Agassizi, Jean Louis Rodolphe (1807-1873). Swiss-American zoologist and geologist, founder of the Museum of Vertebrate Zoology at Harvard Univ. *Poa pratensis* ssp. *a*.

Alexander, Annie Montague (1867-1950) . American plant and animal collector of western North America and Hawai'i. *Swallenia a*.

Anderson, Charles Lewis (1827-1910). Physician and botanist in Nevada and Santa Cruz, California. *Stipa lepida* var. *a*.

Arnow, Lois Goodell (b. 1921). Utah agrostologist, author of the family treatment in "A Utah Flora." *Poa a.*, *Stipa a*.

Arsène, Frère Gustave (1867-1938). French clergyman and botanist at the Sacred Heart Training College in Las Vegas, New Mexico. *Muhlenbergia a*.

Ascherson, Paul Friedrich August (1834-1913). German botanist. *Dactylis glomerata* var. *a*.

Ashe, William Willard (1872-1932). U. S. Forest Service botanist and forester, described over 500 new species and varieties, most of which have been reduced to synonymy. *Panicum a*.

Baker, Charles Fullar (1872-1927). American botanist and entomologist. *Agropyron b.*, *Agrostis b*.

Baker, Charles Henry (1848-?). American botanist who lived in Florida. *Spartina b*.

Baldwin, William (1779-1819). American botanist. *Saccharum b*.

Barrelier, Jacques (1606-1673). French physician and botanist. *Eragrostis b*.

Beckmann, Johann (1739-1811). German botanist and Professor of Philosophy at Göttingen who coined the term "technology." *Beckmannia*.

Bélangier, Charles Paulus (1805-1881). French botanist, Director of the Botanical Garden at Saint-Pierre. *Hilaria b*. The memorializing of Bélangier appears to be an error, in that the type specimen was collected by J. L. Berlandier.

Berg, Federico Guillermo Carlos (1843-1902). Director of the Museo Nacional de Buenos Aires. *Panicum b*.

Berlandier, Jean Louis (1805-1851). French botanist who explored Texas and Mexico. *Phragmites australis* var. *b*.

Bertero, Carlo Giuseppe (1789-1831). Italian botanist, student of the neotropical flora. *Tragus b*.

Beyrich, Heinrich Karl (1796-1834). Prussian botanical explorer of Brazil and the southeastern United States. *Eragrostis b*.

Bicknell, Eugene Pintard (1859-1925). New York banker and amateur botanist. *Panicum b.*

Bigelow, John Milton (1804-1878). Physician and botanist of the Mexican Boundary and Whipple railroad surveys. *Blepharidachne b.* *Poa b.*

Bladh, Peter Johan (1746-1816). Finnish naturalist. *Bothriochloa b.*

Blasdale, Walter Charles (1871-1960). Prof. of Chemistry at the University of California and amateur botanist. *Agrostis b.*

Blodgett, John Loomis (1809-1853). Physician and plant collector in Key West, Florida. *Paspalum b.*

Bloomer, Hiram G. (1821-1874). California botanist. *Stipa x b.*, *Oryzopsis x b.*

Bolander, Henry Nicholas (1831-1897). California botanist, collaborator in the State Geological Survey, and author of the state's first grass checklist. *Calamagrostis b.*, *Poa b.*, *Scribneria b.*

Bosc, Louis Augustin Guillaume (1759-1828). French botanist. *Panicum b.*, *Paspalum b.*

Boutelou y Soldevilla, Claudio (1774-1842). Professor of Agriculture in Madrid. *Bouteloua.*

Boutelou y Soldevilla, Estéban (1776-1813). Brother of Claudio. *Bouteloua.*

Bowden, Wray Merrill (b.1914). Cytogeneticist with the Canadian Dept. of Agriculture, student of *Elymus*. *Elymus x b.*

Brewer, William Henry (1828-1910). California botanist and senior author of its first state flora. *Calamagrostis b.*

Brown, Addison (1830-1913). Amateur botanist, patron of the New York Botanical Garden, co-author of the "Illustrated Flora of the Northern States and Canada." *Panicum a.*

