vomiting; pulse fast but weak or impossible to find.

Keep patient lying down, lower extremities elevated 8-12 inches if injury is severe but not if he has sustained a head injury, breathes with difficulty or finds the position painful.

Keep patient comfortably warm. If doctor does not arrive in a half hour, administer half-glasses of water with ½ teaspoon of salt and ½ teaspoon of baking soda added to each quart.

BLEEDING AND WOUNDS

Minor wounds should be washed with a bland soap and water. A sterile dressing should be applied over the wounded area and held in place by a bandage.

Ninety-five percent of all external bleeding can be controlled by applying a thick sterile pad directly over the wound and keeping it snugly in place with a bandage. Elevate the wounded part if a leg or an arm. For suspected internal bleeding, keep the patient quiet and lying down. Do not give liquids. This may be an urgent medical case.

For hemorrhage that cannot be controlled by direct pressure, apply a tourniquet just above the wound, tightened securely and not released until seen by a doctor. Only use tourniquet if blood is spurting from an artery, if bleeding can be controlled by no other means, and where an extremity of the body is involved. Improper use of a tourniquet can cause the loss of a limb.

POISONING

Dilute the poison at once by giving large quantities (4 glasses or more for adults) of milk or water. Or induce vomiting.

EXCEPTION: If patient has swallowed strong acids do not cause him to vomit. Give him glass of water followed by milk of magnesia or water with several teaspoonfuls of baking soda added to each glass. For alkalis, give a glass of water quickly, then vinegar or lemon juice, diluted. Follow with milk, olive oil or egg white. Do not induce vomiting.

If you know no specific antidote frequently the label on the poison container has antidote instructions.

GAS POISONING

Shut off the gas line and electricity. Then ventilate the room. Give artificial respiration (see next column).

ELECTRIC SHOCK

Cut off main switch or unscrew fuse. If victim is not breathing, give artificial respiration (see next column).

BURNS

Minor—exclude air with plenty of dry sterile dressings of several thicknesses.

Severe—keep-victim lying down. Cut clothing off burned areas and cover them with clean dressings. If area is large, rush victim to nearest hospital. But if medical aid is unavailable within about 20 minutes, give half-glass doses of a solution of one-half level teaspoon table salt and one-half level teaspoon baking soda in one quart of water at 15 minute intervals.

Chemical burns—wash away chemicals with large amounts of water. If first-aid directions are given on label, follow them. Otherwise proceed as for serious burns.

If chemical is in eye, have victim lie down. Use a heavy flushing solution of plain water only to get the chemical out of the eye. Pour water into inner corner of eye and allow it to run over eyeball, under lid. After copious flushing of the eye, enclose it with a sterile dressing and get the patient to a doctor as soon as possible.

BROKEN BONES

Keep the injured person warm and quiet. Apply an ice bag to the injured area to reduce pain. If necessary to move the victim, immobilize the fractured bone with a splint.

If the bone has punctured the skin, cover the wound with a thick sterile dressing over the bleeding area and bandage it smoothly in place. Do not try to push the bone back in.

Head injuries—loosen clothing about the neck. Keep patient lying flat if he is awake. Give no stimulants. With neck injury, do not move him or put a pillow under his neck.

ARTIFICIAL RESPIRATION**• MOUTH-TO-MOUTH METHOD**

If there is foreign matter visible in the mouth, wipe it out quickly with your fingers. Tilt the head back so the chin is pointing upward and the jaw is in a jutting-out position. These maneuvers should relieve obstruction of the airway by moving the base of the tongue away from the back of the throat. Open your mouth wide and place it tightly over the victim's mouth. Pinch the victim's mouth and place your mouth over the victim's mouth or nose. (Air may be blown through the victim's teeth, even though they may be clenched.) Your first blowing efforts should determine whether or not obstruction exists. Remove your mouth, turn your head to the side, get a full inhalation, then repeat the blowing effort. For an adult, blow vigorously at the rate of about 12 breaths per minute. For a child, take relatively shallow breaths appropriate to the child's size, approximately 20 per minute. If you are not getting air exchange, recheck head and jaw position. If air is still not being exchanged, quickly turn the victim on his side and give several slaps between the shoulder blades in the hope of dislodging foreign matter.