Brown, Joseph R. American rancher. *Aristida b.*

Brown, Robert (1773-1858). Scottish librarian, first Keeper of Botany at the British Museum, naturalist on the Matthew Flinder's expedition to Australia, and the first to observe the movement of small particles suspended in liquids. *Cenchrus b.*

Buckley, Samuel Botsford (1809-1883). Texas State Geologist and naturalist. *Sporobolus b.*, *Tridens b.*

Burt-Davy: see Davy, Joseph Burt

Bush, Benjamin Franklin (1858-1937). Postmaster of Independence, Missouri. *Muhlenbergia b.*

Cabanis, Jean Louis (1816-1906). French ornithologist who collected in the southeastern USA. *Andropogon c.*

Cain, Stanley Adair (1902-1995). American geographer and botanist at the University of Michigan, author of "Foundations of Plant Geography." *Calamagrostis c.*

Canby, William Marriott (1831-1904). Delaware merchant, banker, and amateur botanist. *Poa c.*

Chaix, Abbé Dominique (1731-1800). French botanist, collaborator with Dominique Villars on a treatment of the plants of France. *Poa c.*

Chambers, Kenton Lee (b. 1929). Professor of Botany at Oregon State University, student of *Compositae* and the Oregon flora. *Poa c.*

Chapman, Alvan Wentworth (1809-1899). Florida botanist, author of "Flora of the Southern United States." *Gymnopogon c.*, *Panicum c.*, *Poa c.*, *Tridens b.*

Chase, Mary Agnes (1869-1963). Botanical illustrator, agrostologist, Custodian of Grasses at the U. S.

National Herbarium, collaborator of A. S. Hitchcock, author of "First Book of Grasses," prepared the second edition of "Manual of the Grasses of the United States," co-editor with Cornelia Niles of the "Index to Grass Species." *Aristida ramosissima* var. *c*.

Church, George Lyle (1903-1950). Professor of Botany at Brown University, student of the cytotaxonomy of grasses. *Elymus c*.

Clute, Willard Nelson (1869-1950). Professor of Botany at Butler University. *Panicum c*.

Combs, Robert (1872-1899). Plant collector in Florida and Cuba. *Panicum c*.

Commons, Albert (1829-1919). Delaware amateur botanist. *Panicum c*.

Congdon, Joseph Whipple (1834-1910). California lawyer and amateur botanist; described over 30 new species, many from the Yosemite area.

Cotta, Johann Heinrich (1763-1844). German botanist, a founder of modern forestry. *Cottea*.

Cuming, Hugh (1791-1865). English naturalist. *Eragrostis c*.

Curtiss, Alan Hiram (1845-1907). Florida plant collector. *Aristida c.*, *Calamovilfa c.*, *Sporobolus c*.

Cusick, William Conklin (1842-1922). Born in Illinois, but moved to Oregon in his youth. Served in the Union Army and later taught school. Amateur botanist encouraged by Charles V. Piper. *Poa c*.

Cutand, Vincente (1804-1866). Spanish botanist. *Cutandia*.

Danthione, Étienne (d. 1815). French agrostologist. *Danthonia*.

Davy, Joseph Burt (1870-1940). Scottish botanist, student of the California flora, author of a grass flora of central California. Later used the name Joseph Burt-Davy. *Glyceria d.*, *Pleuropogon d*.

Deam, Charles Clemon (1865-1953). Indiana botanist, author of "Flora of Indiana" and "Grasses of Indiana." *Panicum d*.

Deschamps, Louis Auguste (1765-1842). French surgeon and naturalist. *Deschampsia*.

Desmazières, Jean Baptiste Henri Joseph (1787-1862. Belgian botanist , a student of the grasses of northern France. *Desmazeria*.

Desvaux, Étienne-Émile (1830-1854). French botanist, student of Chilean grasses. *Enneapogon d*.

Douglas, David (1799-1834). Scottish botanist and explorer for the Royal Horticultural Society who travelled extensively in the Pacific Northwest, California, and Hawai'i. *Poa d*.

Drummond, Thomas (1780-1835). Scottish botanist, Curator of the Belfast Botanic Garden, who collected in Texas and the Canadian Rockies. *Sorghum bicolor* ssp. *x d*.

Dumont-d'Urville, Jules Sebastien Cesar (1790-1842). French explorer. *Panicum u.*, *Paspalum u*.

Earle, Franklin Sumner (1856-1929). U. S. Dept. of Agriculture agronomist. *Festuca e*.

Eastwood, Alice (1859-1953). Long-time Curator of Botany at the California Academy of Sciences in San Francisco, student of the California and western flora; co-editor (with J. T. Howell) of "Leaflets of Western Botany" an author of "A Flora of the South Fork of Kings River." *Festuca e*.

Ebinger, John E. (b. 1933). American botanist, Eastern Illinois Univ. *Elymus x e*.

Ehrhart, Friedrich (1742-1795). Swiss apothecary and botanist, student of Linnaeus. *Ehrharta*.

Elliott, Stephen (1771-1830). South Carolina legislator, banker, and botanist. Author of "A Sketch of the Botany of South Carolina and Georgia." *Agrostis e.*, *Andropogon e.*, *Sorghastrum e*.

Elmer, Adolph Daniel Edward (1870-1942). Botanist and collector of the floras of California, Washington, and the Philippines. *Agropyron e.*, *Festuca e.*, *Stipa e.*

Emersley, J. D. Plant collector of the southwestern flora. *Muhlenbergia e.*

Faber, Ernest (1839-1899). English missionary, plant collector, and student of the flora of China. *Setaria f.*

Fendler, Augustus (1813-1883). German plant collector for Asa Gray, especially in New Mexico, Central America, and South America. *Aristida purupurea* var. *f.*, *Poa f.*

Fernald, Merritt Lyndon (1873-1950). Professor of Botany at Harvard University, Director of the Gray Herbarium, editor of *Rhodora*, author of the 8th edition of "Gray's Manual of Botany." *Glyceria f.*, *Poa f.*, *Calamagrostis f.*

Frank, Joseph C (1782-1835). German physician and plant collector. *Eragrostis f.*

Gattinger, Augustin (1825-1903). Tennessee botanist and author of its state flora. *Panicum g.*

Gay, Claude (1800-1873). French botanist, student of the flora of Africa. *Chloris g.*

Gerard, John (1545-1612). English herbalist, author of "The Herball or General Histoire of Plants." *Koeleria g.*

Geyer, Carl Andreas (1809-1853). German botanist with the Nicollet Expedition. *Melica g.*

Ghiesbreght, August (1810-1893). Belgian plant collector, especially the Mexican flora. *Panicum g.*

Gouan, Antoine (1733-1821). French Professor of Botany at Montpellier. *Panicum g.*

Gray, Asa (1810-1888). Probably the most distinguished American botanist of the 19th century, Professor of Botany at Harvard University, author of "Manual of the Botany of the Northern United States," "Synoptical Flora of North America," and numerous texts. *Festuca g.*, *Poa arctica* ssp. *g.*

Greene, Edward Lee (1843-1915). Clergyman and first Professor of Botany at the University of California, later at the Catholic University of America, student of the flora of California, editor, and botanical historian. *Orcuttia g.*

Griffiths, David (1867-1935). U. S. Dept. of Agriculture botanist, student of the southwestern flora. *Agropyron g.*

Grisebach, August Heinrich Rudolf (1814-1879). German botanist, Professor of Botany at Göttingen, author of the "Flora of the British West Indies." *Setaria g.*

Gussone, Giovanni (1787-1866). Professor of Botany at Naples. *Bromus rigidus* var. *g.*

Hackel, Eduard (1850-1926). Austrian agrostologist, author of the family treatment in Engler & Prantl's "Die Natürlichen Pflanzen-familien." *Hackelochloa.*

Hall, Elihu (1822-1882). Illinois plant collector. *Agrostis h.*, *Andropogon h.*, *Panicum h.*