• CHEST PRESSURE—ARM LIFT METHOD

If there is foreign matter visible in the mouth, wipe it out quickly with your fingers. Place the victim in a face-up position and put something under his shoulders to raise them and allow his head to drop backward. Kneel at the victim's head, grasp his arms at the wrists, cross them, and press them over his lower chest. This should cause air to flow out. Release this pressure at once and pull his arms outward and upward over his head and backward as far as possible. This should cause air to rush in. Repeat this cycle about 12 times per minute, checking the mouth frequently for obstructions. If a second rescuer is available, have him hold the victim's head so that the jaw is jutting out. The helper should also be alert to detect the presence of any foreign matter in the mouth and keep the mouth as clean as possible at all times.

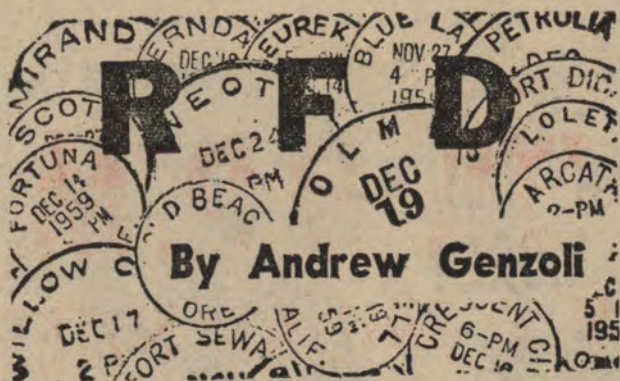

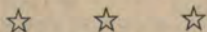
ANTIQUE SHOW — You are invited to Ferndale to see a community-wide antique show, now in progress.

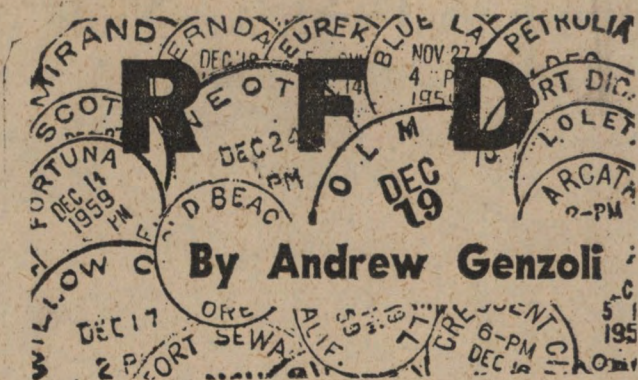

RFD'S "WHAT-TO-DO, WHERE-TO-GO" GUIDE (NO. 1) — As summer moves along, for some folks it becomes a problem to find interesting things to do, places to go.

RFD presents a group of ideas, not complete in any way, but suggestions which may interest you and add interest to your summer days.

This is RFD's "Baedeker":

BEACHES TO VISIT

Humboldt, Del Norte and Curry Counties have many fine beaches offering safe, pleasurable recreation. Here are some we know about:

CENTERVILLE: This beach and county park is located seven miles west of Ferndale. There are picnic tables, rest rooms. The beach has a wide expanse, enabling one to hike as far south as False Cape and north to the mouth of the Eel River. There is a generous supply of driftwood, and if you are in luck, glass floats. Surf fishing is good; rod and reel can provide sport. This beach is NOT SAFE for swimming. The bluff south of Centerville can provide the amateur "archeologist" with hours of pleasure, collecting pecten, clam, and other shells imbedded in the sandstone.

TABLE BLUFF-SOUTH SPIT: Another wide expanse of beach, spreading from the mouth of the Eel River, north to the entrance of Humboldt Bay. Besides providing miles of pleasant hiking, picnicking, fishing, there is a large source of driftwood. Sports fishing is usually good from the rock jetty. The camera fan can also find excellent subject matter, when lupin are in full bloom, or with dune backgrounds. As long as it is legal, one can do just about anything he wants.