Harford, William George Washington (1825-1911). California conchologist, colleague of Henry Bolander and Albert Kellogg at the California Academy of Sciences in San Francisco. *Melica h.*

Hartweg, Carl Theodor (1812-1871). German plant collector of California, Central America, and South America. *Paspalum h.*

Havard, Valery (1846-1927). U. S. Army physician, born in France, who collected plants in Texas. *Aristida h.*, *Panicum h.*

Heller, Amos Arthur (1867-1944). Botanist and editor of *Muhlenbergia*, who collected plants in the western

United States, Puerto Rico, and Hawai'i. *Panicum h.*

Henderson, Louis Fourniquet (1853-1942). Professor of Botany at the University of Oregon. *Agrostis h.*, *Oryzopsis h.*

Hillman, Frederick Hebard (1863-1954). U. S. Dept. of Agriculture botanist and student of Nevada grasses. *Panicum capillare ssp. h.*

Hitchcock, Albert Spear (1865-1935). American agrostologist, pre-eminent early 20th century expert on the grasses of the United States, Curator of Grasses at the U. S. National Herbarium, author of "The Manual of the Grasses of the United States." *Digitaria h.*, *Festuca californica var. h.*

Holm, Herman Theodor (1854-1932). Danish-American botanist. *Calamagrostis h.*

Hooker, Sir William Jackson (1785-1865). English botanist, Director of the Royal Botanical Gardens at Kew, father of Joseph Dalton Hooker. *Helictotrichon h.*, *Imperata h.*, *Sporobolus asper var. h.*

Hoover, Robert Francis (1913-1970). Professor of Botany at California State Polytechnic College, San Luis Obispo, author of "The Vascular Plants of San Luis Obispo County, California." *Agrostis h.*, *Pleuropogon h.*

Howell, John Thomas (1903-1994). Long-time Curator of Botany at the California Academy of Sciences in San Francisco, co-editor of "Leaflets of Western Botany," and ardent student of the California flora. *Puccinellia h.*, *Trisetum h.*

Howell, Thomas Jefferson (1842-1912). Oregon botanist, author of a "Flora of Northwest America." *Agrostis h.*, *Alopecurus h.*, *Calamagrostis h.*, *Festuca h.*, *Poa h.*

Imperato, Ferrante (1550-1625). Italian apothecary. Author of "Dell'Historia Naturale." *Imperata.*

Jacquemont, Victor (1801-1832). French naturalist. *Sporobolus j.*

James, Edwin (1797-1861). American physician and botanist on the Stephen Long Expedition of 1820. *Hilaria j.*

Jepson, Willis Linn (1867-1946). Professor of Botany at the University of California, founder of the California Botanical Society, a founding father of the Sierra Club, author of the "A Flora of California," "A Manual of the Flowering Plants of California," and numerous other works. His specimens form the core of the Jepson Herbarium at the Univ. of California, Berkeley. *Elymus glaucus var. j.*

Jones, Marcus Eugene (1852-1934). Mining engineer and botanist, student of the flora of the western United States. *Muhlenbergia j.*

Joor, Joseph Finley (1849-1892). Physician and Professor of Botany at Tulane University. *Panicum j.*

Kalm, Pehr (1715-1779). Swedish botanist, student of Linnaeus who collected in the eastern United States. *Bromus k.*

Keck, David Daniels (1903-1995). American botanist, Asst. Director of the New York Botanical Garden, and collaborator with Philip Munz on "A California Flora." *Poa k.*

Kellogg, Albert (1813-1887). California physician and botanist, one of the founding fathers of the California Academy of Sciences in San Francisco. *Poa k.*

Kennedy, Patrick Beveridge (1874-1930). Agronomist at the University of California. *Agrostis k.*

King, Clarence (1842-1901). Explorer and botanist, head of the government survey of the 40th parallel. *Blepharidachne k.*, *Hesperochloa k.*, *Oryzopsis k.*

Koeler, Georg Ludwig (1765-1807). German botanist, professor at Mainz, student of the grasses of France and Germany. *Koeleria.*

Kunth, Carl Sigismund (1788-1850). Professor of Botany at Berlin. *Microchloa k.*

Lamarck, Jean-Baptiste Pierre Antoine de Monet, Chevalier de (1744-1829). French naturalist, proponent of the theory of the transmission of acquired traits to offspring, author of "Flore Française." *Lamarckia*. Lamson-Scribner, Frank: see Scribner, Frank Lamson

Lange, Johan Martin Christian (1818-1898). Librarian and Director of the Botanical Garden at Copenhagen. *Paspalum l.*

Langsdorff, Georg Heinrich von (1774-1852). German physician and naturalist. *Calamagrostis canadensis* var. *l.*

Leers, Johann Daniel (1727-1774). German pharmacist and botanist. *Leersia*.

Lehmann, Johann George Christian (1850-1903). German botanist. *Eragrostis l.*

Leiberg, John Bernhard (1853-1913). American surveyor who collected the plants of the western United States. *Panicum l., Poa l.*

Lemmon, John Gill (1832-1908). California State Forester and botanist. *Eriochloa l., Phalaris l., Puccinellia l., Stipa l.*

Leprieur, F. R. (1799-1869). French naval officer and amateur botanist. *Enteropogon prieurii*.

Letterman, George Washington (1841-1913). Missouri teacher and botanist. *Poa l., Stipa l., Achnatherum l.*

Liebmann, Frederik Michael (1813-1856). Danish botanist, student of the Mexican flora. *Setaria l.*

Lindheimer, Fernand Jakob (1801-1879). German newspaper editor and student of the Texas flora. *Muhlenbergia l., Panicum l.*

Macoun, James Melville (1862-1920). Canadian botanist and ornithologist. Author of "Check List of Canadian Plants."

Macoun, John (1862-1890). Canadian botanist, Curator of the National Herbarium of Canada. X *Elyhordeum m.*

Marsh, Ernest George, Jr (b. 1915). Texas wildlife technician. *Muhlenbergia m.*

Mertens, Carl Heinrich (1796-1830). German-born physician. *Agrostis m.*

Metcalf, Orrick Baylor (1879-1936). American botanist, student of E. O. Wooton; flora of New Mexico. *Muhlenbergia m.*

Meyer, Frank Nicholas (1875-1918). American plant explorer for the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture. Introduced the soybean to the western world; Meyer lemon named after him. *Phyllostachys m.*

Michaux, André (1746-1802). French botanist, explorer of the eastern United States, author of "Flora Boreali-Americana," and father of François André Michaux. *Eriochloa m.*

Mohr, Charles Theodore (1824-1901). German pharmacist and botanist, author of "Plant Life of Alabama." *Andropogon m., Aristida m.*

Molina, Juan (Giovanni) Ignazio (1740-1829). Jesuit missionary and botanist, student of the flora of Chile. *Molinia*.

Morton, Julius Sterling (1832-1902). Nebraska newspaper editor, historian, U. S. Secretary of Agriculture in the Cleveland administration. *Helictotrichon m.*

Muhlenberg, Gotthilf, Heinrich Ernst (1753-1815). Pennsylvania minister and botanist, author of "Descriptio Uberior Graminum." *Muhlenbergia. Amphicarpum m.*

Muir, John (1838-1914). Born in Scotland and in 1849 immigrated to America; naturalist, explorer, and conservationist; founder of the Sierra Club. *Calamagrostis m.*

Munro, William (1818-1880). British general, agrostologist, and student of the flora of India. *Munroa.*

Nealley, Greanleaf Cilley (1846-1896). Plant collector for the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture in the southwestern United States. *Aristida purpurea* var. *n.*, *Leptochloa n.*, *Sporobolus n.*, *Tridens n.*

Nees von Esenbeck, Christian Gottfried Daniel (1776-1858). Professor of Botany at Breslau, author of "Agrostologia Brasiliensis." *Stipa n.*

Nelson, Aven (1859-1952). Professor of Botany at the University of Wyoming, author of a revision of J. M. Coulter's "New Manual of Botany of the Central Rocky Mountains." *Stipa columbiana* var. *n.*

Nicora de Panza, Elisa Gernaela Juana Raquel (1912-1832). Argentinian botanist. *Paspalum n.*

Nuttall, Thomas (1786-1859). English-American botanist, Professor of Botany at Harvard University, author of "The Genera of North American Plants." *Puccinellia n.*

Oldham, Richard (1837-1864). English botanist. *Bambusa o.*

Opiz, Philippe Maximilian (1787-1858). Czech botanist. *Opizia.*

Orcutt, Charles Russell (1864-1929). California botanist. *Orcuttia*, *Tuctoria* (an anagram). *Aristida o.*, *Bromus o.*, *Eragrostis o.*

Otis, Ira Clinton (1861-1911). Plant collector in Washington. *Glyceria o.*

Palmer, Edward (1831-1911). American plant collector, explorer, ethnobotanist. *Eragrostis p.*

Pammel, Louis Hermann (1862-1931). Professor of Botany at Iowa State College. *Melica subulata* var. *p.*

Parish, Samuel Bonsall (1838-1928). California botanist. *Agropyron p.*, *Aristida p.*, *Puccinellia p.*

Parry, Charles Christopher (1823-1890). British-American botanist; explorer of the West, including with the Mexican Boundary Survey. *Bouteloua p.*, *Danthonia p.*

Patterson, Harry Norton (1853-1919). Illinois printer and botanist, student of the Colorado flora. *Poa p.*

Peacock, Robert William. (c.1869-1949). Australian agriculturalist. *Leptochloa decipiens* ssp. *p.*

Pentz, James Alexander (1896-1967). South African botanist. *Digitaria eriantha* ssp. *p.*

Phipps, Constanine John (1744-1792). British explorer and politician. *Phippsia.*

Pickering, Charles (1805-1878). Botanist, ethnologist, and explorer who served with the U. S. Exploring Expedition under the command of Charles Wilkes. *Calamagrostis p.*

Piper, Charles Vancouver (1867-1926). Agrostologist with the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture, author of "Flora of the State of Washington." X *Elyhordeum p.*, *Poa p.*

Poiret, Jean Louis Marie (1755-1834). French cleric and botanist who completed Lamarck's monumental encyclopedia. *Setaria p.*, *Sporobolus p.*

Porter, Thomas Conrad (1822-1901). Professor of Botany at Lafayette College in Pennsylvania and student of the Colorado flora. *Bromus p.*, *Calamagrostis p.*, *Melica p.*, *Muhlenbergia p.*, *Stipa p.*

Priuer. See Lepriuer.

Pringle, Cyrus Guernsey (1838-1911). Vermont plant collector and plant breeder, student of the flora of California, Arizona, and Mexico. Author of "The breeding of plants by means of hybridization, etc." *Agropyron p.*, *Agrostis hallii* var. *p.*, *Piptochaetum p.*, *Poa p.*, *Stipa p.*

Puccinell, Benedetto (1808-1850). Professor in the Lyceum in Lucca, Italy. *Puccinellia*.

Pumpelly, Raphael (1837-1923). Geologist with the U. S. Geological Survey. *Bromus p.*

Purpus, Carl Albert (1851-1941). German-born botanist, collector of the flora of California, the western United States, and Baja California. *Festuca saximontana* var. *p.*

Pursh, Frederick (1774-1820). German-American botanist, author of "Flora Americae Septentrionalis," which included plants collected on the Lewis and Clark Expedition. *Amphicarpum p.*

Ravenel, Henry William (1814-1887). South Carolina planter, editor, and student of fungi. *Panicum r.*

Redfield, John Howard (1815-1895). Pennsylvania business man and amateur botanist. *Redfieldia*.

Reeves, Robert G. (0000-0000). Professor of Biology, Agricultural & Mechanical College of Texas, co-author with Paul Mangelsdorf of "The Origin of Indian Corn and Its Relatives," who collected the seed from Mexico. *Andropogon r.*, *Bothriochloa r.*

Reimarus, J. A. H (1729-1814). Professor of Natural History and Physics at Hamburg. *Reimarochloa*.

Rendle, Alfred Barton (1865-1938). English botanist, Keeper of Botany at the British Museum. Author of "The Classification of Flowering Plants" and co-author of "Flora of Jamaica." *Alopecurus r.*

Richardson, Sir John (1787-1865). Scottish surgeon, naturalist, and explorer, especially of the Arctic. *Bromus r.*, *Muhlenbergia r.*, *Stipa r.*

Roemer, Hans L. Canadian ecologist. *Festuca r.*

Roemer, Karl Ferdinand von (1818-1891). German geologist who collected in Texas. *Aristida r.*

Ross, Edith A. Amateur bryologist of Davenport, Iowa. *Agrostis r.*

Rothrock, Joseph Trimble (1839-1922). Surgeon and Professor of Botany at the University of Pennsylvania; served as surgeon-botanist on the Wheeler Expedition. *Bouteloua r.*

Rottboell, Christem Friis (1727-1797). Professor of Botany in Copenhagen. *Rottboellia*.

Runyon, Robert (1881-1968). Photographer and amateur botanist of Brownsville, Texas. *Digitaria r.*

Saunders, William (1822-1900). Scottish horticulturalist with the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture. *Agropyron s.*

Scheele, Georg Heinrich Adolf (1808-1864). German botanist and student of the Texas grass flora. *Setaria s.*

Schiede, Christian Julius Wilhelm (1798-1836). German physician and botanist who collected in Mexico. *Aristida s.*

Schreber, Johann Christian Daniel von (1739-1810). German botanist, professor at Erlangen. *Muhlenbergia s.*, *Setaria s.*

Scribner, Frank Lamson (1851-1938). Agrostologist with the U. S. Department of Agriculture, author of "American Grasses". His later work bears the name Frank Lamson-Scribner. *Scribneria*. *Agropyron s.*, *Calamagrostis s.*, *Panicum oligosanthos* var. *s.*, *Stipa s.*

Sellow (Sello), Friedrich (1789-1831). German botanist who collected in South America. *Cortaderia s.*

Siegling, Johann Blasius (1760-1835). Professor of Botany at Erfurt, Germany. *Sieglingia*.

Silveus, William Arent (1875-0000). Attorney and student of grasses of San Antonio, Texas, author of "Texas Grasses." *Eragrostis s.*, *Sporobolus s.*

Simpson, Joseph Herman (1841-1918). Florida naturalist. *Digitaria s.*, *Eriochloa michauxii* var. *s.*

Smith, Charles Eastwick (1820-1900). Engineer, railroad president, and amateur botanist. *Melica s.*

Smith, Jared Gage (1866-1925). Botanist with the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture. *Agropyron s.*, *Elymus s.*

Soreng, Robert J. (b. 1952). American agrostologist. U. S. National Museum. *Sorengia*.

Springfield, H. Wayne. U. S. Dept. of Agriculture range scientist, collector of original seed source from New Mexico. *Andropogon s.*, *Bothriochloa s.*

Stapf, Otto (1857-1933). Austrian botanist at the Royal Botanic Gardens at Kew, student of the African flora. *Neostapfia*, *Stapfia*.

Stebbins, George Ledyard (1906-2000). Professor of Genetics at the University of California at Davis, student of grass evolution, cytotaxonomy, and the California flora, co-author with B. Crampton of "A Suggested Revision of the Grass Genera of North America." X *Elyhordeum s.*, *Elymus s.*

St. Hilaire, Auguste François César Provençal de (1779-1853). French botanist and student of the South American flora. *Hilaria*.

Stillman, Jacob Davis Babcock (1819-1888). California physician, editor, and amateur botanist. *Stipa s.*

Suksdorf, Wilhelm Nikolaus (1850-1932). German-born amateur botanist of Bingen, Washington, avid collector of the state's flora. *Bromus s.*

Swallen, Jason Richard (1903-1993). American agrostologist, Curator of the U. S. National Herbarium. *Swallenia*. *Eragrostis s.*, *Hilaria s.*

Tharp, Benjamin Carroll (1885-1964). Professor of Botany at the University of Texas. *Sporobolus t.*

Thomine-Desmases, Charles (1799-1824). French lawyer and amateur botanist. *Bromus hordeaceus* ssp. *t.*

Thurber, George (1821-1890). New York botanist with the Mexican Boundary Survey. *Agrostis t.* *Festuca t.* *Muhlenbergia t.*, *Stipa t.*

Thurow, Friedrich Wilhelm (1852-1930). German amateur botanist, student of the Texas grass flora. *Panicum t.*

Torrey, John (1796-1873). New York physician and botanist of the New York Botanical Garden. Coauthor with Asa Gray of "The Flora of North America." *Torreyochloa*. *Bouteloua laguroides* ssp. *t.*, *Melica t.*, *Muhlenbergia t.*

Tracy, Joseph Prince (1879-1953). Title examiner in Eureka, California and avid collector of the flora of northwestern California. *Festuca t.*

Tracy, Samuel Mills (1847-1920). U. S. Dept. of Agriculture botanist. His collections formed the basis of the Tracy Herbarium at Texas A & M University. *Andropogon t.*, *Eragrostis t.*, *Poa t.*

Trinius, Carl Bernhard von (1778-1844). Russian court physician and agrostologist at St. Petersburg, author of "Species Graminum...." *Bromus t.*

Tuckerman, Edward (1817-1886). Professor of Botany at Amherst College. *Panicum t.*

Urville. See Dumont-d'Urville.

Warnock, Barton H (1911-1998). Professor of Botany at Sul Ross University in Texas. *Bouteloua w.*

Tweedy, Frank (1854-1937). Topographic engineer with the U. S. Geological Survey who collected the flora of the western United States. *Bromus pumpellianus* var. *t.*, *Calamagrostis t.*

Vasey, George (1822-1893). Agrostologist with the U. S. Department of Agriculture, author of "Grasses of the United States," "Grasses of the Pacific Slope," "Grasses of the Southwest," and "Monograph of the Grasses of the United States and British America." *Vaseyochloa. Poa v.*

Virlet d'Aoust, Pierre Théodore (1800-1894). French geologist. Collector of the Mexican flora. *Paspalum v.*

Walter, Thomas (1740-1789). South Carolina planter and amateur botanist, author of "Flora Caroliniana." *Echinochloa w.*

Webber, David Gould (1809-1883). Physician, miner, and friend of J. G. Lemmon. *Oryzopsis w.*

Webber, Herbert John (1865-1946). Botanist with the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture. *Panicum w.*

Werner, William C (1851-1935). Ohio florist and amateur botanist. *Panicum w.*

Wheeler, George Montague (1842-1909). U. S. Army Captain and engineer, head of the 19th century government survey that bears his name. *Poa w.*

Wiegand, Karl McKay (1873-1942). Professor of Botany at Cornell University and Head of its Dept. of Botany for many years. Author of "The Flora of the Cayuga Lake Basin." *Elymus w.*

Wilcox, Timothy Erastus (1840-1932). American Army surgeon who collected in the West. *Panicum w.*

Williams, Thomas Albert (1865-1900). Agrostologist with the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture. *Stipa w.*

Willkomm, Heinrich Moritz (1821-1895). Professor of Botany at Dorpat and Prague. *Willkommia.*

Wolf, John (1820-1897). Illinois botanist attached to the Wheeler Expedition. *Poa w.*, *Trisetum w.*

Wright, Charles (1811-1895). Plant collector for Asa Gray, especially in Texas. *Andropogon w.*, *Aristida purpurea* var. *w.*, *Aristida w.*, *Muhlenbergia w.*, *Panicum w.*, *Sporobolus w.*

Zois-Edelstein, Karl von (1756-1800). German botanist. *Zoysia.*

Zuloaga, Fernando Omar (b. 1951). Argentinian agrostologist. *Zuloagaea.*