THE NORTH JETTY, U.S. COAST GUARD STATION: The North Jetty access is closed to the public (1) because the entrance is dangerous at this point, rough seas can sweep a person into the sea; (2) the area is used by the National Guard for maneuver purposes. (Two good reasons.)

The Coast Guard station welcomes visitors on holidays and weekends between the hours of 1 p.m. and 4 p.m. Guided tours may be requested. The station is an interesting location. The boat house contains name plates of a number of shipwrecks.

THE "CHIP ALPS": One of the newest attractions to be seen at Samoa and nearby Fairhaven, are the growing "mountains" of redwood and hardwood chips. These can be seen from the road. Georgia-Pacific's spectacular pulp plant is about ready for operation, while the nearby Crown-Simpson plant is under construction. West of the operations is the famous beach onto which the USS Milwaukee wandered while trying to rescue the Sulmann H-3, prior to World War I. The beach is open to the public.

(Note: In traveling to Samoa from Arcata, use extreme care in driving. The road is adequate until you reach the peninsula, from that point on it is crooked, narrow, crowded. The truck and auto traffic is heavy.)

THE GIANT DUNES: Claimed to be the largest, tallest sand dunes on the Pacific Coast, are those which spread from a short distance north of Samoa to the mouth of Mad River. The south access to the beach (on foot) is distant and difficult.

Mad River Road will take visitors to Tyee City (Humboldt County Park) at the mouth of the Mad River. From this point the dunes are available by foot travel. The experience is rewarding.

CLAM BEACH, LITTLE RIVER, AND MOONSTONE BEACH: This is a long, beautiful stretch of beach open the year around to the public. Clam and Little River beaches are in the Humboldt County Park system. Moonstone Beach is accessible at Merryman's. At the beach you will find an improved parking lot (fee \$1). There is a refreshment stand located there. The beach is safe, ideal for "skim-boarding" and for the children. Moonstone is sheltered from heavy breezes.

TRINIDAD BEACHES: There are numerous coves near Trinidad Head, and along the coast, north of the head, providing pleasure for the hiker, "sunner," for the family, shel-hunter, etc. Trinidad State Park facilities are available. You can devise your own program of fun.

STONE AND FRESHWATER LAGOON BEACHES: Two attractive beaches, with the lagoons as assets. Searchers can find fossilized wood at Stone Lagoon. While good for picnicking, driftwood hunting, the beaches are NOT SAFE for swimming. Freshwater Lagoon is one of Humboldt's most popular parks; ideal for boating and water-ski activity. There is a boat ramp on the east side of the lagoon.

GOLD BLUFFS AND BEACH: Drive north on U.S.

county road. Road will take you through cut-over land, over a winding route onto the beach. Here you will find a stretch of coast just as Nature meant it to be. In the 1850's the beach was the cause of a "gold rush," when flecks of metal were found in the black sands. At one time several thousand people inhabited the area. When the boom faded, Gold Bluffs and the beach reverted to Nature. Today, the quiet, uncivilized area is a favorite for those wanting to "get away from it all." Famous Fern Canyon is accessible from the beach. If you are fortunate enough you may see some of the Roosevelt (Wapiti) elk herd. The unspoiled area provides sportsfishing, a place for those patient enough to try and separate the sands from the gold, and an area for the camera bug.

The magnificent countryside is ideal for family outings.

RFD's guide is running out of space, so we'll continue this tomorrow morning.

taking all possible steps to avoid such occurrences."

Elsewhere, the Leathernecks have killed water buffalo, chopped down banana trees and taken chickens and ducks for their own food.

All this strikes at villagers whose struggle to exist already is precarious.

Some Marines explain that the water buffalo sometimes charge, wounding Leathernecks.

Such acts, particularly the serious ones, are done by but a few. But they raise questions in the American military establishment while a tremendous buildup is under way to help the faltering Vietnamese stem the Viet Cong tide.

Senior Marine officers at headquarters here are acutely aware of the problem.

One, who has extensively studied guerrilla war from Communist textbooks, said recently:


